IN THE CHURCHES.

Change of Hours of Services--Visits of Bishop Adams.

Owing to rainy weather the festival
and supper at Wesley Chapel did not
take place, but will be held Saturday
next, Oct. 11. No ladies in Kent county
know better how to please the inner
man than the Wesley Chapel ladies.

The hours for the opening of evening
services in Emmanuel Protestant Episco-
pal church, Dr. Henry B. Martin, rector,
has been changed from 8 o'clock P. M.
to 7.30 P. M.

The hour for Sunday School, com-
mencing with to-morrow, will be 2.30 P.
M. instead of 9.45 A. M., as during the sum-
mer months.

Bishop William Forbes Adams, of the
Diocese of Easton, will preach in Em-
manuel Protestant Episcopal church,
Chestertown, to-morrow evening, at 8.00
o'clock.

The Right Reverend Bishop Adams,
D. D., will preach and administer the
Apostolic rite of "Laying on of Hands,"
in old St. Paul's church, at 10.30 A. M.
sharp, to-morrow, Sunday, Oct. 5th.
He will also, punctually, at 2.30 P. M.,
preach, and dedicate the memorial stone
lately placed on General Philip Reed's
grave at I. U. As a tribute of loyal re-
spect to this once loved citizen of Kent
county, and deserving old hero, every
citizen who can, ought to attend the
solemn dedication and unveiling of his
memorial slab.

Rev. Benjamin A. Bryan, formerly of
Kent county, has accepted a call to a
Methodist Protestant church at Ells-
worth, Ill. He preached his first sermon
to his congregation last Sunday. Rev.
Mr. Bryan graduated last May at the
American University, Harriman, Tenn.,
standing very well in his class. He is a
son of Mr. R. M. Bryan, of Kent, and a
brother of Rev. J. F. Bryan, who has
occupied several pulpits in Baltimore
city. Rev. J. F. Bryan is now in charge
of a church in Georgetown, Del.

Harvest Home Anniversary will be
held at Wesley Chapel, Oct. 12.

Protracted meetings will begin at
Kesley, in Broad Neck, next Sabbath
night. No services in the afternoon.
A Rally Exercise by the Jr. Christian
Endeavor Union was held at Christ M.
P. Church last Sunday night. The pro-
gram was very interesting.

The improvements to the interior of
the Chestertown M. E. Church are nearly
completed. The re-opening is announced
for Sunday, October 12. On the same
day a Rally or reunion of the Sabbath
school will be held.

Rev. Robert K. Stephenson, pastor of
the Elkton Methodist Episcopal Church,
but formerly pastor of the Millington
M. E. Church, announced to his con-
gregation on Sunday that he had decided
to accept the call to the pastorate of
Scott Methodist Episcopal church, Wil-
mington, Del., for the coming confer-
ence year, subject to the decision of the
presiding bishop. Mr. Stephenson is
serving out his second year at Elkton,
and the official board of the church has
unanimously asked for his return for
another year. He is very popular with
his congregation, which is opposed to
his making a change. He will succeed
the late Rev. Walter E. Avery at Scott
Church, which is now supplied by Rev.
John France. He is a native of Cecil
county and has served a number of im-
portant charges on the Maryland and
Delaware peninsulas, the more important
being Snow Hill, Barratt Chapel, Trappe,
Millington, Smyrna Circuit, Crisfield
and Seaford, Del. The salary of the
Wilmington church is \$1,200 per year—
\$200 more than is paid by the Elkton
Church.

WASHINGTON COLLEGE ATHLETICS.

Foot Ball Team Weakened by Accident to Mr. Jefferson.

Mr. Norman Jefferson, one of the fin-
est athletes at Washington College, and
one of the ends of the present foot ball
team, broke his leg while engaged in
practice work on Wednesday afternoon.
Captain Garey had his men in the
field for practice; the more vigorous
tactics had been gone through with, and
when one of the players struck his leg
to a disadvantage and the small bone of
the leg between the ankle and the knee
snapped like a pipe stem. Dr. Harry
G. Simpers was summoned and reduced
the fracture. Mr. Jefferson's leg has
been put in a plaster cast and in a few
days he will be able to move around.
Under the most favorable conditions
however, he will be unfitted to go into
active play with the foot ball team this
fall, and unless some undeveloped ma-
terial among the new men can be gotten
in form, his absence will be seriously
felt.

Some fine foot ball material, as well as
strong candidates on the spring's base
ball nine, has been found among the
new students and the respective captains
are figuring on putting game-winning
teams in the field when the seasons
formally open. The personnel of the
football team for 1902, so far as deter-
mined upon, is: T. F. Garey, captain.
Stephens, centre; Garey and Beck,
guards; Moore and Deputy, tackles;
Jefferson and Walls, ends; Hitch, quar-
ter-back; Crew, right half-back; Car-
mine, full back.

The weight average of the team will
be light—not more than one hundred
and fifty pounds.

The team will go into the fall cam-
paign splendidly equipped with new
suits, nose guards, shin guards and head
guards.

Among other teams on the schedule
for games this fall are: Dover Academy,
Delaware College, St. John's College
and Maryland Agricultural College.

THE DATES FIXED.

The Slab For the Grave of General Reed to be Dedicated To-morrow—The Battle Marker to be Unveiled and Dedicated on Saturday, October 18.

All preliminary arrangements having
been completed the formal dedication of
the slab over the grave of General Philip
Reed, the hero of Caulk's Field, and the
unveiling of the Battle Marker on the
scene of the battle, is in order.

The granite slab over the grave of
General Reed in I. U. cemetery, will be
dedicated by Bishop William Forbes
Adams, tomorrow afternoon at 3.30
o'clock. Bishop Adams will preach a
sermon and dedicate the grave slab, after
which Rev. Chris. T. Denroche, rector
of the church, will make an address.
Suitable music will be a pleasant fea-
ture of the exercises.

THE BATTLE MARKER.

The date set for the unveiling of the
Battle Marker on Caulk's Field is Sat-
urday, October 18, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.
when the following program will be
carried out:

Invocation, Dr. D. L. Greenfield, Pastor of
Christ M. P. Church, Chestertown.
History of the movement, Rev. Chris. T. Den-
roche, rector of Old St. Pauls and I. U.
Singing, "My Country 'Tis of thee, (chorus)
W. W. Chapman, leader.
Selection of the Stones and Inscriptions, Capt.
Columbus A. Leary.
Oration, Col. William M. Marine, of Baltimore.
Short Addresses by the presidents of the so-
cieties—Sons of the war of 1812 and the
Daughters of the American Revolution.
At a meeting of the committee this
week it was decided to protect the
Battle Marker from injury by stock in
the field on the edge of which it stands,
by a semi-circular stone wall. The wall
will be built of stone largely gathered
from the scene of the battle, laid in Port-
land Cement.

Will Give Rights-of-way.—The
people are awakening to some extent to
the importance of a spirit of conserva-
tion and liberality in dealing with the
Trolley Line matter. The gentlemen who
have already given rights-of-way are:
John P. Nicholson, Samuel Burgess,
Joseph B. Baker, of Pennsylvania (the
Baker farm); William B. Usilton and
Sons, B. H. Coburn and Dr. A. P. Sharp.

The present situation is thoroughly un-
satisfactory both to the general public
and to the projectors of the trolley line.
President Trimble declares that his
people will not resort to condemnation
proceedings and a consequent expendi-
ture of 20,000 to secure rights-of-way.
It is now up to the people as to whether
this long-wished-for improvement shall
or shall not be blocked. It is hoped that
the people will come forward and recog-
nize the importance of securing the
Trolley Line.

EARLY WHEAT SEEDING.

Queen Anne Has the "First Field of Wheat up"—Other Interesting Items From the Farmer Folk.

If report be correct Queen Anne has
beaten Kent this year in early wheat
seeding. It was stated on Tuesday that
Mr. Graham, on the Booker Farm, at
Bookers wharf, had one field of wheat
which was as "green as a leek." Mr.
Graham is truly the "early bird."

Mr. S. R. Hurlock seeded a portion of
his crop on last Monday, but the rains
and warm weather have stopped his
seeding operations.

That hustling young farmer, William
Bonwell, commenced seeding wheat on
Tuesday, and Mr. Casey, at Lynch's, ex-
pected to commence on Wednesday.

Mr. George W. Hatcherson com-
menced seeding on Tuesday afternoon,
but was interrupted by the storm.

Treasurer Jesse R. Copper has already
gathered an average of over 10 tons to
the acre from his large tomato patch.

A Queen Anne gentleman says he has
already sold \$124 worth of tomatoes from
a one acre patch and has \$300 worth of
fruit yet to gather.

A veteran fruit buyer said on Thurs-
day that not within the history of tomato
growing in Kent, has there been so great
a harvest and as much money in the
fruit to the growers. The crop has not
only been above the average and of fine
quality, but all things considered, prices
have been unprecedentedly good. Not that
35-cent or even 40-cent tomatoes have
been unknown here, but prices have never
before ranged so high with so great a
crop.

Deliveries at Chestertown canneries
and wharves have been large this week
and prices have ranged from 14 to 20
cents.

Prices at Low Neck are reported to
have fallen as low as 7 cents per basket
one day during the week.

Kent's keifer pear crop, while scarce-
ly up to the average in quantity, is in
quality one of the finest ever grown in
the county. The tomato crop will prac-
tically run out this week and after that
packers will turn their attention to the
keifer pear. Offerings for the fruit
have so far been shy. Some Delaware
growers are experimenting with sending
keifer pears in small quantities to
Europe, in cold storage. The fruit was
sent some time ago and should results
prove satisfactory carload lots will be
exported within the next two weeks.

ing the finishing touches by contractor
Culp.

The cement pavement in front of the
Hubbard Building has been completed
and work on the two story porch will
be promptly commenced.

occupancy before the New Year is
ushered in.

Mr. Ambrose W. Carroll will open a
thoroughly stocked boot and shoe store
in the building on High street formerly
