THE FAIR A SUCCESS!

A Fine Exhibit of Kent and Queen Anne's Products.

FARM, GARDEN AND ORCHARD.

ATTENDANCE ON THE FIRST DAY ESTIMATED AT 5,000—PRIZES AWARDED IN ALL DEPARTMENTS.

The Kent and Queen Anne County Fair, which opened on Tuesday morning at Tolchester, was a great success. The fair on the opening day was visited by over 5,000 people. Superintendent G. E. Noland and his staff of assistants had everything in fine order by the time the steamers from Baltimore arrived. Despite the drought which has prevailed in Kent and Queen Anne counties, the displays of fruits, cereals and garden products were remarkably good.

The Main Exhibition Hall was where the thousands of ladies found greatest delight. Canned goods, jellies, pickles, tempting cakes, pies and tarts, beautiful and delicate needle work and embroidery, and the myriads of things which only the deft hand of woman can do, gave a charm and interest to this great emporium of exhibits of woman's handiwork. Then, too, the biggest melons, the most luscious peaches, the finest grapes, the yellowest pumpkin and the tallest corn, together with many other products of the farm were in this hall.

The school children's exhibits of free-hand drawing, maps and sewing was very interesting. In fact, several hours could have been profitably spent in the household department.

Medders & Co., of Still Pond, of course had the largest and handsomest individual exhibit of beautiful goods. Mr. Medders was personally in charge, and the restful corner furnished with handsome furniture, elegant rugs and settees, curtains, rockers, etc., was visited by hundreds of tired visitors to the fair.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles J. Keiche entertained hundreds of delighted visitors by rehearsing the merits of the Wheeler & Wilson sewing machine, and showing specimens of its wonderful work.

Mr. James Johns, of Church Hill, exhibited that wonder-worker among churns, the Cyclone.

In the department of agricultural implements, Messrs. George W. Smith, Joseph E. Walters, the Canning and Mercantile Company of Kent, B. F. Fleming, John E. Haddaway, were on hand with fine exhibits.

Turner & Son kept "open house" in their headquarters and had many callers. The exhibit of sheep was exceptionally fine. There was not a big display of cattle, but Judge R. D. Old, of New Jersey, said after judging them that he had found some specimens which would win at any show. There was a good and numerous lot of horses and mules to be seen. Included in the lot were standard breds, general utility, saddlers, etc. There was a fair lot of swine shown.

TUESDAY'S RACING EVENTS. The chief event was a \$1000 stake for the 230 trotters. This was the first of several \$1000 stakes offered by Tolchester, Timonium, Prospect Park, Electric Park and Gentlemen's Driving Park this fall.

The 230 stake had 13 entries, but only six of them faced the starter. Little Belle, owned by Mr. M. H. White, of Herford, of N. C., won her race in straight heats. She has a mark of 2:14. In the first heat the fast little Baltimore mare, Kitty Fisher, made several breaks, and was distanced. Little Belle was favorite in the betting, with Kitty Fisher and Dr. Bookner selling even as second choices. Margie Z., from the Walton Stock Farm, Virginia, was the closest competitor the winners. The track was slow by several seconds, as the weather has been so dry that the course could not be put in its best shape.

Considering the conditions the time made—2:21—was very creditable. The men were much interested in this, the first of the stake races, as it gave them a line to pick a winner for the 230 stake at Timonium next week.

The first race on the card was for the three-minute class of trotters from Kent, Queen Anne and Cecil counties. It had nine entries, but only four started.

Leslie Palmer, a son of Happy George, by Happy Russell, won in straight heats. Leslie Palmer—2:23, a mark made at Easton last week—was driven by Mr. Edward B. Emory. He clearly outclassed his field and won as he pleased in showing. He was a rank favorite in the betting.

The day's racing concluded with a race for 4-year-old pacers. It brought out three of the Happy Russell family. Lord Avon gave Happy Spring a good race. Stella B. was not up to racing form. The farther the pacers went, the faster they went, the last heat being in 1:34 seconds better time than the first.

GREAT IS BEDWORTH, JR.

The Young Kent Courtian Goes in the Sensational Time of 2:06.

Bedworth, Jr., the young Kent county pacer belonging to Mr. William Bell, has become the sensation of the sporting world. After weeks of apparent quiet in the grand circuit the Kent county racer burst like a meteor across the sky, on Wednesday.

Bedworth Jr. 2:14 was entered for his initial appearance in the 2:14 pace at Providence, Rhode Island, on Tuesday. While his friends felt assured that Bedworth could cut seconds off his old record, they were scarcely prepared for his brilliant performance of 2:06 on Wednesday.

This short but comprehensive paragraph told to the world of the new luminary in the list of candidates for a place among the great horses of America.

"Sensational time was made in the 2:14 pacing class, when Bedworth, Jr., hitherto unknown, won two straight heats easily, both in 2:06."

Bedworth has been the most discussed horse ever raised in Kent and is probably the speediest youngster ever foaled in the State.

DEPOT WILL BE MOVED.

To Come Down Town At an Early Date.

Messrs Wilbur W. Hubbard, William E. Valliant and Jefferson D. Bacchus, on Tuesday, called upon Supt. Brooks, at his Philadelphia office, relative to the removal of the Chestertown depot near the business centre of the town. The gentlemen stated to Mr. Brooks that all obstructions in the way of right-of-way to their lot at the foot of Cross street had been practically removed and that the people were anxious to know something definite in the matter.

Mr. Brooks gave the committee audience and assured them that the new depot will be located at the foot of Cross street. A telegram to Mr. Hubbard from Mr. Brooks on Wednesday, stated that the necessary papers were being prepared and that work will commence at the earliest possible date. This it is believed finally and definitely settles the depot location.

Contractor Culp has received no official notification, but has the material in place and is ready to commence work immediately upon orders from headquarters.

Favors Calling a Road Convention to Inspect Permanent Improvement.

Engineers Johnson and Harris, accompanied by Mrs. Johnson, are guests at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. Irving Walker, in Queen Anne. Messrs. Johnson and Harris are over to inspect the fine piece of permanent road improvement which was completed about three weeks ago. They are delighted with the work, and referred to the recent Cumberland road convention as having been attended with excellent results. They think that substantial benefit might attend a road convention to which should be invited the boards of county commissioners of the counties of the Eastern Shore, and all others interested in public road improvement.
