COUNTRY SCHOOLS—THE NEW PLAN.

and the impetus of the movement in his State is largely due to his efforts.

"By the consolidation method we solve, in a great degree, the problem of 'how to keep the boys on the farm,'" says Superintendent Nelson. "We bring to the home life of the farm what the boy goes to the city to get. Such a school may also become the social and intellectual centre of the community. With a library, music classes, debating club, and athletic associations, our boys and girls will not be so ready to leave the home for the uncertainties of city life. Then, again, through the unity thus established there will come a larger social life to the older members of the community. Lecture courses may be carried out, circulating libraries may be founded, and literary clubs formed. This enrichment and preservation of our rural life is one of the most important problems of our times."

Superintendent J. W. Olsen, of Minnesota, speaks along the same lines. He says: "The small rural school offers no educational future to the boy; it holds out for him no advancing interest to counteract the allurements of outside life. The consolidated school, with the better equipment, larger attendance, new stimulus for work, opening broader horizons of life will hold the pupils, because it gives them opportunity to see what is before them to achieve, and makes more tangible the results of their own work. Under this system the farm becomes the ideal place to bring up children, enabling them to obtain the school advantages enjoyed by our centers of population, and yet to spend their evening and holiday time in the country, under the constant tender care of father and mother, in contact with nature and plenty of work, instead of idly loafing about town."

That there is plenty of room for consolidation is shown by the attendance in the schools of representative States. In Iowa over 9,000 schools, out of a total of 13,000 in the State, have an average attendance of less than twenty, and in more than 2,500 schools the attendance is under ten. In Wisconsin about 1,000 schools report an average attendance of less than ten. In Indiana more than fifty per cent. of the schools have an attendance under twenty, and even in thickly settled Connecticut ten per cent. of the schools have an average attendance of less than eight pupils.

The consolidation movement is only in its infancy, but the rapidity with which it is spreading is shown by the fact that in Ohio twenty-three townships have all their schools completely centralized, while in a hundred or more others there is partial centralization. In Iowa the consolidation plan is in operation in twenty-eight counties, and in Indiana in forty-four counties. Without doubt the consolidation system will, within the present decade, bring about a radical change in the rural schools of every State in which the plan is practicable.—*The Outlook.*

COLOMBIA'S BENEFITS FROM A CANAL.

It should be remembered that the great canal we propose to build is not for anybody's pecuniary profit, and it is to be open to the ships of the whole world. In so far as Colombia, which, like our own country, lies on both oceans, may in future develop a merchant marine and a navy, it is of the highest importance that such a canal should be built. And it is certainly desirable for Colombia that the canal should be in the hands of a friendly power that could have no motive for aggression, and that could guarantee to Colombia the most favorable possible use of the passage for her public vessels, and for her coasting trade and merchant marine. For the United States to take charge of the Isthmus, thus protecting Colombia against revolutionary disturbances in that remote region, and for the United States further to build a canal and give Colombia the use of it, would be beneficial in the highest sense, through many centuries to come, to the people of the South American republic. Nothing else could promise so much for the stability and development of the great latent resources of Colombia as to have the United States as a firmly established neighbor on the Isthmus, with the great canal open to the peaceful traffic of the whole world.—From "The Progress of the World," in the *American Monthly Review of Reviews* for February.

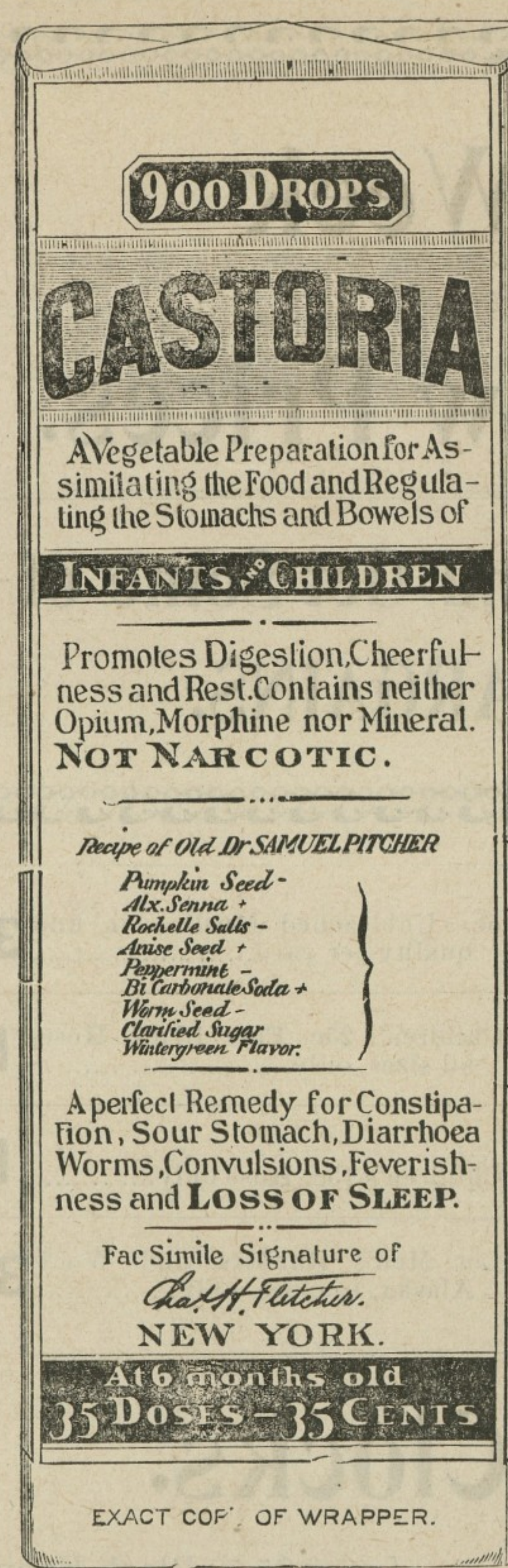
The following table was worked out by a Harvard professor. It is interesting to look at, but one is thankful it is not included among the multiplication tables:
