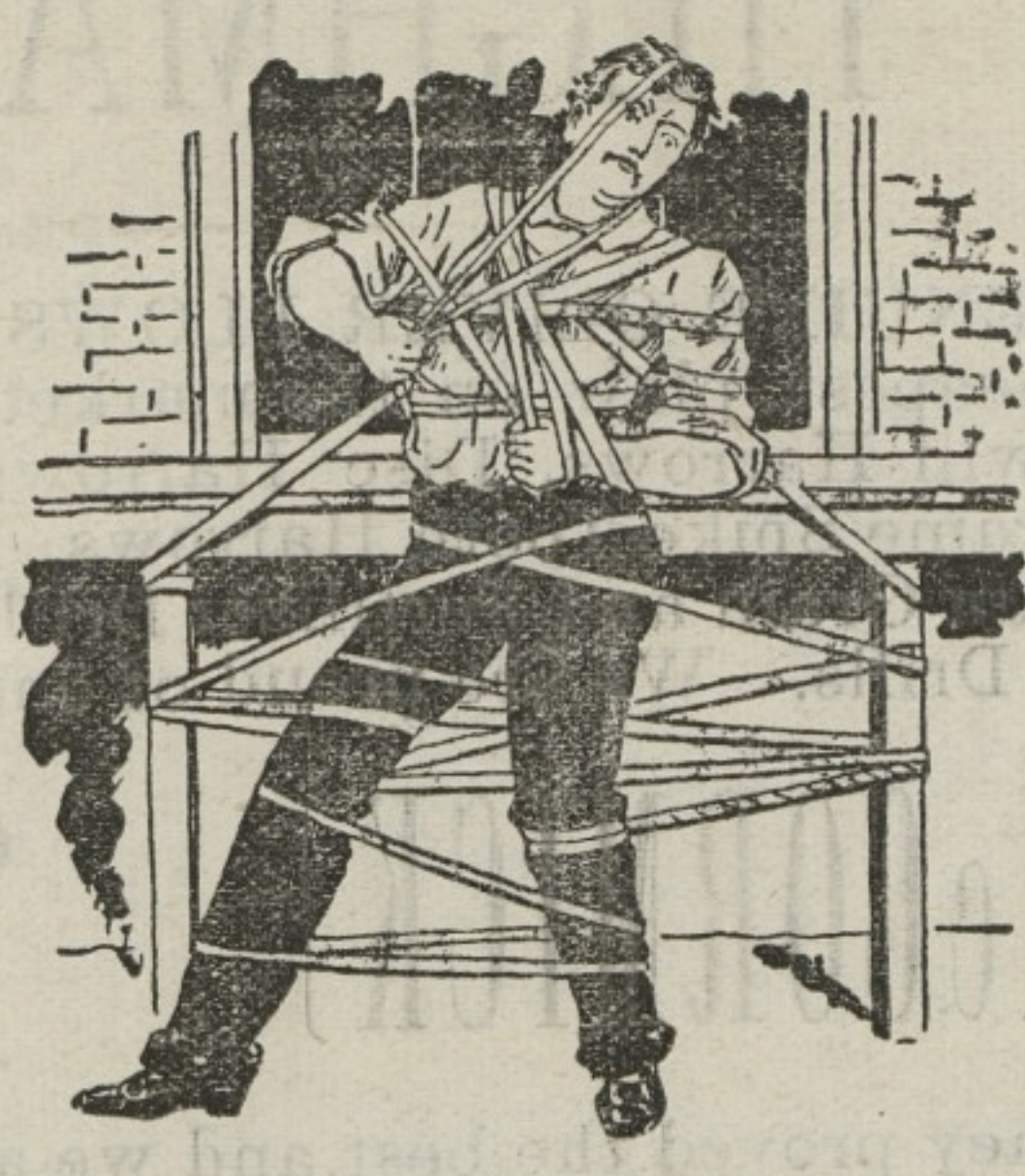

METHODISM AND WORLD'S WORK.

"And so we go blithely like the singing
birds. The spirit of delight in God's
work grows on us. We get our wages

Methodism never exhibited so sane a
view of life as now. We are to be saint-

as if they were draughts from mountain
streams. Not to endure life but to
exult in life and when the quiet angel
smiles (whose name is Death) to go glad-
ly as a woman to meet her lover.

The Church of God, beloved, may
have hope—great, glad, glorious. We
are as a picture I have seen. A woman
martyr's stepping into the arena quite
alone the galleries crowded with faces;
but she must meet the tiger's hungry
anger, quite solitary. She is feeling her
way along the Coliseum wall, and behind
her, near her, a tiger is crouching ready
for his spring, when suddenly a rose
falls at her feet, flung from some un-
known hand in the gallery, and she, for-
getting whither her bare feet walked,
forgetting the cruel beast behind her,
leans against the Coliseum wall with one
sweet woman hand, and lifting the other
to her eyes looks with eager woman
quest to see who threw the rose of mem-
ory (and I wonder if she found the fond
face) which had her in remembrance? We
are so. Our work is here, sweaty
and sometimes bloody, and the tiger of
a wicked world is crouching for a spring,
when at our feet a sweet rose falls, blood
red (His blood hath dyed it crimson);
and we lean and look, and looking, see
the hand which threw it is the hand of
God. And we are comforted."

ROUGH ON THE SINGLE ONES.

Dr. Andrews Says That Bachelors Are Moral

Degenerates.

"Bachelors are moral degenerates
From them emanate most of the sin and
shame of the world. They are lacking
in mental and physical poise. The life
of no individual is complete unless he
or she has a life companion of the op-
posite sex."

Here in a nutshell is the condemnation
pronounced upon the unmarried indi-
vidual by Dr. E. Benjamin Andrews,
chancellor of the University of Nebraska,
in a lecture before the students and
friends of the University of Chicago.

Bachelor men in the audience listened
and looked foolish. Bachelors girls
gasped in embarrassment. The married
took present smiled approval while the
brand of the erudite doctor was being
applied.

"Providence intended that man and
woman should marry," continued the
speaker.

"The world was made for the family
and not for the individual. The unmar-
ried individual of marriageable age has
no place in society nor in the scheme of
the universe. Individuals who do not
form legal ties with the opposite sex
will form illegal ones. The world does
not want that kind of ties. Marriage is
a good thing. The great men and wo-
men of the world—the ones whose lives
were symmetrical and whose works were
best for posterity—have been married."

Speaking of divorces Dr. Andrews
said:

"Hasty marriages do more evil to the
marriage relation than anything else.
Early marriage ought to be discouraged.
No one should marry before the age of
21; 25 is the best age.

"The ease with which divorce is se-
cured in this country is the greatest foe
to marriage, and in fact, creates divorces
which otherwise would not have been
thought of. The injustice done to the
children by a divorce in the family is so
great that no language can do justice to
it. No one who has ever been divorced
can pass through the experience un-
harmful. With it goes the best possibi-
ties of a life of service to this world
never to return.
