Democratic Congressional Ticket.

FOR CONGRESS:

JAMES E. ELLEGOOD,
of Wicomico county.

REGISTRATION is over, now for revision next Tuesday, then let the Democratic campaign begin—it's not too early.

THOSE GENTLEMEN who are blocking the trolley road to Rock Hall by withholding rights-of-way should now speak or forever hereafter hold their peace about poor local passenger and freight facilities.

A FROST—a chilling frost laid waste the republican political patches in Connecticut on Monday. By good sized majorities, after a heavy vote had been cast, returns showed that the Democrats had won in many of the cities holding elections.

NOW THAT the streets of Millington are paved there is not a citizen of the town who does not think that the right thing has been done. The pretty village of Rock Hall should now follow suit. There is no economy in a penny-wise and pound foolish policy in such matters.

AS TAKING ADVANTAGE of the awful-killing necessities of the poor, the Standard Oil Company, one of the greatest of American trusts, on Monday put up the price of coal oil one-half cent on the gallon. As the Standard Oil's annual output is 1,400,000,000 gallons, this trifling one-half cent advance means about \$7,000,000 wrung from the pockets of the people.

COL. WILLIAM J. VANNORT, president of the Maryland G. A. R., and a member of the most prominent committees of the national organization, did not attend the thirty-sixth annual encampment held in Washington this week. The colonel was busy attending to registration matters. He has not, like some other distinguished members of his party in Kent, retired full of honors from the field of political activities.

THE CRUX in the coal strike may be summed up in the following sentence—140,000 miners representing 70,000,000 souls on the one side asking only for tolerable conditions for themselves and families; opposed to them six TRUST MAGNATES denying to them the right to organize for self-protection—a right which the inflated money lords not only exercise, but demand the military arms of the National and State governments to protect them in such organization.

A MISERABLE SUBTERFUGE.

The attempted reply of Congressman William H. Jackson to Hon. James E. Ellegood's demand for pure elections and an honest ballot, is a miserable subterfuge—a travesty upon common sense and good morals. The publishing of the Jackson letter in Kent county is a piece of effrontery worthy the desperation to which the republican leaders are driven in their campaign against good citizenship and political decency.

Have the republicans of Kent forgotten that not once during the Lloyd Lowndes regime there was not a LEGAL BALLOT EITHER PRINTED OR CAST IN KENT COUNTY? CAN THEY DISPROVE IT? If so, let them come before the people in an effort to relieve themselves of the impeachment.

William H. Jackson, the gentleman whose chiefest qualification for Congressional candidacy honors was his financial ability to debauch American manhood; Wm H. Jackson, whose greatest claim upon his party for recognition was his promise, implied or expressed, to use his means for corrupting the voters of the First Congressional District; this gentleman, whose most conspicuous service to his people during his official life at Washington was to draw his salary—for such a man to prate to James E. Ellegood of the political corruption of the Democratic party, is an impertinence scarcely warranted by a vaunting ambition which prefers political success to the reinstatement of an undisciplined manhood and the uplift of the people.

BETTER MAIL FACILITIES.

The general public will be gratified to learn that assurances have been received by prominent citizens of Chestertown that the local mail service is to be greatly improved. Supt. Bradley writes as follows concerning this very important matter:

Sir:—"I have to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of September 28th, complaining of the late arrival of the morning mail train on the Clayton & Chestertown R. P. O., and have to say in reply that I visited Paila delphia yesterday and took this matter up with Mr. M. Trump, General Supt. Trans. P. R. M. who gives assurance that the company is endeavoring to improve the service, and hopes that there will not be cause for complaint in future."

The above letter is the result of an editorial published in the TRANSCRIPT a few weeks ago in reference to the lateness of the arrival of the mails.

ARTIFICIAL FERTILIZER.

About \$100,000 The Enormous Sum Expended by Kent County Farmers Annually.

The Kent county farmer when he orders each spring and fall his phosphate, has little idea of the tremendous aggregate in money to which he becomes a contributor.

Mr. Percy B. Hollis, analytical chemist for Messrs. Beck, Walker and Brown, who is one of the most conservative and widely-known gentlemen in the county in his particular line of business, estimates the number of tons of commercial fertilizers annually used in Kent county at 6000 tons. This fertilizer he estimates will average \$15 per ton, or a grand total in dollars and cents of \$90,000 paid out by the farmers for this item alone. The average per acre is placed at 300 pounds, which would mean that Kent county's annual acreage in wheat, corn and truck on which artificial fertilizers are used is 40,000. Mr. Hollis thinks that 1000 tons will cover the total amount used on corn and trucks, leaving 5000 tons exclusively for the wheat crop, which would mean 33,333½ acres annually seeded in wheat in the county. He says that during the nineteen years covered by his business life in Kent the average decrease in the cost of artificial fertilizers has been fully 30 per cent. He is of the opinion, however, that for the same quality of goods used by the farmers of nineteen or twenty years ago when the average cost per ton was about \$26, there has been no lowering of price. The decrease he thinks has been confined entirely to the cheaper class of goods.

MR. HUBBARD'S ESTIMATES.

Mr. Wilbur W. Hubbard, proprietor of the well-known fertilizer manufacturing firm of Thomas R. Hubbard & Son, places his estimate at 7,000 tons for the county, which at an average of \$15 per ton means an annual expenditure of \$105,000. Mr. Hubbard's business experience covers a period of about twenty-four years and the territory reached by his extensive trade includes four states—Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

An average of 7,000 tons at the generally conceded average of 300 tons to the acre would increase the Kent county average in wheat, corn and truck to 48,000, or deducting the 1,000 tons conceded to truck and corn leaving 6,000 tons for wheat exclusively, would mean an average wheat acreage of 48,000.

This simply means that Kent county farmers each year, before receiving one dollar for their personal time, labor and investment, must pay out the enormous sum of \$100,000 for the item of fertilizer.

In addition to the two representative local manufacturers named above, fully half a dozen other factories are represented by local agents in the county.

Mr. Ellegood Answered.

Congressman Jackson Says he Has no Confidence in Democratic Leaders.

Congressman William H. Jackson, Republican, has sent his reply to the proposal of Hon. James E. Ellegood for the suppression of bribery in elections. He says he has confidence in the personal sincerity of Mr. Ellegood in this matter. He also says he is in sympathy with him and with all others who desire such a reform. But he distrusts the Democratic party managers, and in conclusion suggests that if the leaders of the party would unite upon an agreement to do all in their power to prevent bribery in the future he feels assured the Republican party will be found uniting with Mr. Ellegood earnestly and sincerely. The reply is as follows:

"Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication and desire to express myself as being in hearty sympathy with you and all others who are interested in the suppression of bribery at elections in this State.

"But while I may have faith in your personal sincerity in this matter, I know that I am rather dealing with a party whose record for the last 35 years in this State has been one of bribery and corruption. Whatever of evil there is in this State along these lines is due to the Democratic party, whose every legislative act up to the present time has been against every effort to suppress the evil.

"When the Anti-Bribery law was passed by your party it provided for the punishment of both buyer and seller, which you, as a lawyer know, practically makes the law a nullity.

"An effort in 1896 to amend this law so as to be effective was passed by a Republican House, but was smothered by a Democratic Senate.

"Those leaders of your party in this district upon whom you will depend for election results are the same who have been leaders not only in violating the Anti-Bribery law, but in further preventing our efforts for pure and honest elections by the use of fraudulent and trick ballots and the foundation for the use of which was deliberately planned by your leaders in the calling of a special session of the Legislature and the passing of an election law which made these infamous frauds possible.

"During the winter session of the Legislature your party defeated the 'Corrupt Practices' bill, which had for its purpose the suppression of bribery and all other offenses against the purity of the ballot.

"The Democratic convention of Ocean City, which made you its candidate for Congress, endorsed through its platform the present State administration, and does this not mean that your party approved of the trick ballots and the other nefarious schemes engineered by Democratic officials in the year 1901?

"If your party in the district is sincere in its efforts to prevent bribery in a Congressional election, it should be equally sincere in its efforts to prevent bribery in all elections in years to come.

"Let there be a gathering of your party leaders from all the counties of the district large enough in numbers to be thoroughly representative in its character, and unite upon an agreement to do all in their power to prevent bribery in the future.

"I feel assured my party will be found uniting with you as honestly and sincerely as your representatives could possibly be.

"If your party will not do this I cannot be expected to present credentials in the statements of those who would pose as anti-briber today and at the same time planning bribery for tomorrow."

Mr. Ellegood's Reply to Mr. Jackson.

Mr. Ellegood made the following reply to Mr. Jackson's bluff:

"First—That as a matter of personal honor we agree in an open letter what amount each has given, and will give, for legitimate purposes only, in this campaign, conceding to you the privilege of contributing three or even four times as much as I have or will give; or in lieu of this.

"Second—That we make a 'corrupt-practice act' of our own, by making a sworn itemized statement of the expenses during the campaign and for election purposes; this report to be made to the joint campaign committees of our respective parties. This is based on your criticism of the Democratic party's failure to pass such an act.

"Third—You say you are in 'heartily sympathy with you [me] and all others who are interested in the suppression of bribery.' Now, since you decline a 'bi-partisan' organization, let us unite as a joint letter to the citizens of each of the counties, requesting all who are 'interested' in this suppression to assemble in their respective county towns on some day not later than the 18th inst. and take steps for this purpose (This, you see, is a direct appeal to the people and you will surely trust them) and acquiesce as of blame."

In connection with this proposition Mr. Ellegood wrote a somewhat lengthy letter to Mr. Jackson. Concerning the above proposition Mr. Ellegood adds:

"This proposition may excite the ridicule of all the 'low fellows of the baser sort' in your party, who sneer at the 'schoolboy politics,' but it is much better for the people than corrupt politics and safer for the fellow that may be caught. At any rate, a strong man can 'bear the spurs that patient merit of the unworthy takes.'"

"You admit in your letter that there is a very corrupt condition in this district, and we both must admit that this is no time for apologists or promoters of further corruption. Indeed, I think the 'suppression of bribery' is the controlling issue in this district and superior to trusts, tariff or any other of the party issues, and that an honorable defeat is preferable to an election by corrupt methods."

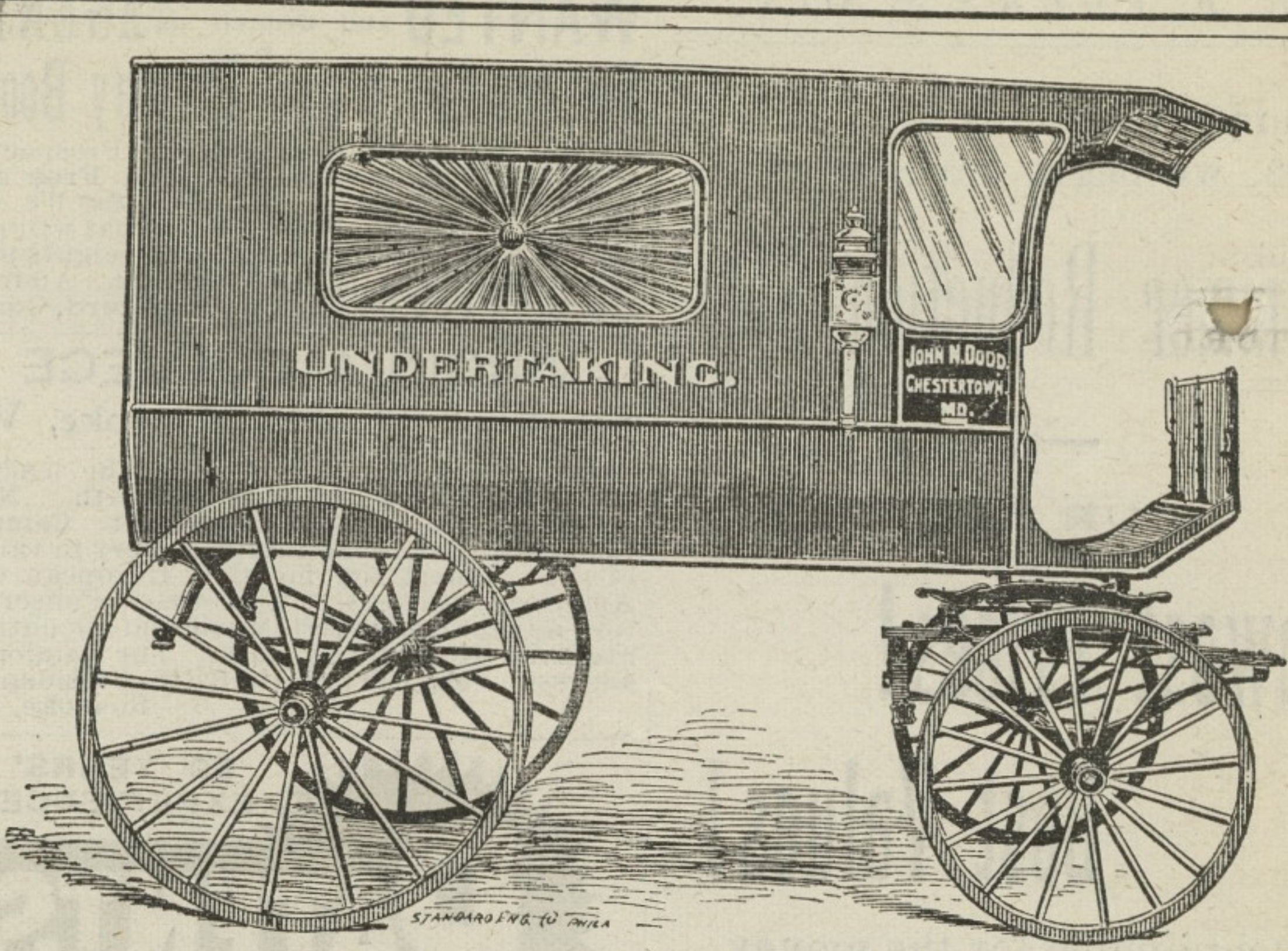
