A BIG SALE.

"Terms Cash" Was No Bar to Kent County
Purchasers.

The "cash sale" of the stock, farming
implements and other personal
property on the Tolchester farm on
Monday, was one of the most satisfac-
tory offerings of property in Kent
county in many years. Estimates of the
number of persons who attended range
from six hundred to one thousand. A
great many of those present had money
and in nearly every case these gentlemen
were not averse to spending what they
had with them. The aggregate of sales
was \$3,900. Mr. E. H. Beck, who
negotiated the sale of the big property
to the Messrs. Usilton, as well as con-
ducted Monday's sale says: "A very
satisfactory sale all through."

With rare exceptions property sold
high. Stock and nearly all of the
property offered were in excellent con-
dition. Horses sold at from \$28 to
\$125, cows at from \$22 to 42, and several
thoroughbred shots went as high as 100
per pound, live weight. Other hogs sold as
low as 6 cents, live weight. Baled hay,
but not of good quality, sold at 16 1/2
per ton, and other hay in bulk sold
equally well.

Canneries Closing.—The Crumpton
cannery closed on Tuesday and the last
of the Bohemian laborers returned to
the city on the Corsica on Tuesday
night. The Sudlersville laborers went
to the city on the Emma Ford on Tues-
day morning. The Numsen and Robin-
son canneries at Chestertown will be in
operation for two weeks yet.

THE DEPOT ASSURED.

It Will be Brought Into Town—And That
Promptly.

Engineer Latrobe, Supervisor Elliott,
and Mr. Burchinal, from Supt. Holliday's
office, came to Chestertown on Wednes-
day and practically settled the depot
matter for Chestertown. The gentlemen
came down for some important infor-
mation, which was readily secured. They
stated that the deeds for the transfer of
title to the rights-of-way were then in
course of preparation, and that these
deeds would be sent down in a few days.
There is no shadow of doubt that the
new depot will be located at the foot of
Cross street, near the business centre of
the town, and that work on the new
building will be under way in a very
short time—say about two weeks.

Upon the assurances of the gentlemen
who came down, Mr. Wilbur W. Hub-
barn on Thursday commenced the work
of collecting the amounts subscribed by
the citizens of Chestertown to the fund
to secure the desired improvement.

The \$1,500 charged for the right-of-
way through the property of Mrs. S. M.
Usilton will be paid by the railroad
company, leaving the amounts to be paid
to Messrs. George B. McWhorter, R. D.
Hynson, M. A. Toulson and James W.
Lumbert for rights-of-way across their
lots to be paid out of the citizen's fund.

THERE WAS NO UNVEILING.

Unpleasant Experience of Bishop Adams
and Rev. C. T. Denroche on Sunday.

Because of the storm which prevailed
on Sunday no effort was made to carry
out the program arranged for the un-
veiling of the granite slab at the grave
of General Philip Reed in I. U. cemetery.
Neither Bishop Adams nor Rev. Chris-
t. Denroche made any effort to go to the
Church.

The Bishop and Rev. Mr. Denroche
went to St. Paul's in the morning, but
found no congregation. In spite of the
heavy downpour of rain in the
afternoon they started for Chestertown
to enable the Bishop to fulfill his en-
gagement to preach at night. The first
branch—at DeCorses' gate—though
greatly swollen by the rain, was passed in
safety and without unpleasant incident,
but at Fannell's branch it was different.
The waters were very high across the
roadway. The passage was recognized as
threatening a wetting, yet the gentlemen
determined to assume the risk, hoping
for a safe passage. At the deepest point
in the stream, Bob, the ever-reliable
rectory horse was uncomfortably im-
mersed. The water reached nearly to
the top of the seat on which the gentle-
men sat and ran through the carriage.
To turn back was impossible and it was
resolved to force the passage of the
stream.

The Bishop's robes and other wearing
apparel in a satchel were drenched with
water, which Mr. Denroche baled out
with his hands, then proceeded to Ches-
tertown. Before the return trip he
bored holes in the body of the carriage
to let out the flood. Chestertown
was finally reached, but not until the
Bishop's vestments and wearing apparel
were drenched and he could not fulfill his
engagement to preach in Emmanuel church
at night. Rev. Mr. Denroche crossed
the stream later in the day without mis-
hap.

SUNDAY'S STORM.

Damage Done to Mill Properties and the
Public Roads.

Thousands of dollars in damage to mill
properties and to the public roads of the
county are results of the tremendous
rainfall of last Saturday and Sunday.

The heaviest individual losers were
Mr. James Percy Price, owner of
Bacchus' mill, and Mr. W. R. McKnett,
of the Urieville mill. It was hoped that
the dam at the old Bacchus mill, which
was in excellent condition, would be able
to withstand the tremendous pressure
of water, but on Sunday afternoon it
gave way. The breach is one which will
necessitate the expenditure of considera-
ble money to repair.

The dam of Urieville gave way as
the result of a former storm but the
damage was considerably increased by
the rush of water through the breach on
Saturday and Sunday. It is estimated
that it will cost \$1,000 to repair the full
damage which has been done to the dam
alone.

Some damage was done at Price's or
the old Connelly's mill, near St. Paul, by
the rushing of a great volume of water
across the roadway near the mill. No
injury was done to the fine dam.

Roads in every section of the county
were badly gullied and washed, and
heavy road bills will later tell the full
story of the storm to the taxpayers.

OCTOBER TERM OF COURT.

An Interesting Session Anticipated, Com-
mencing on Monday, October 20.

The fall or October term of the Circuit
Court for Kent county, will commence
on Monday, October 20. So far as can
be forecasted at this time the October
session promises to present an interest-
ing civil docket. What the grand jury's
work may develop of course can not be
foreseen.

Some of the most interesting cases to
come up will be: Albert Godwin vs the
County Commissioners. Mr. Godwin
charges that in the working of the pub-
lic road along his farm, water was backed
on his lands and he suffered damage.
His claim is for \$1,000. The now cele-
brated peach brandy case of Bosley vs
Ex-Sheriff John C. Davis, will come up
at this session. This case will involve
an interesting interpretation of a point
involved in the prohibition statute of
Kent county.

The damage case of W. W. Needles vs
John Bartley will not come up at this
session.

The damage case of John S. Vander-
grift vs William A. Burke will involve
the question of the closing up of an
alley way between the properties occu-
pied by these gentlemen.

Charles Gathers vs. the P. W. and B.
Railroad is an interesting damage case
brought to the local court from Cecil
county.

Albert S. Groves vs. Mrs. Lydia C.
Shaw, is a suit for claimed illegal distress
on property.

Joseph Davis, col., vs. Mrs. Lydia C.
Shaw (2 suits) damages, appeal.

Mary J. Fleming vs. George R. Caulk;
appeal from Justice Russell.

Isaac Robinson Company vs. J. F.
Snodgrass and J. Frank Connelly; appeal
from Justice Melvin.

John T. Caulk, colored, vs. George W.
Walker. This case is to decide a dis-
puted line.

The case of William Numsen vs. Rufus
Parks will be a case probably of more
general interest than any suit before the
court. It is a suit for a claimed breach
of tomato contract and involves several
legal points of more than ordinary inter-
est.

The case of Katharine J. Hatcherson
vs. Thomas Colyer is a suit to establish
title to land.

Another of the series of interesting
damage cases is that of William A.
Blakeney vs. William A. Burke for slan-
der.

R. F. Parks vs. George Bramble, is an
attachment for credit in the hands of
C. H. Skirven.

Martha J. McWorter vs. Annie Rolph
and W. C. Rolph; appeal from Justice
Townsend.

Adams Express Company vs. J. R.

25 TONS OF TOMATOES PER ACRE.

This Prize-winning Narrative Comes From
Little Delaware.

This week will practically close one of
the finest and most profitable tomato
crops ever grown in Kent county. The
Crumpton cannery closed on Monday,
and as a rule most of the other plants
which run exclusively in canning toma-
toes will stop operations with the pres-
ent week. The Robinson canneries will
run on keifer pears until the close of
the pear season.

Some heavy tomato yields have been
reported by Kent county growers, but
from Little Delaware comes the blue-rib-
bon story of the year. The *Smyrna Cal*
states it as follows:

"In the vicinity of Leipsic, Horace R.
Pugh, the popular proprietor of the
Leipsic Hotel, leads the growers. Mr.
Pugh on Friday last had received 31
tons to the acre, a yield that will not be
equaled in Kent. Since last Friday he
has picked many baskets from his farm
located between Leipsic and Dover, and
it is thought his yield will reach 25 tons
to the acre." Mr. Pugh is a practical
grower and since purchasing this farm
three years ago, when the ground was
very poor, has limed it each season. He
credits his big tomato yield to the use of
lime.
