HIS COUNTRY NEWSPAPER.

Reminiscences Suggested to an Old Boy by the News of Unionville.

"It is a fashion, I know, among city folk to ridicule the country paper," says a reformed travelling man, "but I have been a regular subscriber to the Unionville Banner for over thirty years. There's one evening in the week that I look forward to with zest. That's Monday night, when I light my old pipe, put on my slippers and lie back in the battered rocker for a musing and a dreaming over my copy of the Banner."

"Yes, there it is. Hasn't changed a font of type, I guess, in forty years. Same old queer job type.
