INTRODUCTION.

January 1st, 1903 marked the beginning of my official connection with the Chestertown Transcript, as one of its editors and managers. For some years it has been my ambition to engage in business in my native town, and to labor with its noble and generous-hearted people in everything that pertains to the moral, material and intellectual uplift of the town and county. I come at the solicitation of my friends, and I am confident that I shall receive a hearty welcome and that I shall always find that noble-minded co-operation and sympathy for which the good people of the town and county are noted. It is not the least difficult task to conduct a newspaper to the satisfaction of an entire community. This the editors do not expect to accomplish. But it will be the purpose of this paper to adhere to the principles of honesty and fair-dealing in every particular. We consider this paper the mouth-piece of the people of Kent county, and being such we shall endeavor to state the truth and do every thing in our power to lift the community up to the broadest principles of good citizenship, and to inspire all concerned with the desire for purity and honesty in all our dealings. And in this connection let me state that the columns of this paper will never be used for any other purpose than to voice the sentiment of the people concerning all matters that pertain to their well-being. It is not the function of a newspaper to indulge in petty personal flings and insinuating sarcasms, and we sincerely trust that we shall never feel ourselves compelled to stoop to the level of the common channel of useless and unprofitable vituperation. We shall ever have a high and considerate regard for the opinions of others, and yet we hope to show sufficient independence of thought in our utterances and dealings with our fellows, to give them a good impression of our sincerity. The politics of the paper will not be changed on account of my connection with the paper. People do not exist for a paper, but a paper exists by and through the patronage of a people, and rather than dictate and dominate the issues with which the people have most to do, this paper will choose rather to be the herald of the people's will in matters pertaining to the welfare of the county and State. With this introductory statement as to the policy of the Chestertown Transcript so far as I, as one of its editors, am concerned, I ask the hearty co-operation and patronage of my numerous friends in the town and county, believing that they will respond as they have done heretofore, in a very generous manner, and assuring them that I shall labor always for the very best interests of my dear old town and for Maryland, my Maryland.

NEXT MARYLAND LEGISLATION.

There will doubtless be a rattling of political dry bones in the campaign of next fall for the control of the next Maryland Legislature. The faithful of both parties will tremble with applause and an ineffable sweetness will radiate the countenances of the faithful and true. The political prophet of the Baltimore American is in no wise disposed to underestimate the fierceness of the pending struggle. He is sharp and full of knowledge. Hear him as he suffuses the Sunday columns of the American.

He says: "In the throes of the political campaign next year in Maryland there will stand out prominently and as overshadowing the contest for governor and other State offices, a desperate, almost hand-to-hand conflict for the control of the legislature, whose sessions will begin at Annapolis a little over a year hence. The stake in sight will be large and will command the attention and the interest, not only of the leaders of the two political parties, but also of others, including corporations, whose welfare and prosperity are closely allied with the acts of the General Assembly."

This seer of Maryland politics, this student of political planets has surrendered his lastings and sings of victory to the Republican hosts. He selects battle grounds and scents victory in advance. He warbles and sings as the nightingale, and no regrettable language escapes him in his outlook in the counties." He insists that

"The counties which seem reasonably certain of electing Republicans next year are Calvert, Frederick, Garrett, Kent, Somerset, Washington, and one district, the Fourth, of this city, a total of seven, who, with the five holdovers, will give the Republicans a total of 12, or two less than a constitutional majority."

"The counties in which vacancies occur and which under ordinary circumstances ought to elect Democratic senators are Baltimore county, Howard,

Queen Annes, and two districts of Baltimore city, who, with the seven holdovers, will make a total of 12.

"Because of the changes in Anne Arundel, Carroll and Wicomico counties in recent years it looks as though these counties will be the battleground, though, of course, neither party will in advance abandon a single county to the other."

Only a word in passing is given to Kent. The local outlook is only referred to as being "reasonably certain" for Republican success. This is, however, a pleasant game at which more than one can play. The Democracy of Kent, as well as the editorial writer of the American, will be found at the table when the big stake is distributed. Issues are of such importance as to call forth the most strenuous efforts of the people and the arbitrament of the ballot will decide in favor of the Democratic contention in local as well as State and national affairs.

However, the political horizon from the present on, will furnish an interesting and pleasant field for study. The political complexion of the next Legislature is the paramount issue with the voters of the State. No editorial writer can overdraw its importance to the well-being of the entire people.

Miss Kelley and Miss Edith Jacobs, of Baltimore, are the guests of Miss Violet Moore, on Idlewild ave.

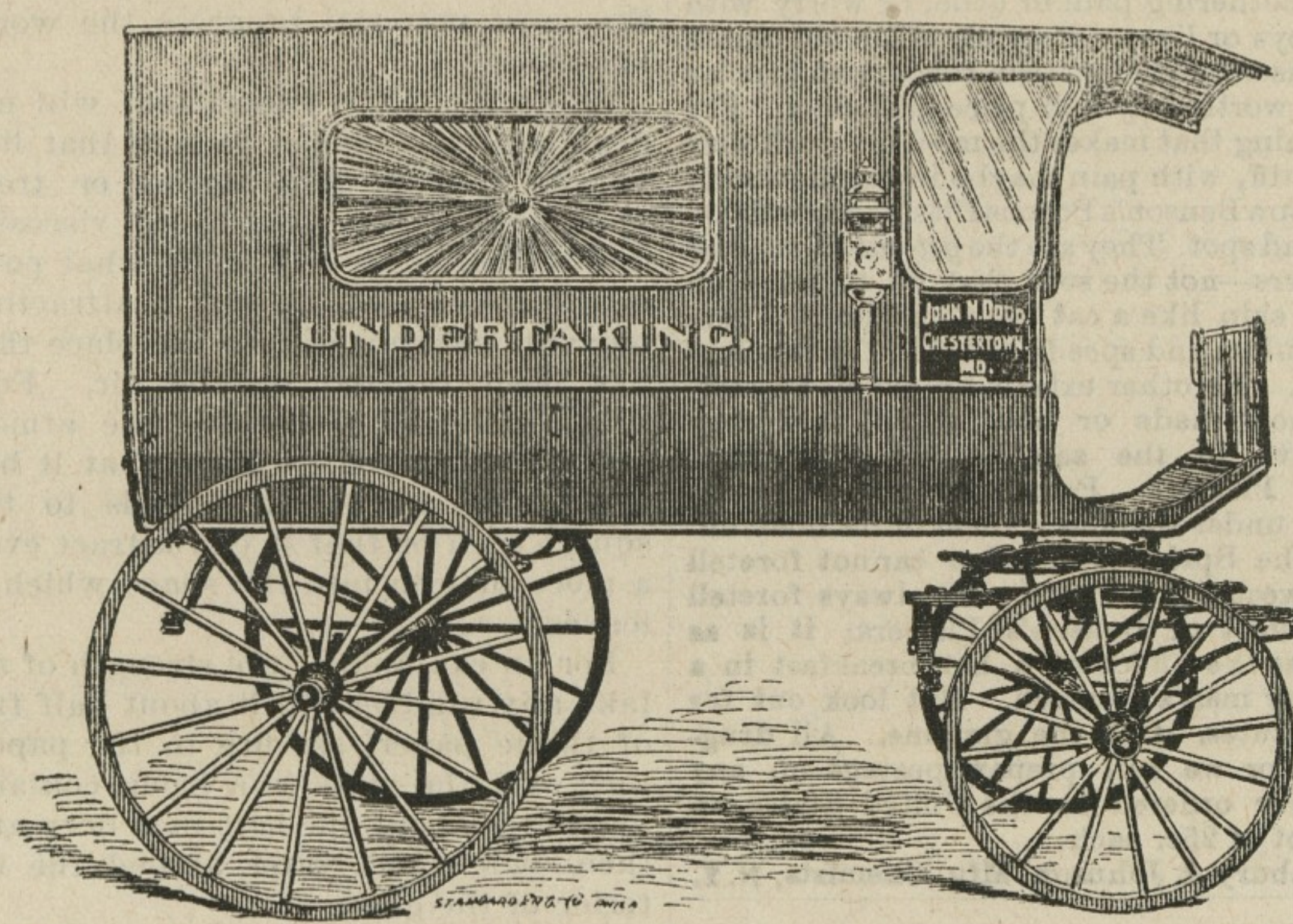

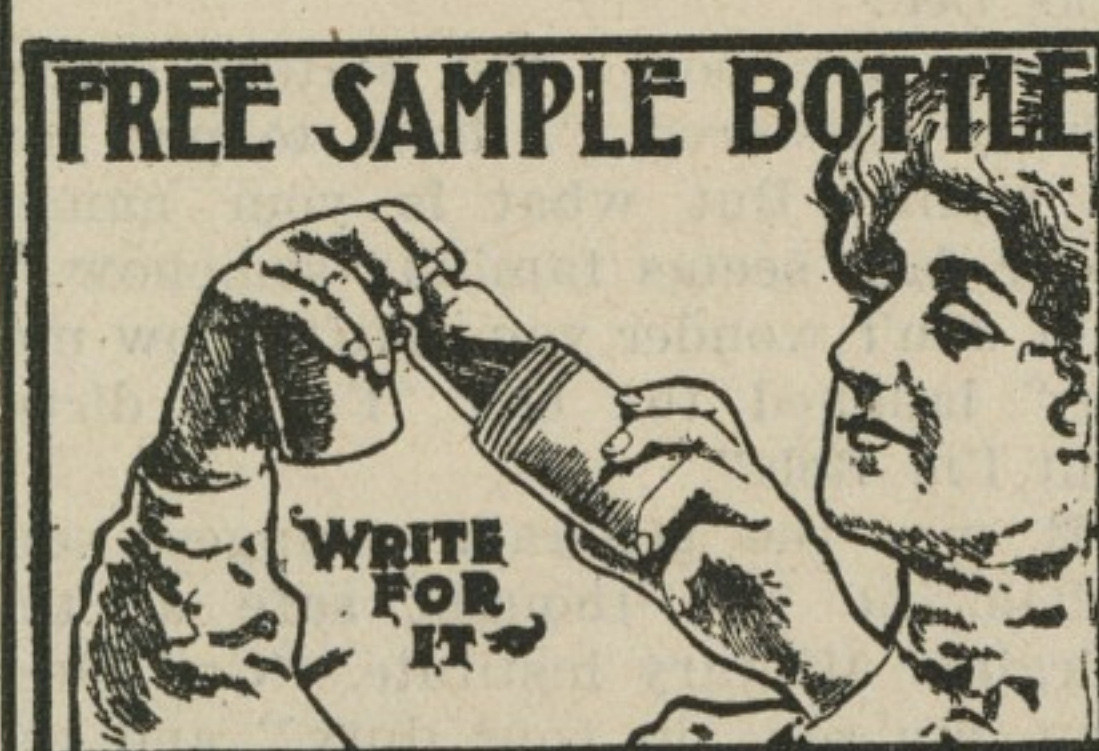
