Kent and Queen Anne County Fair, on
Tuesday next.

The races have filled satisfactorily and
all departments of exhibits will be full
to overflowing when the fair machinery
is put in motion and the public are ad-
mitted to inspect the different depart-
ments. So far as possible Mr. Noland
has gathered around him the efficient
and tried corps of superintendents and
assistants who have done duty in form-
er years.

COLLEGE NOTES.

Miss Mary Burchinal to Fill Miss Riley's
Position—New Residence for Prof.
Jones.

At a meeting of the Board of Visitors
and Governors of Washington College
held on Saturday evening, Miss Mary
Burchinal was appointed teacher of Ger-
man, French and Drawing in the college
Normal course. Miss Burchinal will fill
the position made vacant by Miss Edith
R. Riley, who has accepted a position in
the west. She has successfully taught
in the Chestertown school for several
years, and is one of the best equipped of
Kent's intellectually strong corps of in-
structors in her public schools. She
graduated with honors at Washington
College, and her work as an instructor
has been characterized with marked
success. Miss Burchinal was selected
from twenty other applicants for Miss
Hobb's place.

At the same meeting it was decided
to erect a pretty residence for Prof. J. S.
W. Jones, who occupies the chair of
mathematics at the college. Plans and
specifications are being submitted and
work will commence at an early date.
The building will be architecturally
one of the prettiest on College Hill, will
be modern in every respect and will pos-
sess many desirable conveniences.

The building will be placed on the
lot between the residence of Prof. J. R.
Micou and Mr. Willard Melvin.

Washington College will open for the
collegiate year 1902-03 on Wednesday,
September 17. The prospects are that the
opening will be with a full enrollment.

WITH THE FRUIT GROWERS.

Busy Scenes at Shipping Points and Can-
neries—The Tomato Situation Interest-
ing to Growers.

The scenes at shipping points along
Chestertown river have been animated and
interesting in the extreme during last
week and the opening days of the pres-
ent week. The wharves along Chestertown
river at which were representatives of
several commission houses have been
auction places for the earlier products of
the tomato patches. Shrewd farmers
soon recognized their opportunity and
sold practically at public auction to the
highest bidder for cash. Bidding has been
spirited and prices ranged from 15 cents
per basket or \$9.00 per ton, to 36 cents
per basket or about \$32 per ton.

Many farmers who had contracted at
\$7.50 or \$8.00 per ton for local canneries
sold their fruit at the advanced prices.
This action of the grower has raised a
nice legal question between themselves
and the packers. The canneries men, who
had furnished the seed and contracted
for the produce of the patches at a
stipulated price per ton, claim that
the entire crop of these patches belong
to them and should have been delivered
under their instructions and subject to
their order. On the contrary the grow-
ers claim that they, by their contracts
were to grow tomatoes at a stipulated
price per ton for the particular canneries
and not for the canner to go upon the
market and speculate; that their fruit
was ripe and that the canneries were
in not operation, and that these facts
left them in a position to dispose of their
tomatoes at the best possible advantage
until the packers were ready to receive
their fruit at their packing establish-
ments. Hundreds of baskets were sold
by growers at from twenty-five to thirty-
five cents.

Reports from all sections are to the
effect that the tomatoes are blighting
and that the set of fruit is extremely
poor, with the consequent result of a
poor crop.

Capt. R. S. Emory, president of the
Maryland State Horticultural Society
called a meeting at the Carrollton Hotel,
Baltimore, last week to consider the
forthcoming session and exhibition to
take place next winter. The following
were present: R. S. Emory, Chestertown;
G. O. Browne, vice-president, Balti-
more; Charles E. Biggs, Sharpsburg;
A. L. Quaintance, College Park; A. L.
Towson, Smithburg; Orlando Harrison,
Berlin. The last two were present by
invitation. It was decided to hold the
next meeting on December 17 and 18 at
Dushane Post Hall. The matter of re-
duced rates on railroads was discussed,
and Charles G. Biggs and A. L. Towson
were authorized to correspond with
railroad officials. The secretary re-
ported that the membership had in-
creased to 2,200.

Efforts will be made to secure an ex-
tensive exhibit of fruit and vegetables.
The speakers will be practical men en-
gaged in the departments they will talk on
Capt. Emory, Messrs. James S. Harris,
Harry L. Boyd, John Bell, W. Irving
Walker, W. D. Penington, H. L. Crew,
Senator Baker, C. C. Brown and many
other growers will doubtless be repre-
sented in the exhibits.

Messrs. W. Irving Walker, J. Walter
Skirven and George Bell are reported to
have delivered the finest fruit shipped
from Chestertown this season.

TO UNVEIL REED MEMORIAL.

October 5 the day Appointed for Ceremonies
at I. U.

Rev. Chris. T. Denroche on Sunday
announced that the unveiling of the
handsome granite slab to mark the
grave of Gen'l Philip Reed in I. U.
church yard, will take place on Sunday,
October 5. The Rt. Reverend William
Forbes Adams, Bishop of the Diocese of
Evston, will be present, and an appropri-
ate program will be arranged for the
occasion.

The date for the unveiling of the gran-
ite marker for the battle field has not as
yet been definitely decided on.

The gentlemen composing the com-
mittee are arranging every detail to
make the occasion in every way an
honor to Gen'l Reed and the country
which he so conspicuously served on the
battle field, in the halls of legislation
and as a member of the State and County
of which he was a distinguished citizen.

Bedworth to Go.—The hosts of
friends of Bedworth, Jr., 214, the Kent
county pacer which won such golden
honors on the track last season, have
been anxiously awaiting news from
him this year. Though entered in
several places on the grand circuit
Bedworth has not started up to this
time. It is positively stated that he
will go in the pace at Providence,
Rhode Island, next week. It will be a
disappointment to many that the young
Kent countian will not appear in the
stake races at Tolchester.

HERBERT R. STRONG.

The remains of Herbert R. Strong
were interred in St. Paul's cemetery, on
Sunday afternoon. Funeral services
were held at the home of the deceased,
conducted by Rev. J. P. Willson, of Balti-
more, a former pastor at Wesley Chapel,
assisted by Rev. J. L. Elderdicke, pastor
of the church. The sacred songs which
Mr. Strong so much loved in life were
beautifully sung on the occasion of the
last tribute of love and honor to the

Lover of My Soul was sung as a chorus,
as the body was being lowered to its
last resting place.

CHARLES H. O'HARA.

Mr. Charles H. O'Hara, died suddenly
of an acute attack of kidney trouble, at
his home in Baltimore city, on Wednes-
day, aged 57 years.

Mr. O'Hara was a son of the late Ben-
jamin and Elizabeth O'Hara, of Anne
Arundel county. He went to Baltimore
about 30 years ago and entered the com-
mission business. He was well known
for his spirit of good-fellowship and
literary ability, being a contributor to
several magazines and periodicals. He
married Miss Adele Hynson, of Kent
county, who survives him, but leaves no
children.

The funeral will take place at 9 o'clock
this morning, from the residence, and
the interment will be at the I. U. church,
Kent county, this afternoon. Under-
taker Ferguson will have charge of
interment.

CHURCH NOTES.

Bishop Coleman Says Women Should Wear
Hats in Church.

Bishop Coleman, of the Diocese of
Delaware, has started a mighty discus-
sion by his sermon at Rehoboth declar-
ing that women should never go with
heads uncovered in church.

"The church of Delaware has no tolera-
tion for such a custom," the Bishop is
reported to have said, "and if men should
sit in church with their hats on it would
be no greater affront than it is for women
to appear without headgear."

Several Philadelphia clergymen take
issue with the Delaware Bishop.

The passage which he is supposed to
rely on to support his statement occurs
in the eleventh chapter of Paul's First
Epistle to the Corinthians, and reads as
follows:

"But every woman that prayeth or
prophesieth with her head uncovered
dishonoreth her head, for that is even
all one as if she was shaven."

"For if the woman be not covered, let
her also be shorn; but if it be a shame
for a woman to be shorn or shaven, let
her be covered."

Several leading ministers contend that
the Bishop takes the passage too literally.
