TO BE UNVEILED TO-DAY.

The Caulk's Field Battle-Marker to be Un-
veiled Today With Appropriate
Ceremonial.

The granite Battle Marker to designate
the field on which General Philip Reed
and his Kent county militia won the
only decisive battle ever fought on the
Eastern Shore of Maryland, will be un-
veiled at Caulk's Field, at 1 o'clock P.
M. to-day (Saturday, October 18). The
fight occurred on August 30, 1814. Gen.
Reed died on November 2, 1829, and was
interred in the little cemetery at Christ
Protestant Episcopal church, I. U. Par-
ish. During all of these years near the
grave of the Hero of Caulk's Field
and the scene of the Kent county battle
have remained unmarked.

The ceremonies of the unveiling and
dedicating the heavy block of granite
which stands near to or on the firing line
of the American forces, will commence
at 1 o'clock P. M. A special steamer
will be run by the Tolchester Company
to bring invited guests and others from
Baltimore. The steamer will leave Tol-
chester for Baltimore on the return trip
at 5 o'clock P. M.

The following program will be carried
out:

Invocation, Dr. D. L. Greenfield, Pastor of
Christ M. P. church, Chestertown.
History of the movement, Rev. Chris. T. Den-
roche, rector of Old St. Paul's and I. U.
Singing, "My Country 'Tis of Thee," (chorus)
W. W. Chapin, leader.
Selection of the Stones and Inscriptions, Capt.
Columbus A. Leary.
Oration, Col. William M. Marine, of Baltimore.
Short address by the presidents of the so-
cieties—Sons of the War of 1812 and the
Daughters of the American Revolution.

The choirs of the Chestertown church-
es, and the choirs of the Fairlee M. E.
church and of St. Paul's will be drawn
upon for the music, which will be a de-
lightful feature of the exercises. The
singers from Chestertown will go down
in real picnic fashion in a big farm
wagon.

THE GRAVE STONE UNVEILING.

The unveiling, with appropriate cere-
monial of General Philip Reed's grave
monument, at Christ Church Cemetery,
in the parish of I. U., will take place on
Sunday, 26 October, at 3 P. M.

ENJOYABLE RELIGIOUS EXERCISES.

A Remodeled and Greatly Beautified M. E.
Church Reopened—Delightful Christian
Workers' Services.

The reopening services of the re-
modeled and greatly beautified Metho-
dist Episcopal church in Chestertown,
on Sunday, were of a most enjoyable
character.

Rev. Jonathan S. Willis, of Milford,
Del., preached an eloquent and strong
sermon in the morning from Ecclesiastes
2:13—Then I saw that Wisdom excelleth
Folly, as far as light exceedeth darkness.
In the evening Mr. Willis delighted a
large congregation by his sermon from
John 19: 6—Pilate saith unto them,
Take ye Him, and crucify Him; for I
find no fault in Him.

The musical program rendered by the
following choir was a delightful feature
of the day's services: leader, Dr. A. S.

Hattie Toulson, Sue Lambert, Laura R.
A. Thomas, Mettie Loud and Anna Bryan;

The following members of the choir gave
finely rendered solos: Miss Sue Lambert,
and Messrs. Brownley, Sparks and Hitch.
The main auditorium of the church has
been recarpeted, a steel ceiling has been
put in and the church furniture reoiled
and beautified. The ceiling and walls have
been beautifully frescoed and painted by
an artist from Philadelphia. The church
had been closed for several months and
the cost of the repairs will aggregate
about \$1,400, every cent of which
amount is provided for.

THE COAL STRIKE ENDED.

Members of the Great Coal
Strike Commission.

Bishop John L. Spaulding, of Illi-
nois; Brig-Gen John M. Wilson,
United States Army; E. W. Parker,
U. S. Geological Survey; E. E. Clark,
Chief of Railway Conductors Or-
ganization; Judge George Gray,
Ex-Senator from Delaware.

The great coal strike is practically over.
Both parties to the strenuous battle be-
tween capital and labor have made con-
cessions and a national calamity has
thereby been averted. The present situa-
tion may be summed up as follows:

Coal railroads are getting all their
cars ready to rush coal to market as fast
as it is taken from the collieries.
New York retail dealers announced
that the price of hard coal would be re-
duced to \$10 a ton on next Monday, and
all prices are expected to fall at once.

All the members of the arbitration
commission appointed by President
Roosevelt have accepted.

CHURCH NOTES.

At I. U. parish church there will not
be any services on Sunday, October 19,

Dr. H. B. Martin, rector of Emmanuel
Protestant Episcopal Church offered
prayer on Sunday for the stopping of
the excessive rains which have been so
serious a matter to the community at
large.

Rev. Walter B. Stehl, of Shepherds-
town, W. Va., has been called by the
vestry of St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal
Church, Centerville, to become its rec-
tor. Rev. James A. Mitchell, the present
rector, resigned some months ago on
account of ill health. He will retire
from the ministry. Rev. Mr. Seahl will
assume charge of his new parish in the
course of a few weeks.

Bishop Coleman preached in the
Church of the Transfiguration, New
York, on Sunday. He said:

"If the coal operators and the miners
were each to ask themselves 'Lord, what
will thou have me do?'—ask it from their
hearts, and act as they felt the Lord
would really have them to do—the entire
nation that is now perplexing the
nation would be speedily settled."

"At the recent meeting between the
president and the owners of the great
roads controlling the mines I fail to note
a record of prayer at the commencement
asking for divine guidance. Doubtless
if such a prayer had been said many
would have read of it and smiled and
deemed it inappropriate. Why should
it be considered inappropriate?"

Grace Presbyterian church, to-morrow
at 2 P. M. Sunday school as usual.

Westminster Presbyterian church, at
Georgetown, will be reopened for preach-
ing to-morrow, at 10.30 A. M., by ap-

K. M. Bull preaching.

or Price's mill, near St. Paul's church,
was seriously injured on Wednesday
afternoon at about 3 o'clock. As no
one was in the engine room with Mr.
Moore at the time of the accident the
details of the occurrence are purely
speculative. Young Coleman, who as-
sists in the mill, came in immediately
after the accident and found Mr. Moore
in a corner of the engine room uncon-
scious and bleeding about the side of
the head. Assistance was summoned
and the injured man was made as com-
fortable as possible at his home. No
many yards away. Dr. Frank Smith
was summoned and found Mr. Moore
was found to be broken and several ugly
wounds were found on the side of the
head. Though somewhat more encour-
aging, Mr. Moore's condition yesterday
was serious. Mr. Price's theory of the
accident is that the unfortunate miller
was endeavoring to replace a belt on the
big wheel of the engine when he was
struck and thrown with great force
against a post in the engine room.
