TWO WRECKS.

Thrilling Experiences of Kent County Sailors
During Saturday's Wind-Storm.

Footsore, weary and moneyless, Capt.
Ephraim Dill, of the schooner Maggie
C., reached Chestertown on Monday
morning, leaving his vessel sunk in
eighty feet of water in Eastern Bay.

The Maggie C. had just come off the
ways at St. Michaels after a thorough
overhauling, and loading with a cargo of
lumber from the Tunis Mills, late on
Saturday afternoon set sail for Baltimore,
her cargo to be delivered to the Hubbard
Fertilizer Company, to be used in the
rebuilding of their plant which was
several months ago destroyed by fire.
Soon after leaving port the vessel com-
menced to leak and men were put at the
pumps hoping that she might be kept
clear. At about 10 o'clock, when in
Eastern bay, the Maggie C. filled and
went to the bottom in about eighty feet
of water. Capt. Dill and his men took
to their small boat, leaving clothing and
all of their effects to go to the bottom
with the unfortunate vessel. In the
meantime the heavy wind storm of Sat-
urday night had sprung up, a heavy and
dangerous sea was on, and while some of
the men baled the others rowed man-
fully for the shore. It was a life and
death struggle, but the seamen won.
The deck load of lumber was washed
overboard while the lumber in the hold
went to the bottom with the vessel.

Capt. Dill made his way to St. Michaels,
and unable to secure a team came
to Chestertown afoot. The lumber
was to be delivered on the wharf of the
Hubbard Fertilizer Company, Baltimore.
This being the case the loss will fall
upon the Tunis company. It is not
thought probable that the vessel can be
raised. She belongs to Capt. Harry
Pfeiffer, of Chestertown.

THE AGNES ASHORE.
The gasoline bugey, Agnes, recently
purchased by Wilbur Eliason, Jr., went
ashore off Red Bank, near Rock Hall
harbor, during the heavy blow of Sat-
urday night. Capt. Jack Davis in com-
mand of the vessel left Chestertown on
Saturday for Rock Hall with a
cargo of forty tons of soft coal on deck
for the public schools of the lower dis-
trict.

When the heavy windstorm of Sat-
urday night struck the Agnes, Capt. Davis
made a desperate run for Rock Hall
harbor, but his little vessel was forced
ashore off Yellow Bank. The heavy
swell washed the deck load of coal
overboard and the boat soon filled.

THE TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

Prof. Mattoon Delivered an Interesting Ad-
dress on Drawing.

The entire session of the Teachers'
Association meeting, held by the way,
in the old school building, on Wednes-
day morning last, was occupied by Prof.
J. C. Mattoon, principal of the manual
training department of the Easton
schools, the subject being Drawing.
Prof. Mattoon explained very simply
and clearly the elementary principles of
perspective, illustrating the application
of these principles by simple drawings,
which the teachers were required to re-
produce. After the production of a sim-
ple drawing, the principles of shading
were next explained and applied.

The most interesting part of the exer-
cises consisted of paper folding and cut-
ting. Each teacher was supplied with
a sheet of paper and followed step by
step the process of folding and cutting a
conventional design. The value of
drawing is too well known to require
further notice, but the value of exercises
requiring manual skill is not appreciated
by the public, at least, at its true value.
Prof. Mattoon showed how the paper
folding could be used to train, not only
the hand and eye of the pupil, but the
intellectual faculties as well. Fractions,
for example, always a difficult part of
arithmetic, might be explained in a tan-
gible way by simple processes that the
pupil could perform for himself with
both pleasure and profit.

Progressive teachers everywhere are
adopting more fully these valuable and
useful methods, and doubtless the teachers
and scholars of this county will alike
receive considerable benefit from this
instruction. Mr. Peterson is to be con-
gratulated on securing this opportunity
for his teachers.

The roads and weather conditions con-
sidered, the attendance of the teachers
was very satisfactory.

The public schools closed on Tuesday
and will be opened on Monday next.

Contest Costs.—The total costs of
the recent election contests in Kent
county amounted to \$139. This was for
witnesses, taking evidence before Jus-
tice Melvin, clerks and other fees. These
costs will be divided between Messrs.
Hill, Davis and Stevens, making \$46.33
each. This, of course, does not include
attorney's fees.

THE GREEN SPRING VALLEY CLUB.

Some Really Fine Sport in Spite of the Tricks
of Kent County Foxes—Ladies on the
Chase—Lunches in the Field.

In spite of the fact that Kent and
Queen Anne county foxes really sur-
passed themselves in tricks and pervers-
ness, the visiting members of the
Green Spring Valley Hunt Club declare
that they enjoyed themselves and really
had some fine sport.

The visitors feasted on Eastern Shore
delicacies in addition to perfectly legiti-
mate pleasures in the field of sport.
Their first meal was a splendid supper
served by the Dorcas Society—a very
happy introduction.

The first fox on Friday was started in
Queen Anne back of the Frank Baxter
farm. Fifty four hounds, 28 of the 70
belonging to the Green Spring Valley
club, and 26 of Mr. George Brice's splen-
did kennel of 35 dogs, followed the fox.
This was a long trail, but after reynard
broke cover he soon went to earth. It
was then so late in the day that the
chase was abandoned until Saturday.

COQUETTING WITH THE DOGS.

Bright and early on Saturday morning
huntsmen and dogs were in Quaker
Neck, having accepted an invitation of
Mr. Thomas Maslin to come into that
section. One of the gamest foxes in the
county "lays" in that territory, and he
was "jumped" on the farm of Mr.
Richard Leaverton. This fellow came
out with a splendid dash, and it was
thought that great sport was in store.
He seemed to be in full sympathy with
the fun, but after coquetting with the
hounds for three-quarters of an hour he
dodged into an earth and bid defiance to
his pursuers.

The huntsmen then determined to try
an old fellow in Broad Neck which is a
warm personal friend of those veterans,
Walter B. Strong, Thos. W. Trew, C. M.
Brown and others. This fox was soon
started but with characteristic fickleness
soon "went to earth."

Then the noted Bushfoot fox was
"looked up," and he gave the finest run
of the two days. Dr. Frank Keating
declared it to be "the run of my life."
Dr. Earle and Master of Hounds Don-
sall were equally enthusiastic. This
fellow kept the sport up just as long as
it was safe for the huntsmen to be out,
then flitted into his earth on the bay
shore.

delightful luncheon, at the rooms of the
Buck House Club. Oysters were served
in every style as only the expert Eastern
Shore cook knows how to serve them,
and every necessary embellishment of
the feast was thrown in. About seventy-
five Kent and Queen Anne hunters were
invited to be present to meet the honored
guests of the occasion.

On Saturday evening Hope H. Bar-
roll, Esq., extended a delightful
luncheon to Dr. Keating, Mr. Bon-
sall and Mr. Ewing, Dr. Earle, Mr.
Cross and Mr. Gardner having returned
to Baltimore on the afternoon boat. Mr.
Harry Nicols bought one of the thor-
oughbred mounts brought to Kent by mem-
bers of the Green Spring Valley Club.

Monday they hunted through Pickering,
a celebrated hunting ground, and soon

a couple of hours chase took to a hollow
tree. The dogs were drawn and another
fox soon started, which gave them sport
for the balance of the day. Their in-

Tuesday, but the continued heavy rains
prevented and they left for their homes.

COURT NEXT WEEK.

The Shaw-Groves Damage Case on Trial at
Easton To-day.

The special term of the Kent county
court will convene on Monday, pursu-
ant to adjournment.

The \$100,000 damage case of McKenzie
vs. the Jacob Tomb Institute is set for
trial the first day and will probably
occupy three days. There are seventeen
witnesses in the case. A heavy legal
battle of attorneys is anticipated. Har-
rison W. Vickers, Esq., has been retained
as local counsel in this case.

The railroad case, also moved from
Cecil to the local court, it is expected,
will come up on Thursday, or just so
soon as the McKenzie-Tomb Institute
case is finished, be that when it may.
There are eleven witnesses in this case.

The juries in these cases will be drawn
from the regular panel of twenty-five
petit jurors.

THE SHAW-GROVES CASE.

The \$5,000 damage case of A. S. Groves
vs. Mrs. Lydia C. Shaw was called for
trial at Easton yesterday and will close
to-day.

did not attend.

Loud, Thomas V. Simpson, Kennard
Carter and W. W. Hubbard. Messrs.
Hubbard and Carter were excused from
attendance.

An Artist's Success.—At the recent
exhibition in Philadelphia of the Ameri-
can Art Society of Paintings and Sculp-
ture, Mr. Claude H. W. Schuyler sold
three of his paintings and received a
silver medal for one of his landscapes.
It was painted near his residence in
Berterton, and was called the "Old
Maryland Cabin." It represented the
primitive style of "ye olden-time" col-
ored cabin, with clustering vines grow-
ing around the doors and windows, and
sunshine playing hide and seek among
the leaves. Some colored children eat-
ing water-melon on the grass completed
the characteristic scene. Another pic-
ture, "The Golden Harvest," was painted
in Mr. James B. Canby's wheat field, at
Berterton, when the July sun was throw-
ing a golden haze over nature. "A view
on the Sassafras" represented a grove of
cedars and sand dunes on the famous
Stonetown gunning bar that separates the
blue waters of Sassafras from the peace-
ful, lake-like scenery of Lloyd's creek.
