THE CATTLE QUESTION.

The following letter from a former
Kent contains explanation itself:
Colorado Springs, April 2, 1903.
CHESTERTOWN TRANSCRIPT, Messrs.
Editors:—I noticed two articles in your
paper about the Poiled Angus cattle. I
have seen quite a number herds of Angus
cattle; they are very fine beef cattle, I
saw two coming three year old weigh
sixteen and eighteen hundred pounds.
I am quite sure that a great many farm-
ers are not familiar with the Angus
cattle. I will say that I am quite sure
the Hereford cattle are the better of the
two breeds. My reasons: first, the
Angus cattle will not increase as fast as
the Hereford; another, they will de-
crease sooner than the Hereford unless
more pains are taken in changing bulls,
and they do not make as good crosses as
the Herefords. Again, they are not as
good milkers as the Hereford. I know
a company that turned two hundred
Angus cattle among Herefords; the
Herefords were by far in the lead in
increase, and the crosses were the better
of the two. The Herefords are a beef
breed of cattle able to compete with any
beef breed of cattle that may exist.
