WHITEHALL BURNED.

The Beautiful Country Seat of Mrs. Wm. H. Stewart Burned—Loss Only Partially Covered by Insurance.

On last Friday evening, between 7 and 7:30 o'clock, a bright light to the north of Chestertown gave evidence that a fire of considerable magnitude was in progress. The rumor was soon abroad that the dwelling of Mrs. Wm. H. Stewart was on fire, but everyone was loth to believe such news. But it was soon confirmed and everybody was regretting that Whitehall was in ashes. The fire was discovered about 7 o'clock by a Mr. Anderson, a tenant. The family was inside the house totally unconscious of the situation. So quickly did the flames spread that no time was given to save anything except a few pieces of furniture and the piano.

Whitehall was one of the most beautiful country seats in Kent county. The original building was of brick to which was built a large frame addition at a cost of \$4,000 or \$5,000, a few years before the death of the late Wm. H. Stewart, making it a handsome home. For some years a large insurance was carried on the house but after the death of Mr. Stewart, when the family wished to leave the house unoccupied during some of the summer months, the insurance company refused to carry the risk, and the property was re-insured in the Kent Mutual for \$2,400, \$600 was carried on the furniture, in the Home Insurance Co., of New York. The Stewart family have occupied Whitehall nearly 43 years. Situated about 2 1/2 miles from town, it made one of the most conveniently located homes in Kent. A large circle of friends extend sympathy to the family for their loss.

BASE BALL.

Washington College Loses its First Game of the Season With Delaware.

The base ball season was inaugurated at Washington College on Friday April 18. The home team had its opponents Delaware College. The day was about as disagreeable for base ball as could be well imagined. A raw, stiff wind was blowing, making it uncomfortable for the players and a great deal more so for spectators. The large score shows that good playing on either side was scarce. Washington College is sadly in need of a good pitcher and a good catcher. Marine and Powell, of last year's team did not return, and the second team battery is hardly up to championship form yet. Outside of that the nine is better than it was last year. Truitt at third base can more than fill Noble's shoes, and Crew at Second can play all around Gundy. In the outfield, Jefferson in left field can attend to everything that comes, and in the two new men Schutz and Newton, the club has good material.

With a good battery then, and with the two who are now acting in that capacity—used as utility men, or regularly, the team is in much better shape than it has been for several years. Moore, as a pitcher, will develop, and in a year or two will make good. The same can be said of Hughes as a catcher. With a good battery to fall back on, and these two to use in an emergency or in games already won, Washington College could not fail to maintain her wonted position in the base ball world of Maryland Colleges. As to the game with Delaware, nothing special can be said. It was just a question of who should make the most runs to win. COURT IN SESSION.

April Term Convened On Monday—An Adjourned Term is Called for June.

The Circuit Court for Kent county convened on Monday with Chief Judge J. A. Pearce on the bench. Associate Judges Martin and Brown arrived and took their seats on the bench about noon.

Mr. T. Romie Strong was selected as foreman of the grand jury and the following named gentlemen drawn to compose that body:

Judge Pearce, in his charge to the grand jury, referred chiefly to the Brown-McCray murder case as the most important for their investigation.

On motion of Wm. W. Beck, Esq., Horace B. Constable, Esq., and on motion of M. deK. Smith, Esq., John G. Ennor, of the Baltimore bar, were admitted to practice at the Kent county bar.

Messrs. S. Tilden Cooper and James T. Crew were drawn to serve as jurors in place of Messrs. Edgar P. Beck and John B. Parrott, excused.

The first case taken up was M. J. McWhorter and Wm. W. Beck, administrators of Thomas J. McWhorter vs. W. C. Rolph and Annie Rolph. Appeal from Justice Townsend; jury trial. Justice reversed; verdict for McWhorter and Beck. Lewin W. Wickes, Esq., for McWhorter and Beck and Hope H. Barroll, Esq., for Rolph.

TUESDAY.

At the conclusion of the McWhorter and Rolph case the case of Grollman, a stock dealer, vs. I. R. Leaverton was taken up. Jury trial. Mr. Leaverton and Mr. Grollman had some difference over some lambs which Mr. Leaverton sold to Mr. Grollman, and Grollman sued Mr. Leaverton. The jury returned a verdict for Mr. Grollman for \$1.90. W. Beck, Esq., for Grollman and Hope H. Barroll, Esq., for Leaverton.

The grand jury returned a true bill against James Brown for killing Tobe McCray, and two against Josh Jackson for violation of the local option law.

WEDNESDAY.

The case of Fletcher Caulk vs. A. P. Laws was next called; jury trial. This was a case in which Mr. Laws, of Sassafras, sued Mr. Caulk for killing his dog. The case was tried last fall before Mr. Henry Parr, Justice of the Peace at Galena. Mr. Laws sued for \$50 damages and Mr. Parr gave him judgment for that amount. Mr. Caulk appealed to the Circuit Court and the jury gave Mr. Laws a verdict for \$10 damages. Messrs. Hynson and Smith represented Mr. Laws and Hope H. Barroll, Esq., Mr. Caulk.

The grand jury returned true bills against Frank Cannon for violation of the local option law; Hayward Middleton for violation of the local option law; Henry Nichols larceny of wool; Annie Graves and Vinie Graves, larceny of turkeys.

THURSDAY.

State vs. William Burrell, colored, for cruelty to his child and carrying concealed weapons, was tried before a jury. Verdict, guilty, and sentenced by the court to twelve months in the House of Correction. W. W. Beck for Burrell and Urie for State.

The grand jury returned true bills against Edwin Broadway, Warner Keating and William Beaverly, larceny of money; Hayward Middleton for violation of local option law.

FRIDAY.

The case of Catharine J. Hatcherson vs. Thomas Collier was on trial at the hour of going to press. This case grew out of a dispute over a boundary line which involves about one-half acre of land. The trial is before a jury and Mrs. Hatcherson is represented by Lewin W. Wickes, Esq., and Mr. Collier by Hope H. Barroll, Esq.

COURT NOTES.

The following removed cases from Cecil and Caroline counties—Gather vs. P. B. & W. railroad; Emmons vs. the commissioners of Chesapeake City and Rickards vs. Rickards, have all been carried over to an adjourned term to be held in June.

Col. Joseph B. Seth, of the Eastern bar, Albert Constable, Esq., and Wm. H. Evans, Esq., of the Elkton bar, were in attendance upon the Kent county circuit court this week.

The court held sessions Wednesday and Thursday evenings in order to hurry business through.
