LOCAL MATTERS.

Town Property Sold.—Mr. Thomas G. Wroth has sold his two mill street houses to Miss Ella H. Wilkins for one thousand eight hundred dollars cash.

Dr. Barnard Won.—In the final shot for the Middletown Shooting Association's medal, Dr. W. E. Barnard broke 22 out of a possible 25 clay pigeons and won the trophy. His nearest competitor, F. Pool, broke 20 out of a possible 25. The former Kent countant won each event of the series.

Sale of Fine Property.—Messrs. W. B. Usilton & Sons have bought of John W. Woodside, Esq., of Philadelphia, the fine Tolchester estate of 1000 acres, for \$25,000. This is one of the finest properties in the county, and has a bayshore frontage of one mile. The new owners get immediate possession and the entire corn crop.

Fire at Hill Top.—A slight fire is reported at Hill Top, the big summer boarding house of Mrs. William Godwin, near Tolchester. Fortunately the fire was discovered in time to prevent any serious damage. Hill Top was crowded with boarders during the past summer and has become one of the widely-known of Kent's summer boarding places.

Collided Near Turkey Point.—The tug "Favorite" and the bay schooner "Maid of the Mist," were in collision on Tuesday, off Turkey Point, in the upper bay. Both vessels were under way and sailing in opposite directions. The "Favorite" had her waist-rail and house damaged to the extent of \$300. The "Maid of the Mist" had her bowsprit and cathead damaged.—*Whig*.

Schools Open.—The public schools of Kent county opened on Monday with, so far as we can learn, a fair attendance of pupils. The old school buildings are being used in Chestertown but it is hoped that satisfactory arrangements can be made for the furnishing and full equipment of the new building, and that it can be occupied some time during the fall.

Kent Oyster Inspectors.—Messrs. Henry N. Greenwood, J. Walter Sutton, Romie Secone, C. C. Kendall, Bartus J. Wilkins and Wm. Secone, will represent Kent county as oyster inspectors in Baltimore during the present season. These gentlemen have gone back for the third time and not one of them has ever had a charge preferred against him. This is certainly a gratifying record.

Team Stolen.—The team of Mr. F. M. Miller was stolen from the colored camp ground near Pomona on Sunday afternoon. Mr. Miller went down to see a colored boy and was not more than an hundred feet from his team any one time, and the longest absence from his team was ten minutes. At about 11 o'clock that night the team was found near the gate of Harrison W. Vickers, Esq., near town. The mare gave evidence of rough usage.

Patent Applied For.—Mr. Thomas DeO. Ruth, of Newark, New Jersey, is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas G. Wroth, Washington avenue. Mr. Ruth has applied for a patent on one of the most unique and effective window screen devices probably ever placed on the market. His small model is that of an absolutely effective screen, slightly, easily worked and it in every respect meets the fullest requirements of a perfect screen. Mr. Ruth is preparing to manufacture and put the screen on the market for next season.

Mr. Gale Not Dead.—The published report of the death of Mr. James Harper Gale, a prominent farmer near Tolchester, was an awkward blunder. Mr. Gale is not dead nor has he been seriously ill of recent date. Several weeks ago he suffered a serious bleeding from the nose, and last week he had a return of the old trouble, but he was in no immediate danger of a fatal termination of the nasal hemorrhage. When seen by the TRANSCRIPT's informant on Wednesday, Mr. Gale was bright and in apparent good health, he was certainly an animated and extremely interesting ghost, in the event that the published statement of death be true. At any rate, Mr. Gale positively refuses to agree to the proposition that anything more serious than the two bleedings from the nose has happened to him.

Mild Winter Predicted.—Prof. C. E. Myers, of the Government Weather Department, is distributing great chunks of consolation to users of coal. The possibilities of a cold winter coupled with the skyward flight of coal prices, has filled the users of coal with dread. The weather man says: "The great quantities of rain that have fallen in this country are due solely to the eruption of Mt. Pelee and other interior volcanic disturbances. He says that the summer season in this section will be prolonged until late in the fall. He also predicts a mild winter. His theory is that the volume of water which fell during May, June and July cannot be evaporated from the earth during the summer months and that the water being in the earth will hold the summer heat far into the winter. Truly there is balm for every ill.

A New Corn.—Among numerous other experiments made by Mr. H. P. Skipper, on his farm opposite Chestertown in Queen Anne, is the growing of a curious variety of corn. The grain grows on the extreme top and looks almost identical with the seed of broom corn. The grains are perfectly round, about half the size of a pea, and flinty and round. Mr. Skipper says it is excellent for feeding to poultry and is a prolific producer.

Improved Telephone Service.—The telephone cable crossing the bottom of the Chesapeake bay from Love Point to a point in Anne Arundel county has been completed, and with the finishing of the work comes more satisfactory and cheaper telephone communication with Baltimore City and western shore towns. Instead of 85 cents it now costs but 50c. for a three minute talk with parties in Baltimore city. By the new route the voice of the speaker in Baltimore and *vice versa*, can be distinctly heard and understood. This is certainly a great advance step in our local telephone service.

Gave Her Friends a Surprise.—Miss Grace Virginia Greenwood, gave her parents and friends a genuine surprise on Thursday by announcing her marriage, in Washington D. C. by Rev. Bishop, to Mr. H. J. Brady, a prominent young druggist of Gatesville N. C. Miss Greenwood is the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank H. Greenwood, of Chestertown. She had always declared that she would take her family by surprise in the matter. While there was an "inkling" that matters were serious, no one at home had an idea that Miss Greenwood was so soon to become Mrs. Brady or Mrs. anyone else. Mr. and Mrs. Brady will make their future home in Gatesville, where the groom is in business.

Big Money in Tomatoes.—Those Kent county tomato growers who did not contract with packers, are reaping handsome returns. One gentleman has already marketed 600 baskets from a patch of an acre and a quarter and has at least 400 baskets yet to be gathered. The general average per basket has been thirty cents. Some of his fruit sold for as low as twenty cents but other shipments have ranged from forty to forty-five cents. Should he harvest his expected 1,000 baskets and keep up his average, his returns from the one acre and a quarter will be \$300. Another grower from a much larger patch reports his average as thirty cents per basket. At this rate the tomato outdistances the keiffer pear as a money producer, and as for peaches, wheat and corn, they are not to be mentioned.

Attempted Burglary.—Evidently the officers have not gotten all of the parties responsible for the series of petty burglaries in Chestertown recently. Mrs. J. Cordray Loud was awakened at about 2 o'clock on Sunday morning by a noise at her bedroom window. A light was burning at the time and she plainly saw a man's arm inside her window. She called Mr. Loud who was asleep in an adjoining room in time for him to see the receding form of the intruder from the window. An investigation disclosed that the fellow first entered the dining room on the first floor, but the door of this room being fastened from the outside he then attempted an entrance through the second story window which was reached by means of a shed in the rear. While Mrs. Loud could not identify the man because she saw only his arm and shoulder, she is sure he was a colored man and wore a wide striped shirt.

Terror Stricken Passengers.—A state of panic prevailed on the Tolchester steamer on Saturday. When in the middle of the bay the new torpedo destroyer came along on her trial trip. The boat was going at terrific speed and carried a mountain like wave at her head. The first intimation which the Tolchester steamer's passengers had that anything unusual was going on was when their boat commenced to roll and plunge in the waves. In an instant a confusion. One lady fainted, others shrieked in their despair, others declared that the fortune teller's prediction that the big steamer was to be lost had come true, and some prayed for deliverance from a watery grave. A passenger who was on board says that she never before saw anything like it. The trifling tempest was soon over and the frightened passengers were left to quietly compare notes and laugh at their groundless fears.

Still Having Trouble.—The Kent and Cecil Light, Power and Railway Company, which has a franchise from the County Commissioners of Cecil to build a trolley line from the Delaware State line to Chesapeake City via Elkton, received a setback on Tuesday by the City Council of Newark, Del., refusing to allow them the right to use the streets of that town. President of the company, Judge R. B. Cochran, Jr., of Wilmington; Edgar M. Tannis, of the Tannis Construction Company, of Philadelphia; and Henry M. McCullough, of Elkton, were before the Cecil County Commissioners on Tuesday and stated that they were ready to put up \$1500 with the Commissioners as soon as they had favorable action at the hands of the Newark Council, as a guarantee that the road will be completed within nine months. The Town Commissioners of Chesapeake City on Tuesday granted the company the use of the streets of that town.

Recruiting Office.—Recruiting Officer Corporal Robert Clarke, reports that five applicants for examination for service in the United States Army have been turned down, but that two who were examined yesterday he expects to pass. He is an enthusiastic advocate of the advantages offered by the army to young men, and is hopeful that Kent may send her quota of recruits before his work here is finished. The privates in the army are paid \$13 per month together with board, clothes and medical attention for three years. The recruits amount to about 200 per month, just about equal to the number who resign or leave the army.

Colored Woman Shot.—Oneida Lindsay, a colored woman living in Quaker Neck, was seriously shot at a colored camp, near Pomona, at about 10 o'clock on Sunday night. The woman was walking at the time with a man named G. S. Allen. A sound was heard in the darkness as of some one rushing past on a bicycle. Closely following this two pistol shots were fired one of which took effect in the woman's shoulder, entering from the rear. The bullet, judging from the wound, was made by a 33 calibre weapon. The ball followed the flesh part of the shoulder, lodging in front of the shoulder blade. The woman was brought to Chestertown and Dr. H. G. Simpers probed for the ball. Allen and a negro, named James Smith are in jail awaiting a hearing. The evidence in the case is largely circumstantial.

Under Many Difficulties.—Santelli's circus exhibited at Chestertown on Tuesday under difficulties. The cages and wagons were unloaded during a gale of wind and heavy downpour of rain, and the tents were raised under similar conditions. The bright sunshine between about 11 o'clock A. M. and 3 o'clock P. M. lured several hundred people under the monster 3-ring tent, but a gale of wind and dashing rain just when the performance had commenced almost totally emptied the tent, and many of those who left did not return. The animals in the menagerie were in fine condition, the horses, numbering about one hundred, were decidedly above the average, and the performance was excellent. The attendance at night was slim owing to weather conditions. The arrival of the circus at Elkton on Thursday was late owing to a slight wreck to part of their train near Octoraro Junction, on the Baltimore and Central Railroad. The show had exhibited at Oxford, Pa., on Wednesday, and was coming to Elkton via Port Deposit and Perryville. A projecting rack in the deep cut near Rowlandville struck several cages containing animals and birds on a gondola car, and wrecked them. Several monkeys, two kangaroos, and a number of parrots escaped. The monkeys, kangaroos and several of the parrots were later captured.

Dr. Henry B. Martin, rector of Emmanuel Protestant Episcopal Church, returned from his summer vacation yesterday, and will occupy his pulpit to-morrow morning and evening.

Christ M. P. Sabbath school will observe next Sunday as Rally Day. An interesting program is being prepared for the evening service.

Rev. A. H. Covey, pastor of Bond M. E. Church was unable to fill his pulpit Sunday morning on account of a severe attack of facial neuralgia.

Rev. E. P. Roberts, on Sunday evening preached the first of a series of sermons on the "Lord's Prayer," which will be continued at the evening services for several Sundays.

The Bates Memorial M. P. Church was dedicated at Snow Hill on Monday. The edifice cost about \$15,000 and was named in honor of the late Rev. Laurence W. Bates.

Messrs. J. Raymond Bowers and W. C. A. Thompson continue in possession of a fish trust down the Chester. They bring home enormous catches of fine perch while their friends totally fail to locate the finny game.

Fishing on the Betterton grounds has been poor this summer. Purse-net fishermen have made heavy shipments of fine fish however, from the Betterton wharf. Unless something is promptly done Betterton will be shorn of its former glory.

Gentlemen were in town last week looking for a property in which to open a stationery store.

The festive oyster is now in evidence at \$1.00 per gallon.

The corn cutter is now the one great thing in demand.

The public school children were presumed to have patriotic thoughts at school yesterday.

A partial peach basket famine still prevails in Kent. Local factories could have sold a million and a half more baskets had they been able to meet the demands.

The 27 young horses sold at Millington on Saturday averaged a trifle over \$48 each. Millington had a horse sale, sheep sale and circus, all on the same day.

AN ARISTOCRAT IN DOGDOM.

Mr. McMenamin's "Blue-Blooded" Gordon.

Mr. D. B. McMenamin, of Washington Avenue, has probably the bluest-blooded Gordon setter puppy on the Eastern Shore, perhaps in the State. Lara, a three-months-old daughter of "Ned Mayer," A. K. S. B. No. 40,324, and "Wenonah," A. K. S. B. No. 54,881, has a duly authenticated pedigree tracing back on unbroken lines through more than twenty generations of Champions, both in the "field" and on the "bench," directly to the stud of the Duke of Gordon, whence the name of the breed, and including on the way Col. Robert J. Burdette's famous "Brougham," 1874; "Old Kent," 1600, and a number of other equally famous American-bred dogs, and strains from Prince Albert's kennels and those of the Marquis of Hastings and Sir Matthew Ridley.

Lara's maternal grand-dam, Lady Gordon, A. K. C. Champion, has a record of twenty-two first prizes at leading bench-shows of this country and abroad, while "Gip," A. K. S. B. No. 40,416 has won at the Chicago, St. Louis and Philadelphia shows. Wenonah, Lara's dam, won in Philadelphia two years ago, and two seconds and one third in New York, her full brother and sister winning over her. In Philadelphia last year she won first. "Teddy" A. 60,875, Lara's full brother, went to the Pan-American Exposition against matured dogs, when only sixteen months old and won second; the dog that won over him having been imported at a cost of three thousand dollars. "Teddy" A. was subsequently a winner at Newark, N. J., and at Atlantic City.

Lara was bred by Hon. B. W. Andrews, of Woodbury, N. J., (also owner and breeder of Gip, Wenonah, Bessie A., Teddy A., etc.) one of the most noted amateur breeders of Gordon Setters in America, and selected by him in gratification of a desire manifested by Mr. McMenamin, when a very small boy, for one of Mr. Andrews' Gordon Setters. Mr. Andrews pronounces the long-awaited one a perfect specimen, and it is among the very strong probabilities that if all plans carry well and she is exhibited, Lara, also, will win the proud distinction of "Champion."

Lara is a very silky black, marked in perfect balance, with a dull-flame spot over each eye, and throat and paws of the same hue, and she is withal a very vigorous, playful, affectionate puppy.

BEDWORTH, JR.—CHAMPION.

The Young Kent County Horse had a Walk-over at Pimlico and Won in 2.08 1/2

Bedworth, Jr. has again won in a jog among the fast ones of the grand circuit. The young Kent countant went in the 214 pace, purse 1,500, at Pimlico, on Thursday. The race was to have taken place on Wednesday but was postponed to Thursday.

Here is the way the Baltimore papers tell of Bedworth's latest achievement.

The Sun, under the caption, "Bedworth is true Blue," says:

"Bedworth, Jr., the Delaware horse who was well known to the Baltimore talent because of his performances on the local tracks, was such a strong favorite in the 214 pace that no pools could be sold in the betting before the races. Before the first heat of the race a few dollars were put up, Bedworth, Jr., \$25, the field \$4. For the heats he was a favorite at from 1 to 7 to 1 to 10, and a good deal of money backed him. He justified the confidence, going out to win in the first heat and leading the field to the wire by a length. Dora Delpha, who was a powerful favorite for the place, was a good second. Hazel Pointer was third and Heloise, W. J. Martin's black mare, was fourth."

"Dora Delpha forced Bedworth, Jr., along at a lively clip in the second heat to the three-quarters, where she had to give up, while Bedworth jogged home with two lengths to the good, nearly distancing Heloise and Hazel Pointer. No time was wasted by Bedworth, Jr., in the third heat, and he again went to the front early, winning under a pull, with Dora Delpha second. Heloise went to pieces and was distanced."

The Sun is off in its statement that Bedworth, Jr., is a Delawarean. He was sired by Mr. Edward B. Emory's Bedworth, 2,221. His dam was a running mare which Mr. Bell purchased in Baltimore several years ago and it is said she never lost a race, say once when she broke down, and Mr. Bell bought her as a brood mare. Bedworth, Jr., is now the property of Mr. Bell's son, William Bell, of Chestertown.

Under the suggestive heading "Nothing like Bedworth, Jr.," The American said:

"There was simply nothing to the 214 paces but Bedworth, Jr. Bedworth, Jr., is the fastest harness horse owned and raised in Maryland, and carries with him widespread interest of Maryland horsemen, especially those of the Eastern Shore. He is in charge of Dr. J. C. McCoy, of Kirkwood, Del., and is marked at 2.06 1/2, and can turn off 2.05 whenever they get ready to send him along. Bedworth, Jr., was bred, raised and is still owned by W. A. Bell, of Chestertown, Md., and to many at the track was the most interesting horse in the races. Bedworth, Jr. was such a hot favorite that the Eastern Shore delegation had little encouragement to get down their money. This race was the tamest of the day, as Bedworth won like a shot off a shovel. Dora Delpha was just as emphatically second in each heat, and Hazel Pointer third. The first heat was in 2.08 1/2. After that Bedworth, Jr., was slowed up."

The Herald said yesterday: "Favorites also won in the other two races of the afternoon, making three straight for the talent. Bedworth, Jr., was such a hot favorite in the second event—the 214 class pace—that he was barred in the pools and Dora Delpha was backed against the rest of the field at \$25 against \$15. Every heat was easy for Bedworth, Jr. Dora Delpha put up a pretty good fight to the three-quarters in the first heat, but couldn't stand the pace and Bedworth, Jr., won without any more effort. Dora Delpha won second in the driving finish with Hazel Pointer. In the second heat Dora Delpha again fought gamely to the three-quarters, when Bedworth, Jr., stepped out and was two lengths ahead coming down the stretch. Both pulled up to allow the rest of the field to get inside the distance flag. In the third heat a similar performance resulted, with the exception that Heloise was distanced."

COMMISSIONERS MET.

The Gentlemen Appointed to Investigate Cerebro Spinal Meningitis in S-ssion.

A meeting of the commission appointed by Governor Smith to investigate the disease known as Cerebro Spinal Meningitis, met at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, in Baltimore, Wednesday of this week. The State was divided into districts. Dr. Hill, of St. Mary's county, was assigned to the southern and western counties; Dr. Bollock, the upper and western counties of the Western Shore; Mr. Walker, the counties above the Choptank and Dr. Derrickson the counties below the Choptank.

All persons having horses affected or knowing of the existence, now or in the future, of this disease, or any other disease that is epidemic, are requested to communicate with that member of the commission in whose district the disease occurs, as soon as the animals are attacked, when expert examination and investigation will be commenced. It is desired by the commission that all cases during 1900, 1901 and 1902 be reported to them with the statement of the number of deaths resulting and number of cases cured.

The commission is fortunate in having the Laboratory of the Johns Hopkins Hospital at its disposal for investigation outlined by Dr. Wm. H. Welch, the eminent pathologist of the Hopkins, who is chairman of the commission.

It is to be hoped results will be obtained by the discovery of the cause and cure of this disease which has killed so many of the horses of the country, proving such a loss to the farmers.
