LOCAL MATTERS.

Tonging Licenses.—To October 15, Wednesday, 768 oyster tonging licenses had been issued by Clerk Dixon and Deputy Russell. To the same date last year the number was 720, or 48 less than the number issued this year.

Change of Time.—The unveiling of the monument at Caulk's Field will take place to-day, Saturday, October 18th, at 1 p. m., instead of 10 a. m., as previously announced. This change is necessitated by a change in the time of the boat leaving Baltimore.

Blacksmith Changes.—Mr. Barnes, the well-known blacksmith and wheelwright at Lankford, has moved to Fairlee and opened business. Mr. Clarence Scotten, who has so acceptably served the people of Millington and vicinity has rented the property at Lankford vacated by Mr. Barnes.

Dogs Raiding Sheepfolds.—Dogs attacked the flock of sheep on the Hermitage farm of Col. William J. Vannort, on Monday. One sheep was killed outright. One of the dogs was killed and the other badly shot. Dogs killed one sheep and crippled three others in the flock of Mr. George T. Williams.

Keiffer Pear Shipments.—Two carloads of Keiffer pears have been shipped from the Chestertown station this week and another will go out today. The fruit is being bought by the ton (\$10 per ton for firsts) and is shipped in bulk like corn, loose in box cars. A number of carloads have been shipped from Worton, Lynch's and Hepburn stations.

Tomatoes Still Moving.—Kent's great tomato crop is still not exhausted. Between 500 and 1,000 baskets of the fruit have been brought to the water front at Chestertown each day during the present week. The quality of the fruit is, of course, not up to the quality of the height of the season. The price has hung about the 12 cents per basket mark.

First Purchase of New Corn.—Mr. Hiram M. Brown, the Chestertown grain buyer, on Tuesday last bought his first corn of this year's crop. The price paid was fifty cents, November delivery. Mr. Percy Hatcherson hauled the first new corn to the Chestertown granaries this year. On October 4, Mr. Hatcherson shipped a lot of cob corn in bag to Messrs. Stevens Brothers, Baltimore.

A Profitable Deal.—It is said that every cord of wood in Kent county has been bought by speculators and dealers. One man at Golts sold 600 cords of wood for \$3.50 a cord to a speculator, who turned round and sold it at \$8 a cord without touching it, thus clearing \$4.50 a cord. It is the poor of Chestertown who will suffer, as they have not the money to buy wood by the cord and can scarcely get coal even by the basket.

Pierias Elect Officers.—The Pieria Literary Society of Washington College, composed exclusively of young ladies, has elected officers for the ensuing year as follows: President, Miss Culver; vice-president, Miss Beaver; secretary, Miss Bell; corresponding secretary, Miss Woodall; treasurer, Miss Cooper. The Pieria has about thirty working members, and will outline a pleasant and profitable plan of work for the collegiate year.

Will Commence Work on New Draw.—A representative of the bridge company which will put the draw in Chester bridge has been in town. He stated that some of the heavy beams to be used were ordered from Germany; the trip over will require about 20 days and they had been ten day out. This will bring the commencement of work on the new steel draw within the next two, or at the outside, three weeks. It is impossible to say definitely.

Woman's Auxiliary Meeting.—The fall meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Eastern, met in St. Luke's Church, Church Hill, on Tuesday evening, October 14. Interesting addresses were made by Bishop Adams, Rev. Mr. Ridgely, of China, and Mr. Manrose, of Dakota. Services and business meetings were continued during Wednesday. A delightful lunch was served at the rectory. Mrs. Physick, president of the Diocese Branch, presided. Much missionary zeal and enthusiasm was shown by all present.

W. C. Lost at Football.—The Washington College football team lost its first game of the season to the Delaware College team, at Newark, on Saturday. The score was 27 to 0 in favor of the Delaware players. The game was played in the rain and on a muddy field. The W. C. team's line up average was 145 pounds, while the Delaware College line averaged 155. The Marylanders were not only ten pounds under the average of their opponents, but were weakened by the absence of Jefferson and Crew, who are suffering with a broken leg and an injured shoulder, respectively. For the home team, Garey, left half-back; Hitch, quarter back; Carmine, full back, and Prof. Bruhl put up notably strong play. The game scheduled for Wednesday with the St. John's team, on the Washington College grounds, was canceled by the St. John's team.

Mrs. Tule Claims the Horse.—An interesting point has been raised by Mrs. Ella L. Tule, in the Orphan's court for Kent county. In the personal estate of the late William H. Baxter is a horse which Mrs. Tule claims as a gift from Mr. Baxter. This claim the administrator, Mr. Robert F. Jewell, resists through his attorney, Hope H. Barroll. Wm. W. Beck represents Mrs. Tule. The case will be argued before the Orphan's court on Tuesday. Mrs. Tule is the daughter of Mr. John Kiehl, of Fairlee.

Storm Damage at Millington.—In addition to the damage to mill property by the storm of ten days ago, already reported in the Transcript, is reported a big washout in the dam of the fine mill of Mr. E. W. Spear, at Millington. About 80 feet of the dam went out on the Saturday of the storm. Mr. Spear will not only repair the break, but it is stated, will put in or repair his tumble dam and when repairs are completed will have a greatly improved property. It is estimated that the work will cost between \$500 and \$1000.

Tomato Injunction.—Judge James A. Pearce on Wednesday signed an order for an injunction on a bill filed by John S. Wirt and L. G. Lee, solicitors for the Strassburg-Stickel-Hewitt Company, canned goods brokers of Baltimore, against Robert L. Christie, a packer of canned goods, at Coloma, Cecil county. The bill alleges the making of a contract in June last for the sale and delivery of 4,000 cases of tomatoes at 82½ cents, delivery to be made in October; that the defendant, Christie, packed the goods, but now refuses to deliver them, owing to the fact they have increased in value nearly \$1,000.

More Interesting Figures.—Last week the Transcript gave interesting figures relative to the amount paid for fertilizers used each year by the farmers of Kent county. Following up this line of calculation, it may be said that Kent county farmers can make no surer or better investment of their capital. A gentleman who is thoroughly posted in agricultural matters, makes the statement that the average yield of wheat per acre in Kent county is 16½ bushels. Without artificial fertilizers, he continued, the average yield would not exceed 8 bushels per acre. Thus, it will be seen, that the farmers who purchase artificial fertilizers get full value for their money with a handsome margin.

Those Welsh Coal Strikers.—The unsettled condition of the coal strike leaves it somewhat an undecided question as to future proceedings in the matter of ordering Welsh coal for local consumption. Exclusive of a probable order of 250 tons from the commissioners of Queen Anne county, Mr. Barroll has orders for about 450 tons of the Welsh article. To this date he has received no replies to his letters of inquiry, but unless the strike terminates soon, should favorable answers as to price, etc., be received the orders will be placed. As regards the character of the Welsh coal, Mr. Barroll states that it is an anthracite and is a bituminous coal. It burns freely and is practically free from slag.

LITTLE LOCALS.

A Corps of United States engineers is making surveys from the lower end of Spesutia Island to Port Deposit, in the Susquehanna river, for a 15-foot channel.

W. C. A. Thompson, the Chestertown Isaak Walton, captured five dozen fine perch and rock fish down the river one day last week.

Mr. Alday Clements has sold his "Forest farm," near Chesterville, to Nannie Emory for \$3,500. This farm contains 100 acres and is a part of the "Old Mansion Farm" of Anna W. Comegys, late of Kent county.

No sale of the fine Topping mill property at Chestertown has been made—only a premature news explosion.

A little Bohemian boy, while fishing, fell into Chester river at the wharf on Wednesday. He was promptly rescued.
