NOT IN YEARS has the Thanksgiving spirit been more manifest throughout the country than this year. While there were many things to awaken feelings of profound regret; while sorrows and great shadows overcast the lives and homes of many, yet there were few, indeed none, who had not reasons for sincere thankfulness and praise. There is truly nothing so bad that it might not be worse, and it is well that the Thanksgiving habit is on the increase rather than on the wane. Thankfulness and praise to the Dispenser of all good are necessities of the human heart and should be cultivated as necessary to every well-rounded christian life.

THERE is a far-reaching demand for a reorganization of the Maryland Democracy. A call that new men and new measures come to the front as potent factors in the rehabilitation of the State organization. The people give an unqualified endorsement to these demands, but their greatest embarrassment is as to who are to make the selections of new men and new measures. Could the people be made to fully realize their responsibility and potency in solving this problem, the embarrassments would be overcome; our policies would be fashioned along the line of higher ideals, political methods would be purified, and a general betterment of conditions would result. The overshadowing trouble in matters of political reorganization is the timidity or lack of interest among the great voting masses in whose hands the remedy for these conditions lies. If the professional politician is to be left in absolute control of the proposed reorganization of the Maryland Democracy, then the difference before and after will simply be the difference between twaddled and tweedledum.

Will the people not rise to their responsibility in this matter and take a hand in the work of reinstating Democratic principles as the dominant political factor in Maryland? It is Lord Fountleroy politics pure and simple; to sit supinely by and carp and find fault with the men who make their living from the political crib, and do absolutely nothing to curb their mad career in debauching the people's rights.

A DISPATCH from Washington says: "The hope for trust legislation by Congress in the near future seems to be getting dimmer and dimmer."

"This conclusion is drawn from the repeatedly expressed sentiment of Republican Senators and Representatives now arriving to the effect that legislation 'ought to be enacted bearing upon trusts, but the tariff must not be touched.'"

"From 10 or 12 leading Republican Senators who have reached here the word has gone forth in effect in this way: 'It is not practicable to touch the tariff. The tariff ought not to be revised, but we must take some action on the trust question.'"

"The question naturally arises as a result of that statement, how can the trusts be reached unless by way of the tariff? It is conceded by Republicans generally that the Sherman Anti-Trust law is ineffective, and a constitutional amendment is regarded, so far as being a reasonably immediate remedy is concerned, as out of the question. The only avenue by which the trusts can be reached, therefore is the tariff."

It is unfortunate that President Roosevelt appropriates so great a portion of his time to hunting and speech-making rather than to cultivating strenuously the bearing with direct force upon these great national issues of such vital importance to the great masses of the American people. Did he say half as much in his advocacy of suppressing notional evils of the trust kind as he is delivering himself of along far less important lines, the whole people would be benefited. Could not the Southern people, for instance, spare the President for a sufficient length of time from their banquets to allow him to commune for a season (be it ever so short) with the great evils which oppress the entire people? At least they should try.

THE PEOPLE of Chestertown are to be congratulated upon having a public school building commensurate with the demands of one of the most cultured and intelligent towns of the State. The question now presents itself—what will be done with the old barracks in which teachers and children have for so many tedious years been educated to death or to physical wrecks? It is suggested that the old buildings be given to the colored children. If the sanitary conditions are such as to render them unfit for occupancy by white children, then they are not fit for colored children. There should be a public school building for these children, but it should be a suitable structure in a portion of the town most convenient to those who will use it. Available locations are to be easily found in Lynchburg, and that section would be a suitable place for such a building.

CHURCH ANNIVERSARY.

Rev. J. W. Talley, pastor of Rock Hall M. E. Church, will celebrate the first anniversary of the building of the handsome new church, to-morrow. Presiding Elder Corkran, Rev. C. T. Wyatt and Rev. George L. Hardesty will preach during the day. Mr. Talley has raised \$1,000 on the church debt and feels confident that the entire indebtedness will be wiped out. A cordial invitation is extended to all to attend the interesting services.

The church was dedicated January 6th, 1901, and at the time \$1400 was raised, leaving a balance of about \$2500. Rev. Talley came to this charge December 1st, 1901, and since that time all obligations of the church have been raised and met at the end of each month, and the church today is in a splendid and healthy condition. With the building debt liquidated it will be able to pay a better salary to the pastor, and that means that the church must prosper.

Rev. J. W. Talley preached a most excellent sermon to the Jr. O. U. A. M. of Rock Hall on Sunday morning. His text was the 137 Psalm, 6 and 7 verses—"If I do not remember thee, let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth; if I prefer not Jerusalem above my chief joy." "Remember, O Lord, the children of Edom in the day of Jerusalem; who said, Raise it, raise it, even to the foundation thereof." Quite a goodly number of the order were out. The sermon was a plain practical talk, and if the advice of the preacher is heeded there is no doubt it will be beneficial to the order as a patriotic organization, and good results will follow.

WHEAT—The market for southern wheat today was fractionally firmer at the opening, with receipts, however, very small and business restricted. Sales on grade at 76½ cents for No 2 red, 73½ for steamer 2 red, and 68½ cents for rejected. Demand continues good for prime, merchantable wheats.

Western yesterday afternoon was firm. December, 76½@76¾.

CORN—Receipts for today, 82,467 bus., viz., 8,878 bus. southern and 73,589 bus. western. Shipments from elevators 246 bus. Stock in elevators, 333,036 bus. The arrivals of southern corn today were only moderate in amount, and in sympathy with weaker Western advices. The market opened quiet and one cent per bushel lower. All the offerings today sold to shippers on grade at 63 cents for No. 2 white, yellow or mixed; 53 for steamer; 56 cents for No. 3 of either color and 55 cents for rejected, aflloat.

COB CORN: Under freer supplies, and in sympathy with the recent easier feeling in shelled corn, the market for cob is quiet and inclined to be lower. We quote carloads prime yellow on spot at \$2.80@2.85 per bu.

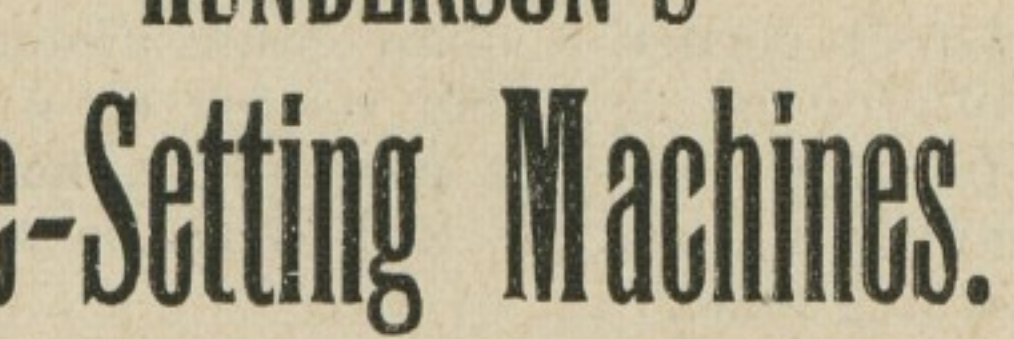
