A practical farmer discussing the reasons for the great demand for horses and mules at this time, attributed it to the fact that a few years ago the horse market was extremely low; the depreciated value of horses in great measure stopped the breeding for colts, and this condition has resulted in a dearth of young horses and leaves the present supply exclusively confined to the older stock.

THURSDAY'S QUOTATIONS.

WHEAT.—The market for southern wheat today was fractionally firmer at the opening, with receipts lighter and demand pretty constant for prime wheats. Sales of cargoes on grade at 72½ cents for No. 2 red, 70½ for 2 red, and 67½ cents for rejected. Small bag lots, by sample, went at 65, 66½, 70, and 72 cents, as to quality and condition.

CORN.—Receipts for today, 2,147 bus., viz., 400 bus. southern and 1,747 bus. western. Shipments from elevators, 10,662 bus. The receipts of southern corn today were light and confined to a few hundred bushels of white, which sold at 63 cents for fly-cut and 66 cents for slightly mixed.

Quote prime white afloat at 67 cents and yellow nominally at 69@70 cents. Demand fair from local dealers for prime corn of both colors. Cob Corn is about steady at \$3.40@3.45 per bu. for carloads prime yellow on spot, with supplies moderate and demand fair in a jobbing way.

FROM ROCK HALL.

The oyster season opened in Kent waters under poor conditions on Monday. The hundreds of oystermen were much disappointed at the result of their first day's oystering. The prices on Swan Point bar were 35 and 40 cents per bushel. The oysters were found to be in poor condition, and an examination of the beds shows that very little growth has been made, and many of the large oysters are found to be dead. The heavy rains and freshets of last spring had a bad effect upon the beds and caused many oysters to die.

Over 1000 licenses have been taken out in Kent, and about the same number in Queen Anne.

Capt. George Satterfield, of the police schooner, Anna B. Smith, says that oysters have made little growth since the close of last season.

The basket factory of George E. Leary & Son has been going at full blast during the entire season. This deservedly popular firm has never had so great a demand for the output of their plant, and had difficulty in meeting the requirements of their patrons.
