CIRCUIT COURT.

The adjourned October term of the
Circuit Court for Kent county convened
Tuesday morning with judges Pearce
and Martain on the bench, Judge Brown
joining them later in the day.

The case of Albert Goodwin vs. the
county commissioners of Kent county
for damages was first called and occu-
pied the court until Friday morning.
Mr. Goodwin sued the commissioners for
\$5,000 for backing water up on his land
by some repairs they made to the public
road in front of his farm. The jury re-
turned a verdict Thursday night of
\$37.08 for Mr. Goodwin. Mr. Barroll
represented Mr. Goodwin and Messrs.
Townsend and Urie the commissioners.

The court heard argument Wednesday
night in the case of James W. Stevens,
purchaser, vs. Miss Willie Wickes, de-
fendant. Miss Wickes was represented
by Charles J. Bonaparte, Esq., of Bal-
timore; Mr. Stevens by Frederick W.
Story, Esq., of Baltimore, and Hope H.
Barroll, Esq., trustee, by James P. Gor-
ter, Esq., of Baltimore. The full particu-
lars of this now celebrated case,
which involves the ownership of
the Wickliffe farm on Eastern Neck
Island, were published in full in our issue
of July 26.
