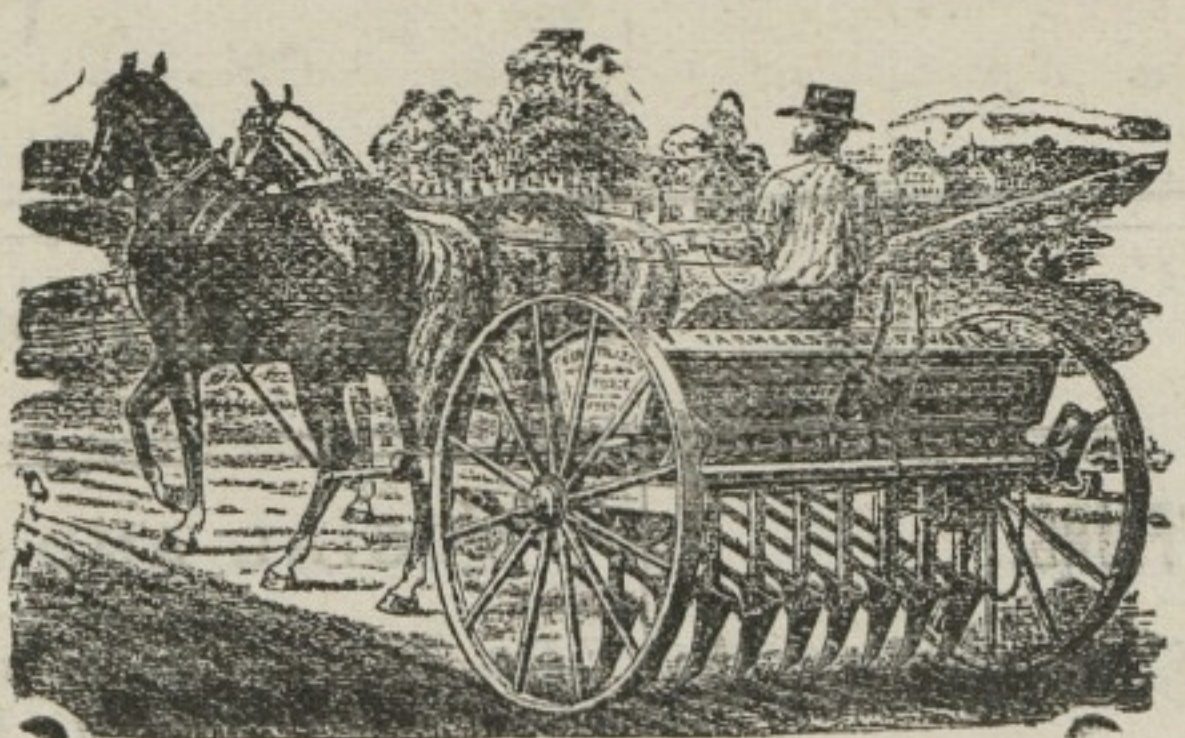


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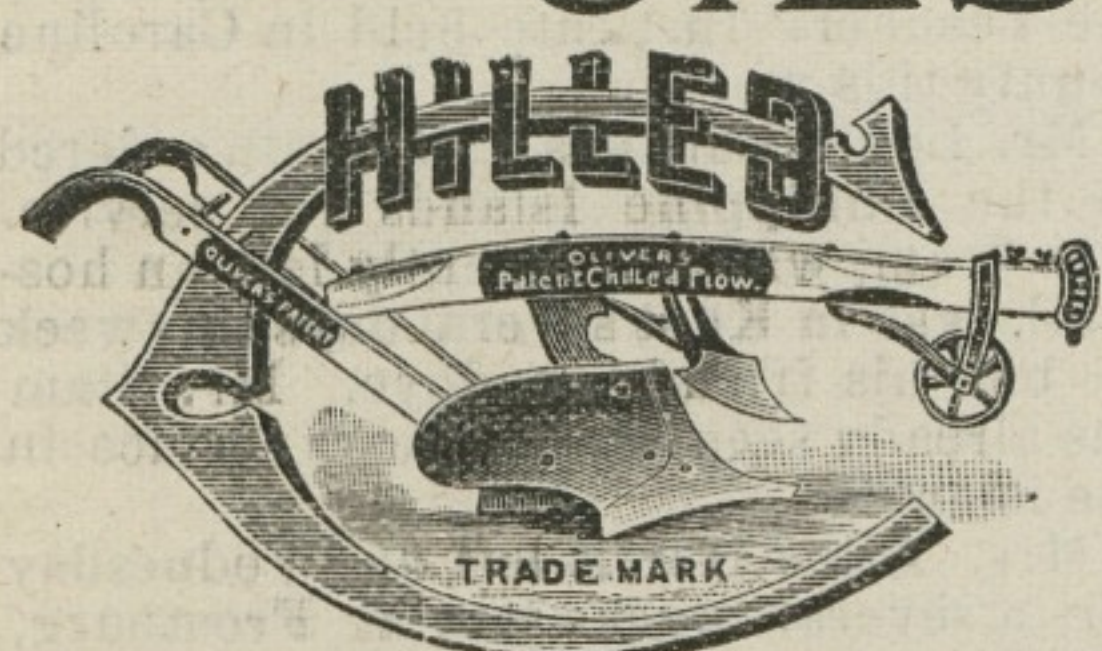

The International Sunday-School Lesson.

THIRD QUARTER. LESSON XI, SEPTEMBER 14, 1902. DEUTERONOMY XXX. 11-20.

LOVING AND OBEYING GOD.

It may be frankly admitted that there is some monotony in the Pentateuch. It is occasioned by the reiteration of considerable portions. Then, too, there is almost infinite detail in directions for personal, priestly and tribal conduct. There are the genealogies, the itineraries, and the divers laws, sanitary, ecclesiastical, and other.

The Pentateuch may be a desert of statutory legislation and inventories of places, things and people. It must be acknowledged, however, that this desert is not lacking in oases. And it is well worth while to cross the barren wastes to come upon these gardens of God. They are unsurpassed, if even matched, in literature, and, without reference to inspiration, are worthy of attention. They are great thoughts set in language in every way worthy of them. At the same time it is only fair to say that even what has been thought the monotonous parts of the Pentateuch are not wanting in suggestiveness. For example, their very monotonous reiterations of prohibitions, penalties and atonements are significant of the inveterateness of human sin.

Among the oases of the five-fold book, what Moses calls "this commandment" will be recognized as one of the chiefest. One is almost startled to come upon it so early in the evolution of Divine truth. We realize that Jesus was not literally issuing a new commandment when he said: "Love God. Love thy neighbor;" but was repeating, with the accent of his own Divinity, this age-old injunction. We are consciously at the root of the whole matter. Back of all law and legislation, love is the ground of obedience. A loveless obedience is vain. It tends to Pharisaism and hypocrisy. Again, God does not wish the obedience of fear. It has been well said that this commandment teaches with burning conviction that God is too ethical and spiritual in nature to accept the submission of a slave. This fundamental principle so early enunciated, which makes love to God the essence of all true obedience of the law, raises men at once to the level of sons of God. To such the law can never be grievous; for to love all things are easy.

Again, in the enunciation of this commandment something extraneous and distant is not appealed to. It is not hidden or far off, not "in heaven" or "over the sea." It is not at an inaccessible height of an unattainable distance. It is within easy reach. It is in man's own conscious and consciousness, the fundamental principle of human nature.

So after all, under this elaborate mechanism of ritual and ordinance a warm heart is found pulsing with spiritual life and power. Love tunes the heart to God, and keeps it in tune. The Berlin Bible says aptly, "Love is in a true sense God's omnipresence;" and with the same meaning Tolstoy affirms, "Where love is, there God is."

THE TRACHER'S LANTERN

This paragraph alone is enough to justify the Old Testament forever from the charge of inutility and effectlessness. Nothing could be more current, nothing more applicable to-day. It is a solvent for the labor problem and all ills, individual and collective. Love solves, heals, establishes. All law depends, in the ultimate analysis, upon love.

One glory of the religion of the Bible is the ease with which it is epitomized. Other religions tend to the multiplex and multifarious, and resist condensation. The true religion finds ample expression in a word of four letters—Love.

The sense in which Jesus gave a new commandment, when he said "Thou shalt love," is this. The average Hebrew had so utterly forgotten it that its reaffirmation was to all intents and purposes the announcement of an original command. It was new to him.

Utterly gone to seed in ritualism had Israel. The letter had killed the spirit. This was Jesus' contention with his countrymen. They were so busy titling mint, anise, and cummin that they forgot to love; hence they were wanting in the other essentials of religion: judgment, mercy, and faith.

The "farewells of Moses" deserve place among the masterpieces of patriotic and religious eloquence. They have undoubtedly had strong molding influence upon national life and character for twenty centuries. The analogy to them of Paul's farewell to the Ephesian elders has been pointed out.

A pathetic interest attaches to the journeys of the wise in quest of truth. They often thought it "beyond the sea," and made toilsome and futile voyages to attain it. They had not heard the benignant saying, "The word is very nigh unto thee, in thy mouth and in thy heart."

No Scripture more clearly enunciates the freedom of the will. "I have set before thee life and death, in that I command thee to love the Lord. But if thine

heart turn away." Freedom is the sole ground of rewardableness or punishableness.

No finer commentary on this paragraph than that of Wellhausen can be found where he says: "Nowhere does the fundamental religious thought of prophecy find clearer expression than in Deuteronomy—the thought that Jehovah asks nothing for himself, but asks it as a religious duty that man should render to man what is right; that God's will lies not in any unknown height, but in the moral sphere which is known and understood by all."

The essential difference between Islamism and Hebraism is apparent at this point. The former stands for absolute unloving power; the latter for obedience in love. The former makes men slaves, the latter makes them sons. The former makes God a tyrant, the latter makes him a father. The former is the appeal to fear; the latter is the appeal to love.

A BIT OF MUSIC AND A MEMORY.

A citizen said as a boy passed whistling cheerily, "The Bonny Blue Flag," I never hear that without a throb of emotion that struggles hard in my throat. I was sitting some years ago on Mrs. Kennedy's stone steps on W. Washington St., when up the way came brigade drum corps, stretching clear across the street and it was playing The Bonny Blue Flag—the Flag With a Single Star. Behind it came compactly several Virginia regiments, men, some barefooted, some hateless and many ragged and bloody, all silent and with faces set ahead, beating out with veteran and precise feet the burden of the music, a fragment of the mighty army Lee led across Maryland to Gettysburg. Boy though I was, my heart stirred within my bosom and I could not look for my tears, tears for the brave, the returning, undaunted and silent brave, so rolling by under the bank flutter of tattering flags and spreading away as some mountain stream that after calimitous falls advances upon the slow levels of extending plains. Right behind was a Georgia regiment and their drum and fife corps, the first fading into the dull July air, thrilling and sobbing, "O Carry Me Back to Ole Virginy." Through the mist I saw them and through the filmy mist of added years I see them still; that bar of reminiscent music brings it all to me so that the remnants of those proud regiments fold up once more over the high hills and roll out to their entrenchments and plainly I hear the requiem hovering in their rear, so pathetically appropriate to the trail of that wrecked army and so suggestive in some way too of a bitter humor, flung disparagingly into the moribund lips of fate.—Hagerstown Mail.
