That Trolley Franchise.

County Commissioners Set Next Tues-

day for Further Action—They Delib-

erate for Five Hours With

\$5,000 on the Table.

SITUATION INCREASING IN INTEREST.

The session of last Tuesday was one

of the most animated and interesting

meetings ever held by the Kent county

commissioners' board. For five hours,

commencing at one o'clock, the board

wrestled with the offer and counter

offers, propositions and counter propo-

sitions of two rival companies seeking a

franchise. During all of that time a

crowd of interested and excited people

which filled the commissioners' court

room and reached well into the cor-

ridor, watched the proceedings.

Hope H. Barroll, Esq., representing

the Baltimore and Chestertown Com-

pany, placed on the felt-covered table

ten crisp one hundred dollar bills, in ab-

solute payment into the county treasury

for the right to use the public roads be-

tween Chestertown, Rock Hall and Tol-

chester. In addition to this, in the

same pile of notes were twenty one

hundred dollar bills as a forfeit to the

county in the event of failure on the

part of his company to fulfill every

material detail of their agreement.

As an offset to this, Mr. John David

Urie, representing the Kent and Cecil

Company, placed before the commis-

sioners a certified draft for \$2,000, as a

guarantee that the road from Chese-

town to Rock Hall would be built, but

made no offer of cash payment for the

use of the county's roadways, substituting

therefor eighty shares of their stock, the

par value of which was placed by him at

\$2,000, but the cash value of which, as a

matter of fact, might not be worth 2,000

cents. At this stage of proceedings Mr.

Barroll offered \$1,500 cash for the

franchise from Chestertown to Rock Hall

and a \$2,000 forfeit that that portion of

the road would be constructed.

It will be seen that the Baltimore and

Chestertown Company had made the

most advantageous offer from the

county's standpoint. This fact was

evidently recognized by the board of

commissioners, but just as they were about

to decide in favor of the Baltimore and

Chestertown Company, Mr. Urie offered

\$1,500 cash for the franchise from Chese-

town to Rock Hall, (the cash however,

was not shown) and a \$2,000 forfeit as

an assurance that that portion of the

road would be built. No cash offer

whatever was made for the franchise

from Chestertown to Sassafras, which is

considerably longer than the route from

Chestertown to Rock Hall. The only

assurance that he was willing to give

that the Sassafras end of the road would

be constructed was a forfeit in the paltry

sum of \$500. At this point Mr. Tawsh-

end, as counsel for the board, made

the proposition to Mr. Urie that the

gentlemen whom he represented pay

\$1,500 cash for the franchise from Chese-

town to Rock Hall, and put up a forfeit

of \$500 cash to guarantee the con-

struction of that part of the road,

and to put up a forfeit of \$2,000 as a

guarantee of the construction of the

road from Chestertown to Sassafras.
