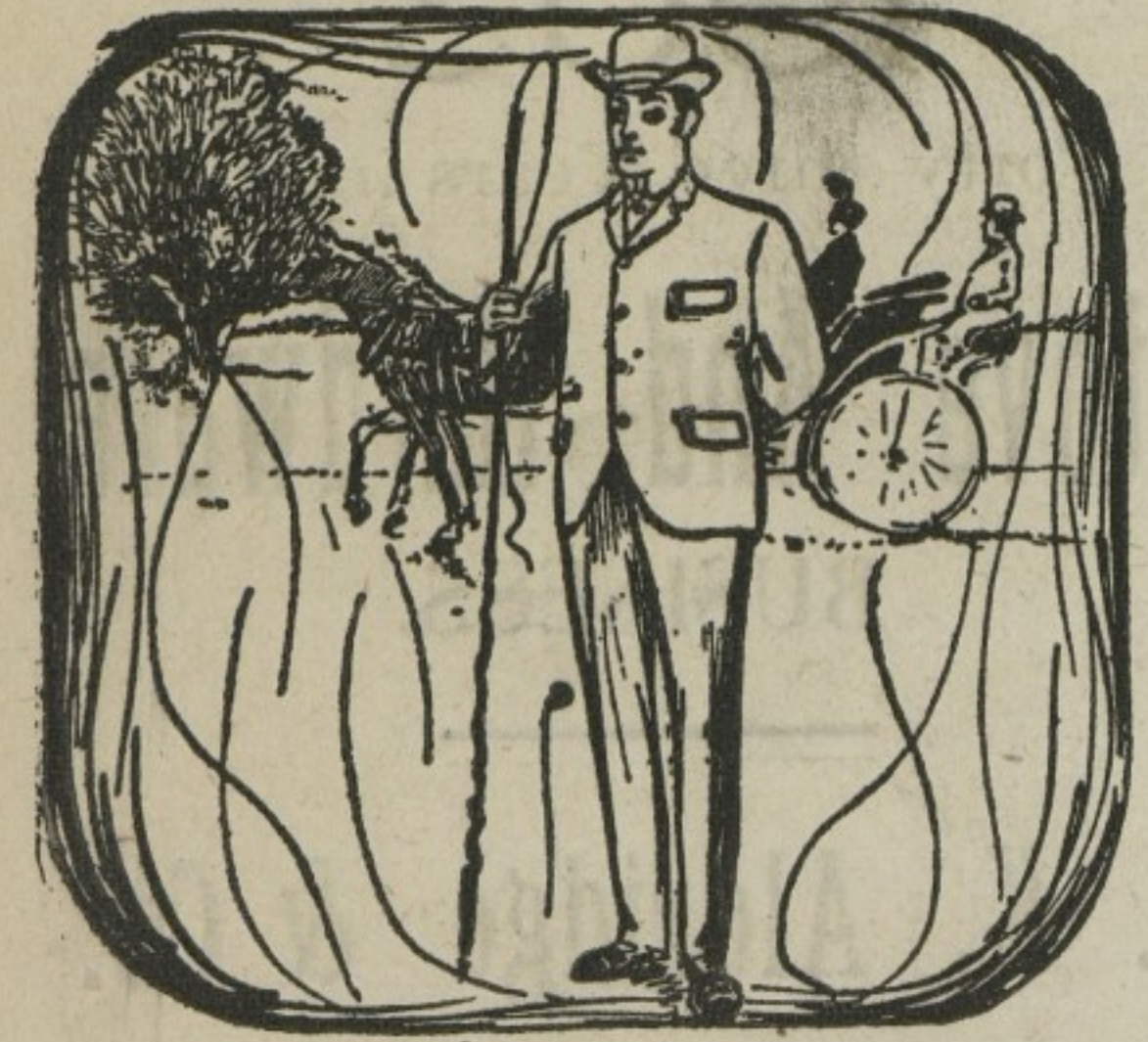

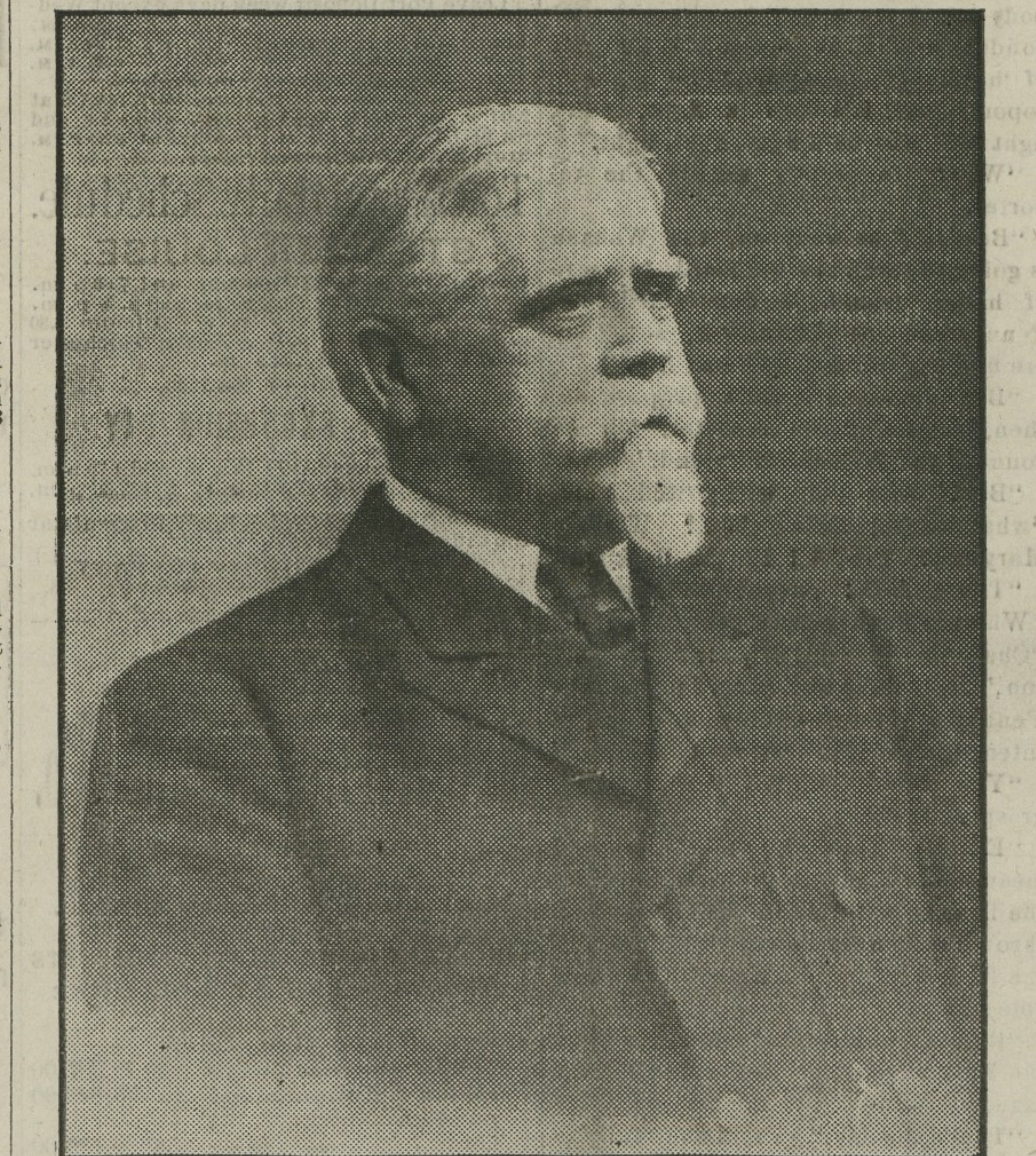

**35TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE
DIOCESE OF EASTON.**
Convened in Chestertown Tuesday and Wed-
nesday—Adjourned to Meet in Princess
Anne Next June.

The fifty-fifth annual convention of
the Diocese of Easton, assembled in
Emmanuel Church, Chestertown, on
Tuesday, June 2, at 10.30 A. M. Morning
prayer was said by the Rev. Albert Ware,
the Rev. Samuel Edson, the Rev. Ches-
ter M. Smith. The communion office
was begun by the Rev. James A. Mitchell,
the epistle being read by the Rev. Wil-
liam Schouler and the Nicene Creed by
the Rev. E. R. Rich.

The convention sermon was delivered
by the Rev. W. G. Woolford from Acts
2, 43. The offerings of the congrega-
tion were received for the Diocesan
Missions. The Holy Communion was
celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the
Rector of the Parish. Immediately after
Divine Service the Bishop took the chair,
and the secretary of the last convention
called the roll of the reverend clergy
as furnished by the Bishop, and of the
lay Delegates whose certificates of elec-
tion had been received. A quorum of
both orders being present, the Bishop
declared the convention ready for busi-
ness. On motion the ballot was discen-
sured with and the Rev. Edward R. Rich
was re-elected secretary and the Rev. F. B.
Adkins was appointed as his assis-
tant. On motion of the Rector of the
Parish it was resolved that the ses-
sions of the convention be held from
9.30 A. M. to 12.30, from 3 to 5 P. M.,
with a night session beginning at 8
o'clock. On motion of the Rev. William
Schouler it was resolved that visiting
clergymen, candidates for Holy Orders
and the Vestry of Chester Parish be
invited to honorary seats in this con-
vention. The Bishop appointed the
following committees: On Rights of
Clergymen to seats, Revs. Messrs. Gantt,
Howard and Spencer, D. D. On Elec-
tions, Messrs. E. W. McMaster, W. H. Gib-
son, Dr. Hines. On motion the conven-
tion took a recess until 3 P. M.

TUESDAY, JUNE 2, 3 P. M.
The convention was called to order by
the Bishop, and the Rev. J. G. Gantt
presented the report of the committee
on Rights of Clergymen to seats.
On motion the report was referred to the
Committee on Canons.
The Bishop appointed the following
committees on Episcopal Fund:
Messrs. W. T. G. Polk, J. J. Showell
and Rev. W. A. Coale.
On Accounts—Messrs. H. S. Cowden,
Wm. Collins, E. B. Pennington.
On Canons—Rev. J. A. Mitchell, Rev.
Wm. Schouler, Mr. J. S. Wirt.
On the State of the Church—Rev. J. G.
Gantt, Rev. R. G. Hamilton, Rev.
Samuel Edson, Mr. J. L. Goldsborough
and E. W. Hebron.
Parochial Assessments—The Rev.
Albert Ware, and Messrs. E. S. Valliant,
W. G. Kerbin, Z. P. Lusby and Dr. C.
H. Rose.
The Rev. David Howard presented and
read the report of the standing com-
mittee.

The secretary read a memorial from
the Diocese of Milwaukee in reference
to Courts of Appeal and moved its refer-
ence to a committee of one clergyman
and two laymen and the Bishop ap-
pointed as the committee called for, the
Rev. Edw. R. Rich and Messrs. J. S.
Wirt and William Collins. The fol-
lowing reports of the Diocesan Treasur-
ers were read by the secretary and re-
ferred to the committee on Accounts:
Episcopal Fund, Episcopal Residence
Fund, Trust Funds of the Diocese, the
Convention Diocesan Clergy Relief and
Home for Friendless Children. The
Rev. Mr. Rich presented and read the
report of the Board of Managers of the

Home for Friendless Children. The
Bishop read a letter calling attention to
and commending the work of the Church
Periodical Society. On motion, the
Convention took a recess till 8 P. M.
8 P. M.—After the singing of the
hymn 249, the Bishop said the creed
and offered prayer and then read his
annual address. He said:
"I could not under any circumstances
vote for a change of the name of the
church without knowing or consulting
the feelings and judgment of the
thousands and tens of thousands
deeply concerned in the proposed
change." For this reason, he said,
and only against what is not Catholic in
the Church of Rome that this word is
its true and strict ecclesiastical sense
protests."

On motion of Rev. Dr. Martin, that
portion of the Bishop's address on the
change of the name of the church was
referred to a committee of three clergymen
and four laymen, and at the request of
the Bishop, the following committee was
nominated and elected by the Con-
vention. The Rev. L. B. Baldwin, the
Rev. Wm. Schouler, the Rev. David
Howard and Messrs. J. S. Wirt, Dr.
W. F. Hines, W. H. Gibson and the
Hon. Jas. A. Pearce. On motion of the
Rev. Mr. Edson that portion of the Bis-
hop's address referring to the Missionary
apportionment was referred to the fol-
lowing committee, the Rev. Samuel Ed-
son, the Rev. W. A. Coale, the Rev. W. G.
Woolford and Messrs. E. W. McMaster
and George D. Walker. The reports of the
Rural Deans were called and read.
Of the Northern Convocation by the
Rev. Giles B. Cooke.
Of the Southern Convocation by the
Rev. F. B. Adkins.
There being no dean of the Middle
Convocation and the Secretary being
absent no report was made from that
Deanery.
The Rev. L. B. Baldwin, on behalf of
the treasurer of the Board of Diocesan
Missions, read the report of the treasurer
which was referred to the committee on
accounts. The Rev. Dr. Martin moved
that after singing of hymn 253 the
secretary call the roll of parishes for
pledges for Diocesan Missions for the
 ensuing year.
The roll was called and pledges made
by the parishes. Individual pledges
were then made.
After the singing of hymn 507 the
offerings of the congregation were re-
ceived for diocesan missions. The
Bishop offered prayer and pronounced
the benediction and the convention ad-
journed till 9.30 A. M., Wednesday.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 3.
Morning Prayer and Litany were said
by the Rev. W. A. Coale and the Rev. R.
G. Hamilton, after which the Bishop
took the chair. The secretary called
the roll and read the minutes of Tues-
day's proceedings which were approved.
The secretary made a statement in
regard to blanks for Parochial report.
On motion a committee consisting of the
Rev. W. Schouler and H. B. Martin,
and Mr. L. E. Whitman, was
appointed to consider what changes, if
any, should be made in the form of
parochial report.
The Rev. L. B. Baldwin submitted the
report on the state of the church, ap-
pointed last year.
The committee on canons brought
in by Mr. J. S. Wirt confirmed the
action of the committee on Rights of
Clergymen to seats.
The committee on accounts reported
all the accounts submitted to them cor-
rect.
The Rev. Mr. Baldwin, from the com-
mittee on the change of name of the
church, reported that a change of name
at this time is not expedient.
On motion of the Rev. Mr. Gantt, the
report of the committee and a substitute
offered by Rev. Mr. Coale were referred
back to the committee appointed on
Tuesday with instructions to report this
afternoon.
The committee on Parochial report
blanks reported, proposing certain
changes which were adopted.
The committee on Parochial Assess-
ment then made their report.
The committee on Episcopal fund re-
ported the accounts and vouchers correct.
12 o'clock having arrived the Bishop
offered prayer for missions after which
the convention proceeded to vote for the
standing committee. The Rev. W. C.
Butler and C. T. Denroche were ap-
pointed tellers for the clergy and Messrs.
Cooper and Hebron for the laymen.
Mr. Kerbin offered a resolution asking
the convention to meet at Snow Hill
next June. Mr. Standford moved to
substitute St. Andrews, Princess Anne,
for all Hallways, Snow Hill and the sub-
stitute having prevailed it was resolved
that the Thirty-sixth Annual Convention
of the Diocese of Easton be held in
St. Andrews Church, Princess Anne, on
the first Tuesday in June, 1904.
The tellers reported the election of
the Revs. Mitchell, Beaven, Schouler,
Bate and Howard as a Standing Com-
mittee.
WEDNESDAY, 3 P. M.
At the afternoon session the following
resolution regarding the changing of
the name of the church was adopted:
Resolved, That in the opinion of the Diocese
of Easton any change in the name of the
Protestant Episcopal church in the United
States of America at this time would be in-
expedient.
The convention then adjourned to
meet in Princess Anne the first Tuesday
in June, 1904.
On Thursday morning Mr. J. Wilson
Sutton was admitted to the order of the
diaconate, Rev. Mr. Edson preaching the
ordination sermon. Mr. Sutton is well
known to all Chestertown people as a
highminded, upright, christian gentleman,
and can not fail to do good work in his
chosen profession.
It is interesting to know that the first
convention of the Diocese of Maryland
was held at Chestertown in the year
1780, at which time the name Protestant
Episcopal was given to the English
church in America. Rev. Dr. Brand, in
his life of Bishop Wiltington says that
"Sundry of the Episcopal clergy, who
were assembled at the first Commence-
ment of Washington College, Chester-
town, in May, 1783, called a convention
to meet in Annapolis August 13, 1783, to

enact a charter of Incorporation and
also to set forth a declaration of certain
fundamental rights and liberties of the
"Protestant Episcopal Church of Mary-
land." At this convention Rev. Dr.
Smith, first President of Washington
College was elected Bishop of Maryland.
He was to go to England to be ordained,
but for some reason he was not conse-
crated and Rev. Dr. Claggett was conse-
crated first Bishop of Maryland.

On May 31, 1879, the Convention of the
Diocese of Maryland appointed a com-
mittee of conference to arrange "for an
appropriate and worthy commemoration
of the One Hundredth Anniversary of
the history of the Church in Maryland,
since its primary convention in Chester-
town, November 9th, Anno Domini,
1780." This committee consisted of
Rev. Dr. Geo. Leeds, Rev. G. A. Mc-
Kenney and Mr. Elisha J. Hall.

On June 7th, the convention of the
Diocese of Easton, in response to this
movement, appointed as a committee of
conference, on its part, Rev. Dr. E. J.
Sterns, Rev. Dr. E. S. Dashiell and
Messrs. S. S. McMaster and W. S. Wal-
ker.

On June 2, 1880, this committee re-
ported that as the church in Chester-
town would be closed for repairs in No-
vember, 1880, and as the one hundred
and fiftieth anniversary of the founding
of Baltimore was to be celebrated at the
same time, on a scale which would throw
into the shade all other commemorations
of local character, they recommended a
postponement; especially as according to
the journals of the convention of Mary-
land, the hundred years would not be
completed until 1883.

The committee found that Chester-
town was too small to accommodate the
assembly and the anniversary was held
in Baltimore in the year 1883.
