A Few Things to Remember.

ENTRIES.—All entries will be free, except in Races and Poultry Department, but ten percent. will be deducted from all premiums which may be awarded. Entries on poultry must be paid at time of entry.
The office of the Secretary on the Fair Grounds will be open after August 1st for the reception of entries and arrangement of place for exhibits.

EXHIBITS.—Exhibits must be in place 10 A. M. TUESDAY, AUGUST 26th, and shall not be removed before 5 P. M. FRIDAY, AUGUST 29th, under forfeiture of all premiums which may have been awarded to any person so offending.

HAVE YOU READ THE RULES?

1. Save yourself and the Secretary trouble by sending your entries in ahead of the Fair, at least a week. The Secretary and all clerks are on the grounds all during the week of the Fair.
2. Application for space does not make your entry, and where entries are made by mail, you must call at the office and get your tags. Neglect this and you may lose your premium. The tags are always ready for you.

3. Always give of animals, 1. age; 2. sex; 3. pedigree, if any. We can make no entry on a statement that you want to show a horse at the Fair, and yet many people expect to have a tag ready on just such entries.

4. Always say how many stalls you want, and give the smallest number you can get along with, and what you want them for.

5. Everyone makes mistakes. We do, but we will correct them cheerfully if it is our fault; but you must not blame us if you rely on what people say you ought to do. If you are in doubt, come to the office and find out. The clerks are paid extra to answer questions. Take no advice of any one but the officers.

6. Be sure your entry blank is made out in the name of the person you want the premium awarded to. Checks in payment are sent to the person whose name is on the entry blank.

7. Don't ask officers to attend to exhibits, because they have something else to do. Attend to them yourself, and if anything is wrong you know who to blame.

8. Don't blame the officers too much if the judges, superintendents, etc., are not on hand at exactly the appointed time, but keep your attendants, stock, etc., where you can get at them when wanted. There is a great deal to be done in a short time.

9. All feed furnished will be charged for.

10. The success of the Fair depends on you. The Board of Managers will do all they can to make you comfortable and to make the Fair a success, but they CANNOT DO IT ALL.

Exhibition tickets, sold when entry is made to exhibitors competing for premiums, admitting twice a day..... 75 cents
Grand Stand Tickets..... 25 cents
One horse vehicle or saddle horse..... 25 cents
Two horse vehicle..... 25 cents
(No horse admitted without horse tickets.)

Children under 10 years, free; over 10 years, full price.

Non-transferable passes will be issued free to owners of stock and machinery for their employees, at the discretion of the Superintendent, but they must be obtained when entries are made.

Tickets must be bought at the designated offices, and no money will be received at the gate. No person can enter without a ticket, it makes no difference how many you have bought.

If you wish to attend the Fair under the above conditions, we will be glad to have you, and make it as pleasant for you as we can.

EXCURSION TO ATLANTIC CITY.

The Second Low Rate Excursion via
the Queen Anne's Railroad.

The Queen Anne's Railroad Company will run a special low rate excursion to Atlantic City, on Wednesday, August 20th. THURSDAY'S QUOTATIONS.

WHEAT.—The arrivals of southern wheat today were slightly freer, but still light, comparatively. Market easier as compared with yesterday's grade sales, but demand fair from all classes of buyers. Sales of cargoes on grade at 73 cents 'or No. 2 red, 71 for steamer 2 red, and 69 cents for rejected. Small bag lots, by sample, brought 71, 73, and 72½ cents, as to quality.

CORN.—The market for southern corn today was about steady, but dull, with the demand fair for bag lots, while cargoes are slow to find favor. Actual receipts today light. Sales of small parcels white at 60½ and 61 cents, and a round lot of yellow (4000 bus.) at 61 cents, by sample afloat. Corn is druggery and easier, having sold today on a basis of \$3.25 per bbl. for carloads prime yellow on spot.
