DIOCESE OF EASTON.

Number of Church Members, Etc., Value of Church Properties and Other Figures.

The journal of the thirty-fourth annual convention of the Diocese of Easton shows the following statistics for the parochial year: Families, 2,008; baptized members, 7,704; parishioners, 8,806; baptisms, adults, 16; baptisms infants, 239; confirmed, 156; married, 74; buried, 166; communicants last report, 3,270; communicants added, 235; communicants died, 47; communicants removed, 95; present number of communicants, 3,709.

Sunday school officers and teachers, 277; pupils, 1,805. Churches and chapels are valued at \$293,050 and are insured for \$149,995. The rectories are valued at \$68,700 and insured for \$43,350. There are 114 church organizations and \$28,325 93 invested fund or other property. The receipts from all sources amounted to \$39,661 90. The salaries of rectors amount to \$18,438 57.

At a meeting of the vestry of White-marsh Parish, Trappe, last week, Rev. Edward R. Rich, dean of Trinity Cathedral, Easton, was unanimously called to that parish to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Rev. David Howard, who has accepted Salisbury parish. Dean Rich has not yet decided if he will or will not accept.

GEORGIA'S FINE FRUIT YEAR.

The movement of fruit from Georgia this season is practically over. There is now a daily movement of four or five cars, but this will decrease as the days pass, and it is expected that after a week it will have ceased altogether.

President John M. Egan of the Central said last Tuesday that peaches are moving only from points north of Macon along the line of his road. The bulk of the movement is from along the Chattanooga, Rome and Southern. President Egan, as have all railway officials whose lines have handled much of the fruit business, has been gratified by this season's movement and the excellent results that have been the lot of the growers.

The following is a statement of the movement of peaches, melons, pineapples and cantaloupes via the Central up to August 4, showing the increase this season over last:

Cantaloupes.....	152	77

Watermelons, too, are still moving, but in comparatively small quantities. The movement of pineapples and cantaloupes has now ceased, so far as carload shipments are concerned.

An inspection of the figures will show that this season brought a far greater yield than last. At this time last year the movement was over.—Savannah News.

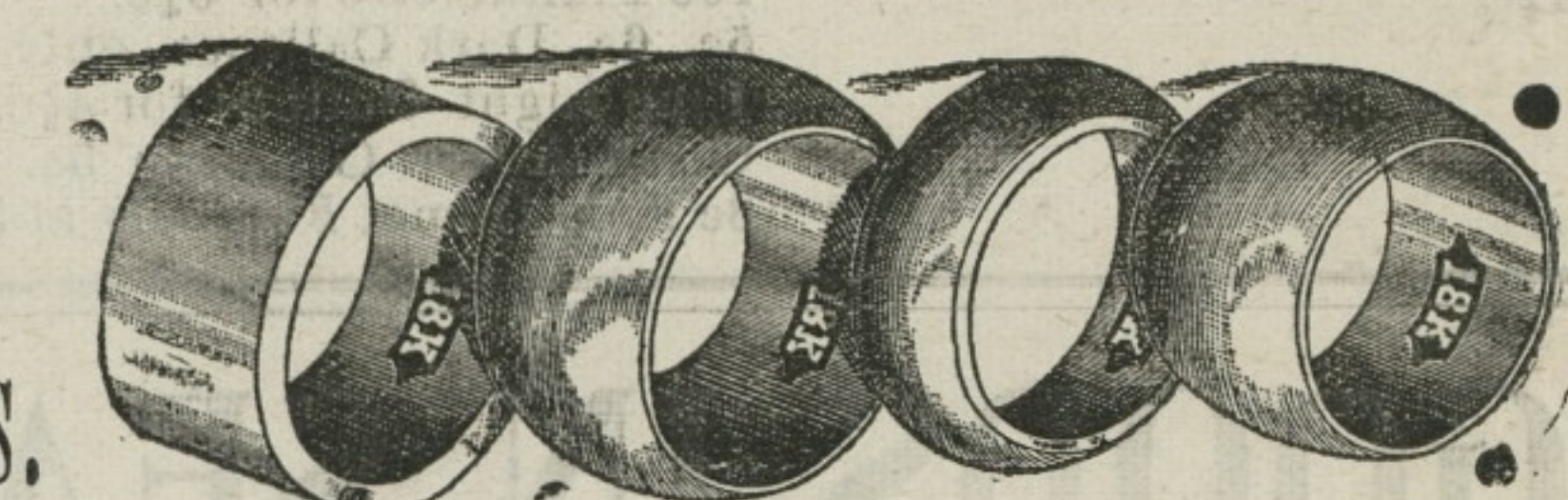

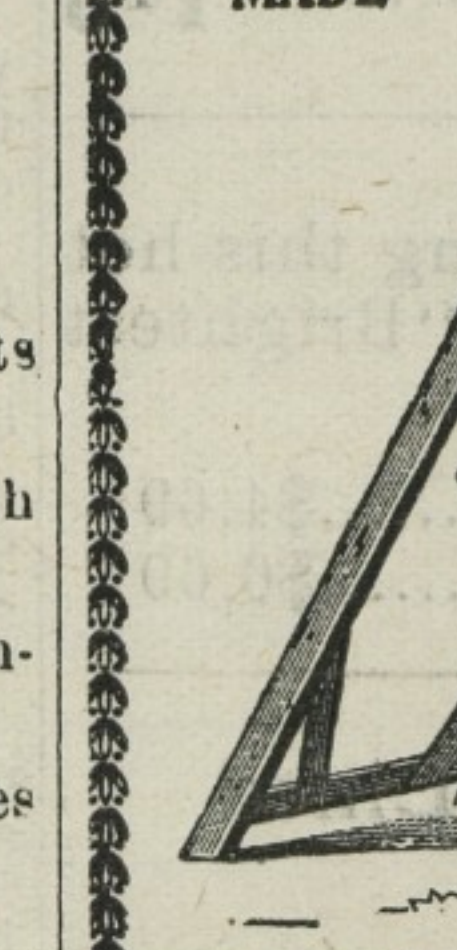
