Three races were on the day's card and each was won in straight heats. The first race was taken cleverly by Minnie Young, dam of the Maryland Futurity candidate, Captain Young. Both are owned by Mr. Thomas Ryan, of Baltimore. The event was for the 2 1/2 pacers, and it was supposed to be a race between George R. Peck and Don Cozine. They were "not in it" deep enough to beat the mare.

The fastest mark they forced her to was 2:19. It was predicted by horsemen that Minnie Young would before the snow flies take a mark better than 2:12. The second number was for the 230 trotters. Music Box, owned by A. H. Tyson, of Wilmington, Del., won in straight heats, with Madina Wood, owned by W. L. Bue, in the place.

The third race was a gift to Tula K. 2:12. It was a 230 stake of \$1,000 and had 24 nominations. Only five of them started and only three survived the third heat. The contest resolved itself into two classes shortly after the start. The first division was composed of the three horses which were placed in the final heat. The other two were well back and racing against each other. Tula K., because of her fast mark, was a rank favorite. She is owned by W. M. Capp, of Ocean, N. Y. It was a high class race. She is entered in six more stakes.
