LOCAL MATTERS.

Mr. Hicks' Accident.—Undertaker William T. Hicks, of Galena, met with a painful accident during the interment of Mrs. James Donohoe in St. Denis cemetery, on Saturday. Mr. Hicks stepped to a disadvantage and broke a bone of the ankle. He has since been compelled to use crutches.

Sale of Town Lots.—Auctioneer J. H. Greenwood sold for Thomas S. Bordley, administrator of the late John Bordley, a number of small houses and lots located on Calvert street. Lot No. 1 was bought by Mrs. Grace Bordley for \$175; lots No. 2, 3, 4, and 5 were bought by Mr. M. A. Toulson for \$600.

Officers Elected.—At a meeting of the Athletic Association of Washington College this week, E. F. Hitch was elected manager of the football team, and H. P. Porter assistant manager. T. F. Garey was elected manager of the baseball team, and G. M. Merriken assistant manager.

Livery Business Sold.—Mr. Alexander Mair, has sold his livery business at Betterton to Messrs. Frank Young and Charles Brice. Both gentlemen are hustlers and will give the business a boom. Mr. Mair will build a pretty hotel in time for next season and devote his entire attention to it. Messrs. Young and Brice will take charge October 1.

Mr. Tate came over on the steamer, but because of the inclemency of the weather, took for granted that there would be no audience and immediately returned to the city. The attendance would have been small probably, but there would have been an audience had Mr. Tate filled his engagement. Messrs James T. Anthony and Ramsey Anthony, M. A. Toulson and Harry Jefferson, went to Still Pond and were greatly disappointed.

Found His Money.—Mr. Chas. Maul, a brother of Mr. W. R. Maul, of Chestertown, had a rather unusual experience on the occasion of the visit of Sautelle's circus at Millington recently. Mr. Maul went to the circus with his children, and took from his vest pocket two ones and a ten dollar note when paying for the tickets. After paying for the tickets he of course, intended to return the ten dollar bill and a one dollar note to his pocket. He did not attend the circus but immediately returned to his home. After having been at home fully two hours he discovered that the eleven dollars were not in his pocket. Church Dedication.—Contractor W. L. Fowler is pushing the work of painting as rapidly as possible to avoid disappointment in the date of two dedications. It is now proposed, barring disappointments, to dedicate the pretty new church at Lynchs, on Sunday, October 19. Remodeled St. James will, it is expected, be rededicated on the following Sunday, October 26. The Lynch's church will be painted a stone body, olive green trimmings. A rope was finally gotten over her head and she was guided just above the Cori-ox's wharf where safe and easy landing could be made. As the cow was being guided along the wharf, a prominent young society man of Chestertown in watching the performance deliberately walked overboard in the darkness and came up just beside the frightened cow. It is difficult to say which was the more red, the cow or the young man. No one has ever yet seen how the gentleman escaped from the river—but he escaped.

NOT HOLLEY BUT WALLEY.

Hard Head Saved Negro's Life—An Accident, not Attempted Suicide, Says the Man.

The matter of the recent shooting near Coleman's, has been peculiarly mis-reported. In the first place, the man shot was Alexander Walley, not Isaac Holley as reported. Holley is well and apparently doing well, while Walley has been in a Baltimore hospital as a result of the shooting.

The man's life was certainly saved by the thickness of his skull. By his own statement the pistol, a .38 calibre weapon was near the side of his head when the cartridge exploded. The ball was made perfectly flat and broken in two pieces by coming in contact with Walley's skull, but the man was not seriously injured, only a severe flesh wound being inflicted. Walley says he did not mean to commit suicide. His statement is that he was at home sick and took down the pistol to examine it; while thus engaged some one drove up to the house startling him so that he dropped the pistol, and in picking it up hastily it was discharged near his head. Some insist that the shooting was a clear case of attempted suicide, the result of reverses in his tomato growing operations, the loss of a horse, etc., Walley, however, says no.

Walley has for several years been cultivating tomatoes for Mr. James G. Harris. This year his crop is large and he was having trouble in getting his crop picked; his horse died and troubles beset him. The man was evidently greatly worried over his tomato crop. This is said to be the first case on record where a colored man was forced to suicide, granting that this was a case of the kind.

THE PACER BEDWORTH, JR.

A Chestertown Stallion That Shows Great Speed in his Races.

The Baltimore Sun of yesterday had, accompanied by a fine double column cut, the following interesting sketch of Bedworth, Jr.

"Among the entries for the free-for-all at the Gentlemen's Driving Park race meet, Bedworth, Jr. is a 7-year-old Irish pacer stallion, owned and bred by W. A. Bell, of Chestertown, Md.

"Mr. Bell started the horse in races in 1900. That year Bedworth, Jr. faced the starter three times. He won one race, was third in another, and fourth in the other. He took a mark of 2.14 in a seven-heat event, winning the last three heats.

"In 1901 he started nine times, winning eight firsts and one second. In the race in which he was second he was beaten by Laocade, 2.07. In 1901 Bedworth, Jr., lowered his mark to 2.14.

"In 1902 he started three times, winning all his races in straight heats, and reducing his mark to 2.06. His record was made at Providence, R. I., when he won two heats each in 2.06. At Hartford, Conn., he won a first heat in 2.10, second in 2.08, and third in 2.07.

"At the Pimlico meeting two weeks ago the stallion won in straight heats in 2.08, 2.16, 2.09.

"Bedworth, Jr., is a favorite in his race at Gentlemen's Driving Park, but he will have fast company in Effie Powers, 2.08; Gypsy Red, Alvina Wikes, Pilot Medium Jr., Cinch, J. C. T. and Prince A., all good class horses on a half-mile track."

"This last race was postponed because of rain and will be on the card as soon as track conditions will permit.

In commenting on the free-for-all and Bedworth's appearance in it, the Baltimore Sun on Monday said:

"The star event will probably be the free-for-all on Thursday, when Effie Powers will meet, among others, Bedworth, Jr., the Eastern Shore nag that carries all the available loose money of his section when he starts.

"At Pimlico he was such a strong favorite in the 2.14 pace that he was barred in the betting. He justified the action by winning in three straight heats, the best time being 2.08. The struggle between this pair should be one of the best ever seen on a local half-mile track.

Another strong entry in the race is Nerva Patchen, who will make the field betting uncertain.

"In this race Dr. H. L. Tubbs will be behind his splendid stallion, Pilot Medium, Jr., but it is not thought that the Doctor stands much of a show to get first money. Gypsy Red, with whom Larry Gray has won enough money this season to buy a whole ton of coal, is also entered, and while she will add interest to the race the critics do not expect her to finish ahead of Effie Powers and Bedworth, Jr."

The market for southern corn today was quiet and about steady, with receipts light and confined exclusively to white, which sold at 63 and 65 cents for bag parcels, fly-cut. Quote prime corn float nominally at 65¢60¢ for white and 60¢70¢ for yellow. Demand fair from local dealers for corn of both colors.

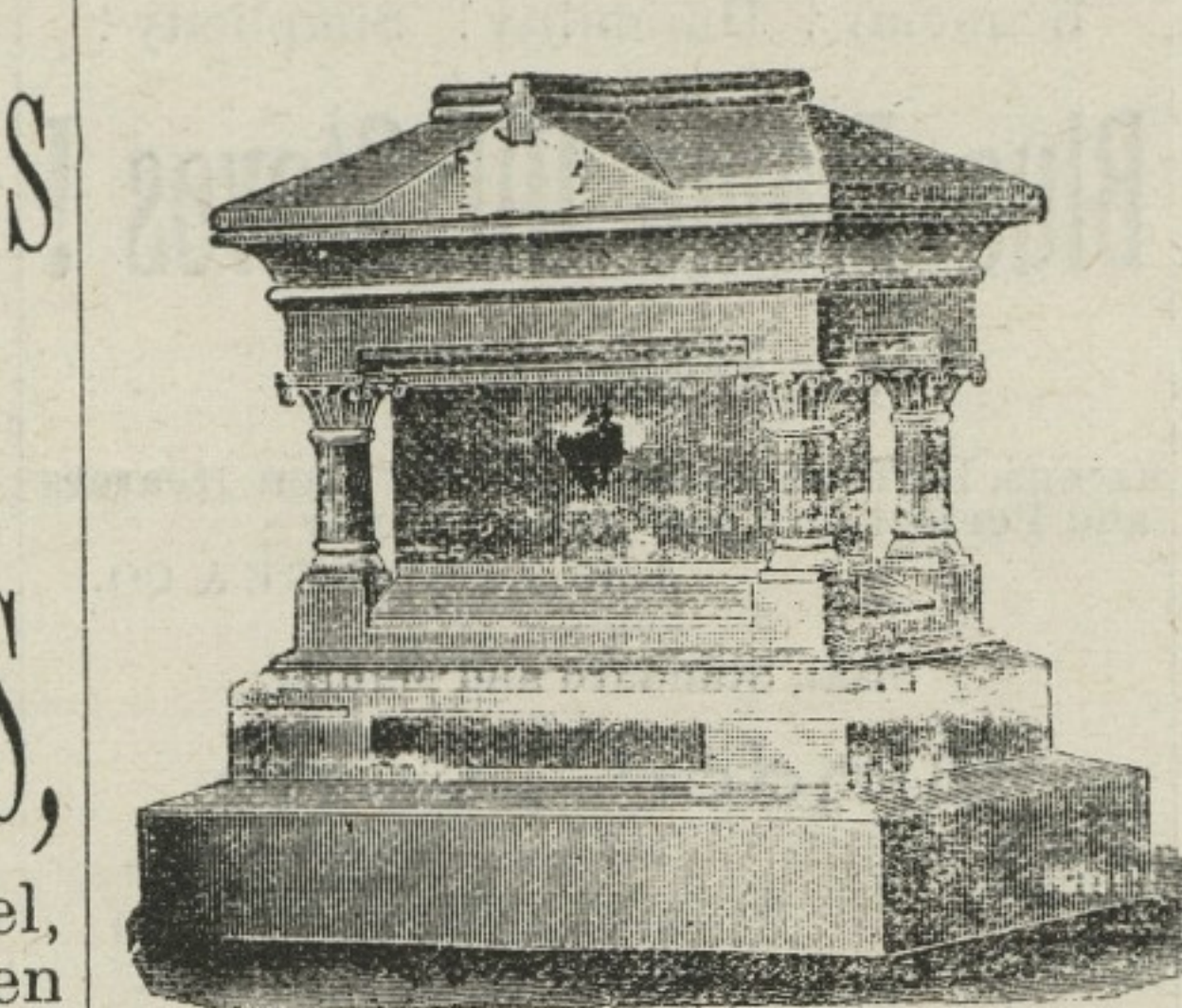
