LOCAL MATTERS.

The New School Building.—All furniture and other equipments have been ordered for the new Chestertown public school building, and it is expected that the new home for the public school will be occupied about December 1.

Mill Not Sold.—The Urieville or McKnett mill property which was offered by Lewin W. Wickes, Esq., at mortgagee's sale on Monday, was bid in at \$2,000 by a representative of James S. Coates, of Philadelphia, the mortgagee. This is one of the oldest and most valuable mill properties in the county.

Miss Walters Appointed.—Miss Nellie E. Walters, of Pocomoke City, for a number of years one of the most efficient teachers in the Kent county schools, has been appointed to the vacancy in the Hibernia school. Miss Walters taught in the Chestertown school for a long time. The vacancy at the Hibernia school is caused by the resignation of Miss Dora M. Loller.

Mother Will Take Baby.—Mrs. Robert H. Latham, who was sentenced to six months in the House of Correction for violating the local option law, and who was refused admission to that institution with her two-months-old child, was again taken to the House of Correction yesterday by Sheriff Fletcher. Mrs. Latham's mother consented to take the baby and the difficulty was at once solved.

Mr. Shallicross Injured.—Mr. Thomas J. Shallicross, one of the most widely known citizens of Kent, sustained painful injuries two weeks ago from which he is now recovering. Mr. Shallicross fell from a hay mow to the ground, a distance of fully fourteen feet. Dr. J. Horton Kelley was promptly summoned and pronounces his patient as recovering nicely and in good spirits.

A Big Yield.—Mr. James T. Ireland has an acre of ground on his Churn Creek farm which has actually yielded him 100 bushels of corn. Now, this is corn growing and no mistake. Mr. Ireland is willing and does throw down the gauntlet to any other farmer in all the county round about to beat this yield. It is up to the best of them to even equal it.

Not Quite to the Standard.—Mr. Geo. T. Parvis, a merchant at Millington, has a ear of corn in his store which measures 13½ inches in length and has 882 grains of corn on it. Who can beat it?—*Record*. Why, Mr. A. H. Johnson's ear of 13½ inches beats it in length. An office rat, however, shelled Mr. Johnson's ear and failed to count the grains, so that point must remain unsettled.

Mrs. Tule Lost.—The claims of Mrs. Ella Tule that a valuable mare included in the inventory of the estate of the late W. H. Baxter, belonged to her, was heard before the Orphan's Court on Tuesday. After hearing evidence and argument the court failed to take Mrs. Tule's view of the matter and decided that the animal in question belongs to the estate. Mr. Barroll, Mrs. Tule's attorney, will take an appeal. W. W. Beck represented the estate.

In Hard Luck.—Mr. Hayes Austin was in hard luck in his pugilistic exercises of recent date. He and Mr. Clarence Dadds suffered their angry passions to rise; Mr. Austin, Mr. Dadds claims, "assaulted" him, with which opinion Mr. Austin evidently agreed, for he promptly trumped to Rock Hall, a distance of eight miles and paid constable Jewell the sum of \$3.10 to pay for the luxury of a setto with Mr. Dadds. The courts have decided that a man cannot go up, pay fines and deprive the State of the appearance of its witnesses, and no sooner had Mr. Austin paid the \$3.10 than he was told by Deputy Sheriff Startt that he must appear before Justice France and have a hearing. This was done and the case is now being held under consideration by the Chestertown justice.

Looking for Farms.—The advantages offered by Kent county are becoming daily more generally well-known. In climate, soil and other desirable conditions this section is without a counterpart in Maryland. Messrs. William G. and Samuel F. Evans, with their families, from Pittsburgh, Pa., have taken up their residence in Kent. For the present they will reside in Chestertown. The latter will take rooms with Mrs. J. B. Burchinal in the new Hubbard building. Later they will engage in farming.

Phaasants Have Prospered.—The experiment of Mr. W. Irving Walker in raising phaasants on his Round Top farms, has proven eminently satisfactory. Last year Mr. Walker released three hens and a cock phaasant. The birds at once took to the splendid cover in which the Round Top Farms abound and were only occasionally seen afterward. Food was placed where they could get it during the winter and evidently the birds have prospered. Mr. Walker states that he has now as fine coveys of the birds as can be found in the State. He is guarding his treasures with great care and will allow no one to hunt where it is possible that the rare pets may be interfered with.

An Unpleasant Experience.—Mrs. William W. Beck and her little daughter, who are now guests of St. Louis friends, had an unpleasant experience during their trip to the west. The train on which Mrs. Beck, Mrs. W. S. Walker and Miss Nellie Walker went, had a head-on collision in which three men were killed outright and others were injured. Mrs. Beck saw a poor fellow taken from the wreck with his arm cut off and otherwise mutilated and bruised. We are glad to state that no injury befell the Kent county party.

Kicked by a Horse.—William Davis, the 4-year-old grandson of Mr. John H. Greenwood, was badly kicked by a horse yesterday afternoon. The little fellow went into a nearby lot and it is supposed went behind one of the several horses grazing there. An ugly wound was inflicted over the eye. Had the child been an inch nearer the horse his skull would certainly have been crushed. As it was, the blow glanced upward and it is expected that he will recover. The cries of a little playmate attracted the attention of Mrs. Hiron who went to the little sufferer.

Dogs vs. Sheep.—That either the worthless dog or the valuable sheep industry of the county must be surrendered is becoming more evident. Kent should follow the good example of Cecil and a few other counties, and while restricting the local supply of dogs provide a fund out of which the owners of sheep killed by dogs may be paid for their losses. That some idea may be formed of the ravages of dogs in some sections, the following list is given. These losses were all within one month: S. Tilden Cooper, 33; Samuel F. Cooper, 3; Geo. Venable, 5; George T. Williams, 4; William French, 3; L. E. Fowler, 1; Otho Fogwell, 2; Henry T. Jewell, 1; J. W. Vannort, 1; Mr. Kiker, 2. Total, 55.

The Moore Case.—Testimony was heard by special examiner for the circuit court, Lewin W. Wickes, on Thursday, in the case of Clara L. Warner against Jonathan G. Moore. Mrs. Warner was given judgment for \$975, interest and costs, at the fall term of the circuit court for Kent county last year. When an effort was made to collect the amount of this judgment it was found that Moore had transferred his property by deed to his wife, Sarah J. Moore. It is to set aside this deed that the present proceedings before the special examiner have been instituted. In the examination of one of the witnesses on Thursday a difference of opinion arose between Mr. Barroll, attorney for Mrs. Warner, and the special examiner, Mr. Wickes, relative to the admission of certain matter which Mr. Barroll insisted upon being incorporated into the proceedings as evidence. As a result of this difference of opinion the proceedings were suspended and both Mr. Wickes and Mr. Barroll will present the matter to the court for a decision. This will necessarily delay the final settlement of the point at issue.

Mr. Ireland Coming to Town.—Mr. James T. Ireland, one of the most successful farmers and a widely-known citizen of the county, on Saturday bought the fine Chestertown residence of Mr. Thomas R. Hubbard, on High street. The purchase includes furniture, carpet and everything in the nicely furnished house (except a few articles reserved by Mr. Hubbard because of their peculiar association with his old home) and all of the land running through to Calvert street. The house has baths, closets and every convenience of a desirably appointed home. The finest materials were used in the residence, stables and outhouses, so that Mr. Ireland has really purchased one of the finest properties in Chestertown. He has thousands of cords of wood on his several farms and proposes to open a wood yard on Calvert street, and will also sell hay and other products from his valuable farms. The new owner of the Hubbard home has six children and declares that the proximity of the handsome public school building will be no objection to him. "I can just drop the children over the side fence," he declares, "right into the school-room." Mr. Ireland was born in Chestertown in the house adjoining the home of Mr. Josiah Lusby, and says he feels that he is only coming back to his old home. Mr. Hubbard had an elegant home and the breaking up of the old association is a sore trial, but circumstances render it better that it should be so. Mr. John Moffett has rented Mr. Ireland's farm and will move there at New Years.

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THURSDAY'S QUOTATIONS.

Wheat.—Receipts for today 27,407 bus. viz., 9,674 bus. southern, and 17,733 bus. western. Shipments from elevators, 2,438 bus. Stock in elevators, 663, 156 bus. The market for southern wheat today was steady as compared with yesterday's transactions on grade. Receipts slightly freer and everything promptly disposed of under the prevailing good demand. Sales generally of cargoes on grade at 75½ cents for No. 2 red, 72½ for steamer 2 red, and 70 cents for rejected while one cargo went at 75½, 72½ and 69 cents for the foregoing grades in the order named. Small bag lots, by sample, brought 73 and 75 cents, and several cargoes of choice wheat went to millers at 75½ cents, by sample.

Western yesterday afternoon was quiet December, 76.

Corn.—Receipts for today, 20,260 bus. viz., 2,730 bus. southern and 17,530 bus. western. Shipments from elevators 31,154 bus. Stock in elevators, 52,263 bus. The market for southern corn today was firm with freer offerings and an excellent demand for prime corn of both colors from shippers and local dealers. Sales of cargoes both colors on grades at 63 cents for No. 2 white, yellow or mixed; 56 cents for steamer; 53 for No. 3 of either color, and 50 for rejected. Small bag lots of white brought 55 and 56 cents, by sample, quality fairly good.

Con Corn is in fairly liberal supply, but there is no plethora of strictly prime yellow offered and such is quotable at \$2.10@2.15 per bu. Pale, mixed, short eared or otherwise inferior stock drags even at 5 to 10 cents per bu. less.
