King Edward Reads the Transcript.—Rev. Chris. T. Denroche sent a copy of the Transcript containing an account of the unveiling at Caulk's field to King Edward, of England. Other copies have been sent to the uttermost ends of the earth.

Mr. Fiddis Overboard.—Mr. Freeman Wickes Fiddis walked off the Cliff City wharf on Thursday of last week and came near drowning. He had just gotten off the Ford and was walking to the shore, when he stepped too far to one side and plunged into the water. But for the timely assistance of Mr. Eugene Neal the unfortunate man must have drowned. Dry clothing and hot coffee soon counteracted the effects of the bath.

Baltimore Building and Loan.—The receivers of the Baltimore Building and Loan Association have sent out letters notifying the shareholders that on or before December 15, 12½ cents on the dollar will be paid. Some time ago the receivers paid the shareholders 33½ cents on the dollar. It is thought that at least a third payment will be made. There is considerable stock of the association held in this county.

Trip in an Auto.—Mr. James W. Florida, of Philadelphia, passed through Chestertown in his gasoline auto car on Sunday en route to Philadelphia. He made the run from Philadelphia to Baltimore, then took the Emma Ford for Chestertown on Saturday and left for Philadelphia on Sunday. The car weighed 2000 pounds, had developed a speed of nearly 60 miles an hour, and cost \$1,500. It was one of the finest machines of the kind ever seen in Kent.

An Interesting Point.—The Queen Anne School Board has trouble on its hands. Two calves belonging to Mr. Josh Walls ate Paris green, according to the statement of Mr. Walls' father, recently, which was left lying loose in a bag on the premises of the new school building at Poadtown. Mr. Walls claims the poison was left there by Mr. Wesley Woodall, of Ingleside, who was under contract to paint the school building. Mr. Walls proposes to recover damages from the School Board, and has placed the matter in Attorney T. J. Keating's hands.

Mr. Sparks Has Resigned.—Prof. S. Walter Sparks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel E. Sparks, Crumpton, has resigned his position as principal of the academy at Galea, Kent county. Mr. Sparks graduated at the Normal department of Washington College in 1898. Since then he has taught the high school at Pocomoke City, Worcester county and is his present position. He resigned his present position to teach in the public schools of Baltimore city at an advance salary. Mr. Sparks is recognized as one of the most advanced educators in Kent county and his promotion is well deserved. —Observer.

Mrs. Walraven Injured.—Mrs. Cora Walraven, wife of Mr. Frank Walraven, formerly of Kent, but at present living in Sestersville, Ohio, was painfully, and it is feared fatally injured last week. Mrs. Walraven was on a railroad bridge which crosses a ravine full of underbrush and through which runs a stream over a rocky bed. She saw the rapidly approaching train and then all was blank. She was struck by the engine; an ugly gash was made on the head, and she was horribly bruised. As a result of the accident she was paralyzed from the waist down, but the spine has been straightened and there is some hope of her life. A friend writing of the unfortunate lady's injuries says: "If she recovers it will be almost miraculous."

Two Persons Shot.—Mr. Albert Bramble, living on the Tolchester Farm, was painfully but not seriously shot some days ago. His gunning companion fired at a rabbit and just at that moment a flock of birds took to wing and he turned to shoot at them. Mr. Bramble was in the line of fire and many of the shot struck him about the legs. A pair of heavy snag-proof boots received most of the shot but a number struck above the boot tops and were buried in the flesh. Dr. H. B. Simmons extracted the shot and Mr. Bramble has experienced slight inconvenience since the accident. Another shooting was that of Capt. Briden. While rabbit hunting in Kent county Capt. Isaac Briden was shot in the lower part of both legs by his son Jesse, who was nearer to his father than he thought when he fired at a rabbit. A number of shot are embedded too deeply in the flesh to be removed.

The Trolley Line.—The bright fall days are passing without any evidences of a purpose to commence work on the trolley line for Kent. Hope H. Barroll, Esq., the local representative of President Trimble and his friends, states that at this time there are no facts to be given out and he has no knowledge of when practical operations will be begun. It seems that Fredericktown, just across the Sasasfras on our northern boundary, is the terminus of the Cecil county trolley which it is claimed is practically assured. Judge Edwin R. Cochran, of Wilmington, president of the Cecil company, and Senator Henry M. McCullough, of Elkton, a director, appeared before the county commissioners and deposited the sum of \$1,500 in cash as a guarantee that the road would be built and in running order by October, 1903 work on said line to commence within five months. The commissioners in consideration of this gave the trolley company the exclusive right-of-way from the Delaware State line to Elkton and also a right-of-way to Chesapeake City, and Fredericktown, on the Sasasfras river. The trolley company has been granted the right-of-way through the town of Newark, Del. The road will be built by the Tennis Construction Company, of Philadelphia.

COURT NEWS.

Election and Other Cases Disposed of—Appeal in Peach Brandy Case—Would Not Receive Mrs. Latham.

The Circuit Court adjourned on Saturday to meet in special session on Monday, December 1.

State vs. Robert H. Latham. Indicted for violating local option law. Jury trial. Verdict guilty; fined \$300 in each of two cases, or imprisonment in the House of Correction for 12 months.

Mrs. Robert H. Latham, convicted of violating the local option law, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 or imprisonment in the House of Correction for six months.

Case of State against Mrs. Mary Joiner, charged with violation of local option law. Verdict not guilty.

Case of State against Marshall Jones, charged with violating local option law. Verdict, guilty and sentenced to House of Correction for 6 months.

The damage suit of Godwin against Kent county commissioners was set for trial on December 5.

DeCoursey G. Mays vs. registrars of voters 2d precinct, 4th district, for registration—petition dismissed.

Willard England vs. registrars 1st precinct, 1st district and Edward S. Biddle, to strike off—petition granted.

Willard England vs. registrars 1st precinct, 1st district, and George Harrington, to strike off—petition dismissed.

Spencer Garnet vs. registrars of first precinct, 1st district, for reinstatement—petition granted.

Weston Thomas vs. registrars of 1st precinct, 1st district, for reinstatement—petition granted.

Willard England vs. registrars of 1st precinct, 1st district, and Samuel H. Clough, to strike off—petition dismissed by consent.

Mrs. Robert H. Latham, who was sentenced to six months in the House of Correction or pay a fine of \$100 for violating the local option law, was taken to the House of Correction together with her two-month-old baby. The authorities were perfectly willing to receive the woman but refused to accept her with the child. In consequence of this refusal the woman and her baby were brought back to Chestertown on Thursday and lodged in jail, where they now are.

Hope H. Barroll, attorney for Bo-ley in the now celebrated Peach Brandy Case, against Ex-Sheriff John C. Davis, will take an appeal from the decision of the lower court.

THE SUN IN FUNNY MOOD.

Even so dignified a journal as the Baltimore Sun sometimes indulges in a "funny mood." The Sun in its Sunday issue had the following editorial relative to a recent case before the Kent county circuit court:

"Schoolboys throughout Maryland will be pained to note a decision of the Circuit Court for Kent County asserting the legality of the time-honored method of imparting knowledge by means of the birch. In one of the public schools of that delightful county, where peach switches are abundant even if birches are scarce, the teacher dusted the coat of a refractory pupil by means of a rod. The parents of the boy had the teacher arrested charging her with assault and battery, but the Court decided that the teacher was acting well within her constitutional and legal rights. Nothing is more common than for judges, in their conservatism and love for precedent, to forget that they started life as little boys. It is not at all unlikely that all three of the venerable judges who sat on the bench and decided this case made a practice in early life of going to school with the seats of their trousers reinforced with geographies. In those old days the rod and the ruler were esteemed as essential in any scheme of education as the textbooks. Solomon was the great apostle of the rod. He had some, allowing five children to the wife, which was far below the average in those days; there were no less than five thousand children in this remarkable family. A breakfast with one man, one thousand women and five thousand children all gathered around it at one time, the former all talking at once in a discussion of the latest social doings in the Jerusalem Four Hundred and the latter all asking for biscuits, and then Solomon's predilection for the rod may be understood. He enforced his views by precept upon precept, line upon line. 'A rod,' he said, 'is for the backs of fools,' and the schoolboy is the worst kind of a fool. 'He that spareth the rod hateth his son.' 'Foolishness is bound up in the heart of a child, but the rod of correction shall drive it away.' 'The rod and reproof give wisdom.' 'Withhold not correction from the child; for if thou beatest him with the rod he shall not die.' 'Solomon's peculiar situation somewhat weakens his testimony as an advocate of the rod. Anyone would want to use the rod with five thousand children to discipline. In these days of labor-saving devices a man with his quiver that full would buy a thrashing machine and a steam engine to run it. The plain intimation of Holy Writ is that Solomon was a henpecked man, and but for this

fact, it is not at all unlikely that he would have advocated the rod for wives as well as for children. Possibly in his weariness or talk about new bonnets and the latest progressive fashions or pling pong party or pink tea he was hinting something of this kind when he mentioned the rod as a proper thing to be applied to the backs of those persons who are not overburdened with brains.

But, after making due allowance for Solomon in his plea for the rod, is he not right after all, and was not the Kent county court right in following the wise King? In the days when these judges went to school flogging was the rule, and it is not unlikely that each one of them used this fact impressed upon his memory in the most painful manner. It may be that without the peach switch not one of them would ever have reached the bench. It is greatly to be doubted whether any boy who never got a flogging from his parents or his teachers has ever yet become President of the United States. Foolishness is bound up in the heart of a boy, and no certain way of driving it out of him, except by the switch, has ever been devised. And in the strenuous days of old, when the beneficial results of flogging were universally esteemed, the men who were raised were probably as good as those who are growing up under the rule. The days are fast coming when the agent of some society will arrest women for beating eggs or for having whipped cream on the table. It is not at all unlikely that there will be a law to prohibit musicians from beating time. It is evident that the Kent county court has not yet caught up with the modern Sunday school methods of imparting an education. It is just possible that they may agree with Uncle Remus that you can teach a nigger more learning with a burr's tail than you can with a spelling book."

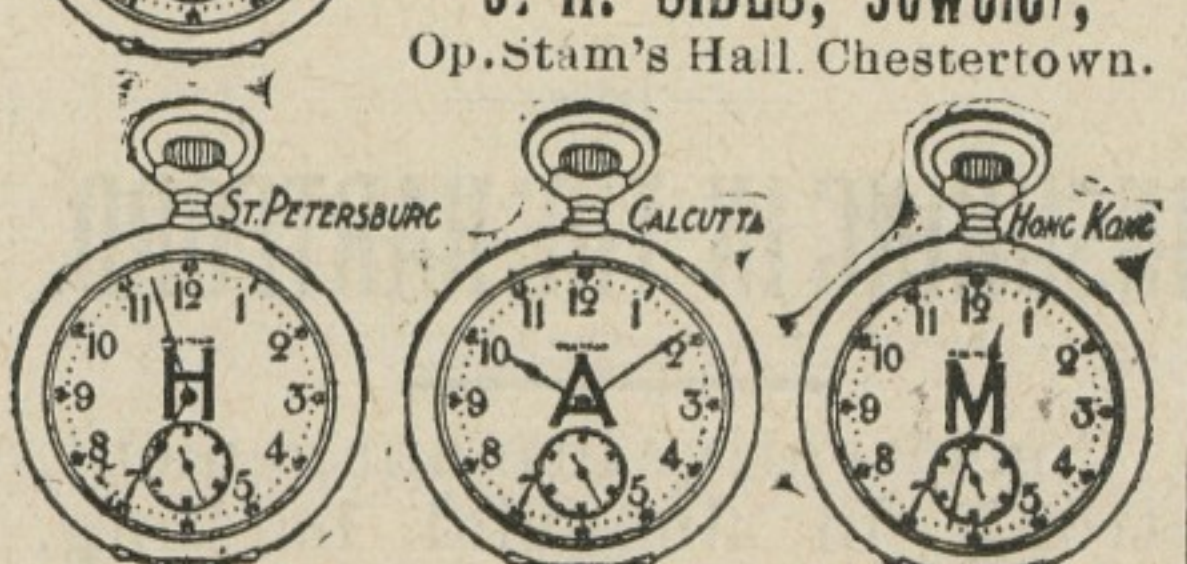
