OBITUARY.

JOHN EDWARD STARTT.

John Edward Startt, formerly of Kent county, died at his residence 1800 West Fayette street, Baltimore, last Friday of consumption aged 82 years. Mr. Startt was Index Clerk in the Superior Court, of Baltimore city, and in the early fall was compelled to resign his position owing to ill health and went to Saranac Lake, in New York, with hopes of regaining his health but consumption had made inroads on his constitution which resulted in his death as above stated. He had the best medical advice and careful nursing throughout his illness. He was the son of Mr. Gustavus Startt, also now of Baltimore, and moved to Baltimore about twelve years ago. He had recently entered upon his second term as Index Clerk in the Superior Court and was one of the best known members of the office. Always courteous and affable he made many friends, who with his bereaved wife and relatives deeply mourn his loss. Mr. Startt about three years ago married Miss Martha Haddaway, of Baltimore, who, with one little boy of 2 years, survives him. His funeral took place from his late residence on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment in Mt. Olivet cemetery. Mr. W. R. Startt, of near Pomona, is a brother of the deceased. Two other brothers, Gustavus, Jr., and Mason Startt reside in Baltimore.

MR. EDGAR PRICE.

Mr. Edgar Price, a prominent farmer of the first district, died at his home on the Hazel farm, near Millington, of paralysis, Sunday last, Jan. 11, aged 66 years. He was born in Delaware in 1837, and came to this county many years ago. Mr. Price was a Republican in politics and in former years was prominent in his party, having been nominated several times for county commissioner and judge of the Orphans' Court, but was never elected to either office. He leaves a widow, a Miss Annie S. Bennett before marriage, who is a sister of Mr. John R. Bennett and Mrs. Isaac Cleaver, of Kennedyville; two daughters, Miss Alida, of the Melrose Massachusetts Sanitarium, and Mrs. Jennie Painter, of Wilmington, Del., and three sons, Clarence, of Millington, Wm. A., a representative in the Delaware Legislature, and Thomas, collector for the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal Co., at Chesapeake City. Mr. Price in the latter years of his life became a member of the Seventh Day Adventist Church. Funeral services were held Wednesday morning by Elder J. J. Jones; interment at Hickory Grove Cemetery, St. George's, Del.

JOHN GOLDSBOROUGH.

Mr. John Goldsborough died in Centreville Saturday night, aged 76 years. He was appointed messenger in the Sub-treasury, Baltimore, during Cleveland's administration, which position he had occupied until a few days previous to his death. He was born, and lived the greater part of his life, in Centreville. He leaves the following children: Mrs. Lavina Jump, Misses Henrietta and Mary E. Goldsborough, Messrs. William L., Daniel N., E. Beverly and B. Palmer Goldsborough. Mr. Goldsborough was a former resident of Chestertown, and at one time proprietor of the Vossell House.

J. BENJAMIN KRUSEN.

Mr. J. Benjamin Krusen, son of Mr. C. B. Krusen, died at the residence of his father at Still Pond, Saturday morning last, of consumption, aged 27 years. Mr. Krusen was an undertaker and was engaged in business at Smyrna, Del. He was a member of the M. E. Church and a christian gentleman. Mr. Krusen was highly esteemed by a large circle of friends. A number of citizens of Smyrna were in attendance at his funeral at Still Pond on Monday afternoon. Presiding Elder Cochran, assisted by Revs. Messrs. Beauchamp, of Still Pond, and Collins, of Smyrna, officiating. Interment at Still Pond cemetery.

EDWARD KIKER.

Mr. Edward Kiker (more familiarly known as Dad Kiker) a highly respected citizen of Wor-ton Station, this county, died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Edward L. Caffrey, in Germantown, Pa., where he was visiting at the time, aged 76 years. Mr. Kiker was paralyzed some time ago from which he never fully recovered. He was for many years a stock dealer, and was well known throughout the county. A widow; three daughters and two sons survive him. Interment was held at Greenmount cemetery, Germantown, Thursday last.

MARY A. HURLLOCK.

Mrs. Mary A. Hurllock, wife of Mr. David Hurllock, of near Church Hill, died of paralysis at the residence of her son, Mr. D. Thomas Hurllock, Jan. 6, aged 76 years. Interment in Church Hill cemetery.

MRS. PHOEBE ANNE JEROME.

Mrs. Phoebe Anne Jerome, widow of the late Jesse Jerome, died early Tuesday morning, of paralysis, at the home of Mrs. John F. Copper, near Chestertown, aged 77 years. She leaves three sons, John C. Jerome, of Quaker Neck; James E., and Jesse Jerome, of Rock Hall. Funeral services were held at the residence of Mrs. Copper, conducted by Rev. A. H. Covey, of Bond Chapel; interment at Bond Chapel cemetery. Bearers: I. R. Leaverton; Wm. Lee, J. Edward Lamb, George Bell, Wm. T. Nicholson and Wm. Ford. John N. Dodd funeral director.

THOMAS BROWN.

Mr. Thomas Brown, of New York, and brother of C. C. Brown, Wm. Brown, Henry Brown, and Mrs. W. S. Trew, of this county, died in that city Wednesday night of paralysis. Mr. Brown was a drummer for a drug supply company of New York. His remains were brought to Chestertown by train yesterday and will be buried on the Comegys farm in Quaker Neck to-day, beside these of his wife.

COL. HARRY C. PENNINGTON.

Col. Harry C. Pennington, a former resident of Kent county, died at his home in Seaford, Del., last Friday night, aged 60 years. The deceased was a well-known hotel man, and had managed hotels at Kennedyville, Millington and Crumpton, previous to his removal to Delaware. He was a colonel on the staff of former Governor Tunnel, of Delaware.

MRS. CORA E. WALRAVEN.

Mrs. Cora E., wife of Dr. Frank Walraven, of Sistriville, W. Va., and formerly of this county, whose illness, which resulted from an accident on a railroad, was published in the TRANSCRIPT at the time, died on Tuesday last from her injuries. Mrs. Walraven was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. P. Riffin.

MARKUS NEW.

Mr. Markus New, 59 years old, died last Wednesday at his home in Baltimore, 218 Aisquith street, after a brief illness. Mr. New was for many years a prominent horse dealer in Kent county and was well known by many citizens of the Eastern Shore.

FIRE RECORD.

The dwelling house on the farm owned by the late R. T. Cochran, and tenanted by Mr. A. Wilson Cochran, near Sasfras, was destroyed by fire about nine o'clock Sunday night last. The fire is supposed to have originated from the flue or chimney in the kitchen part of the building. Mr. Cochran and family retired about 8 p. m. and an hour later were awakened by their colored cook, whose bed-room was over the kitchen, calling to him that the house was on fire. Mr. Cochran was able to save much of his household effects, but the building was quickly consumed. This is said to have been one of the finest farm residences in the county. It was insured for \$5,000, in the Continental and Home companies, represented by Mr. James G. Beck. An insurance of \$150 was also carried by Mr. Cochran on his household furniture in the Continental Insurance Co. None of the outbuildings were destroyed. After the fire Mr. Cochran and his family were cared for by Mr. Anthony H. Johnson.

The dwelling on the farm owned by Mr. Alday Clements, and tenanted by Mr. Biddle, on Cherry Lane, near Chestertown, was destroyed by fire early Monday morning last. The origin is unknown. The building was insured in the Kent Mutual Company for \$800. Mr. Biddle lost nearly all of his furniture and about \$50 in money.

CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

The January term of the Circuit Court completed its session on Tuesday night. The case of Joshua T. Caulk, colored, vs. Geo. W. Walker, which was on trial when we went to press last week, resulted in a verdict for Caulk. Lewin W. Wickes, Esq., represented Caulk, and Hope H. Barroll, Walker.

The case of John S. Vandegrift vs. W. A. Burke, over right-of-way of an alley between their properties on Cross street, full particulars of which have been previously published in the TRANSCRIPT, was taken up Saturday morning and concluded Tuesday night, resulting in a verdict for Mr. Burke, by the court taking the case from the jury. W. W. Beck, Esq., represented Mr. Burke and H. H. Barroll, Mr. Vandegrift. Court then adjourned sine die.

The case of Wm. Numson, Sons & Co., vs. Mr. R. F. Parks was removed to Queen Anne county and will come up for trial at the May term in that county. The case was tried at the last October term in this county, but the jury failed to agree.
