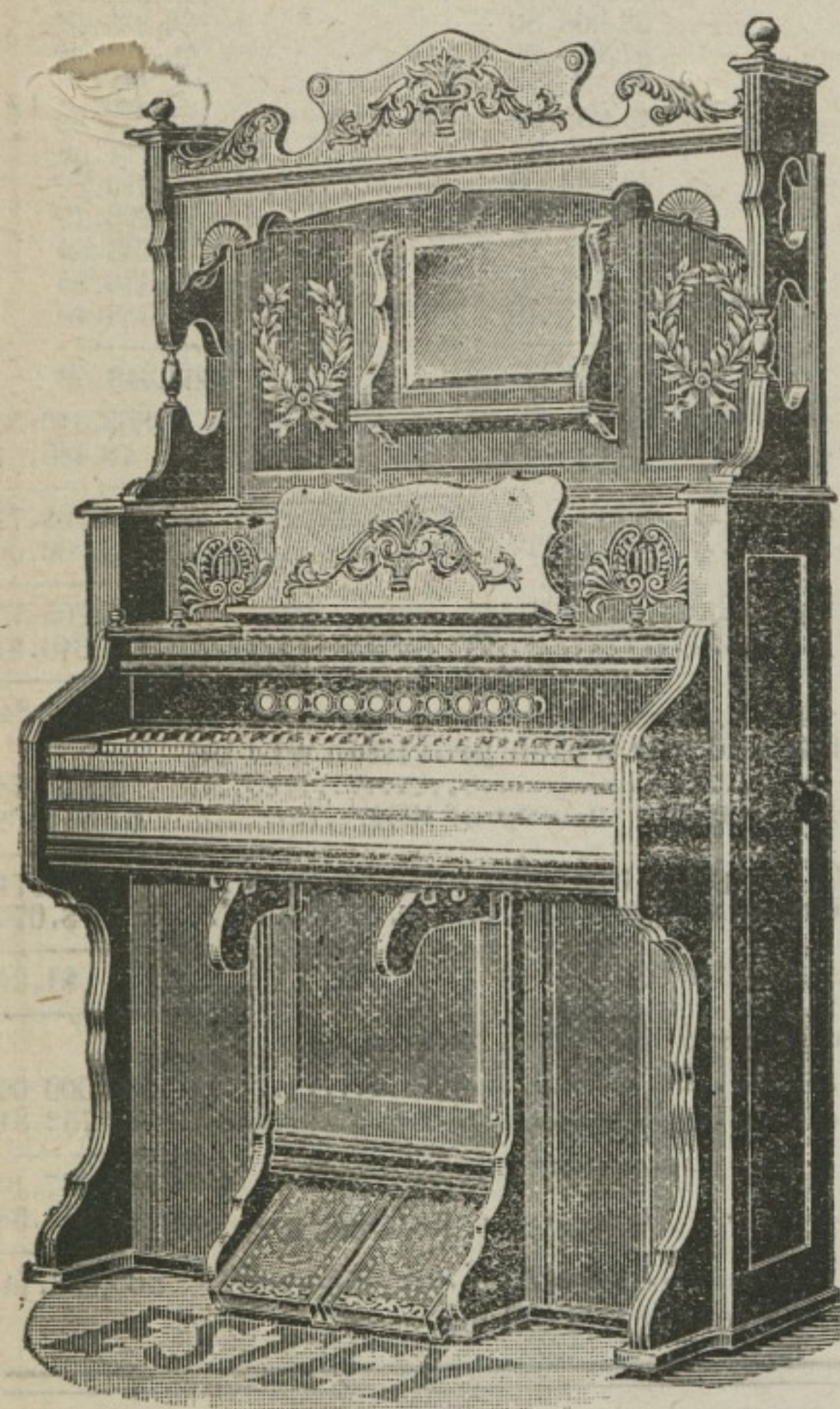

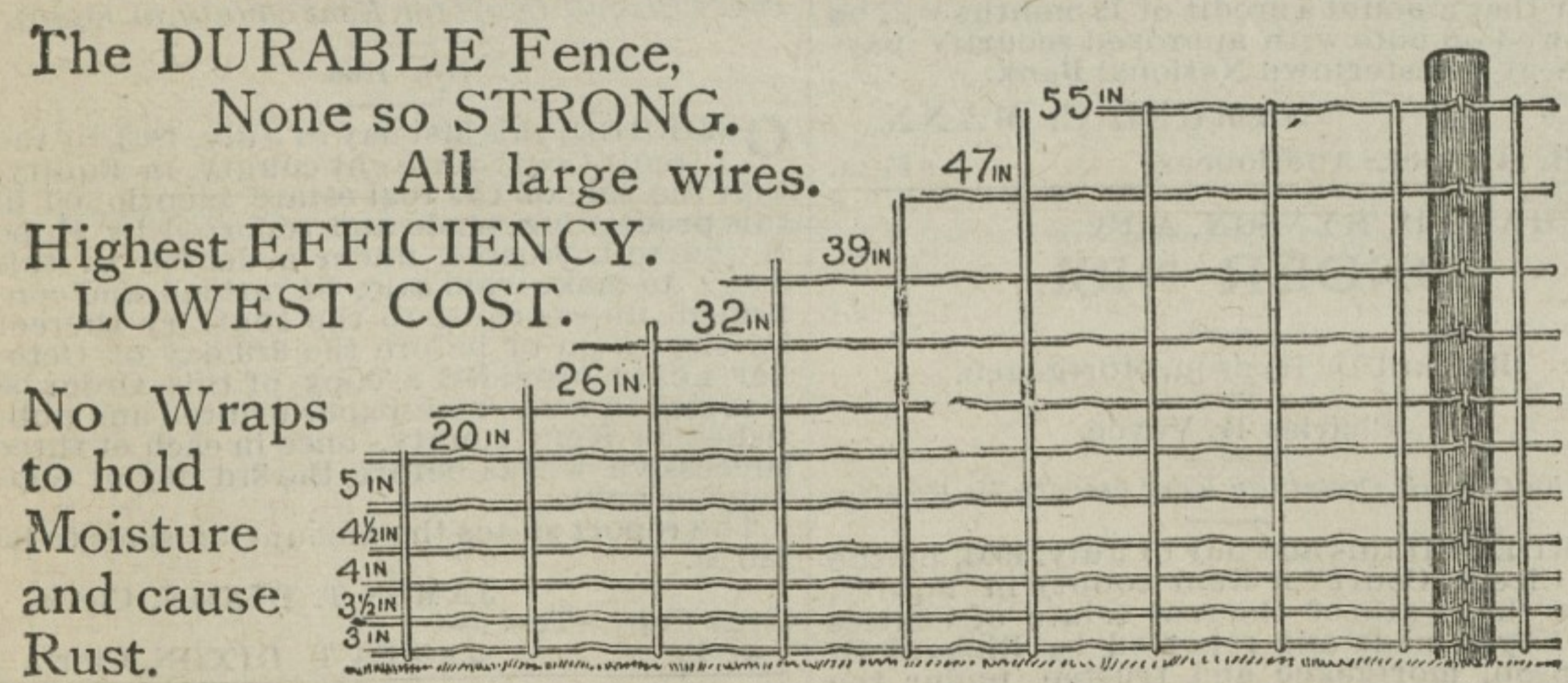

When the McCullough excursion boat pulled out from the wharf at Annapolis on Wednesday two of the passengers were left standing on the wharf. CHILD ADRIFT ON OCEAN.

Little Cuban Boy Found in Boat Delirious and Starving.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Jose Vega, a 12-year-old Cuban lad, lies in St. Vincent's Hospital suffering from severe burns, inflicted by long exposure to a blazing sun, and weakness, as a result of many days' drifting in an open boat without food or water.

He was picked up in midocean by the Mergan Line steamer El Dorado, which arrived this morning from Galveston.

Almost unequalled in the annals of the ocean was the story told by this boy of 12, who, when rescued, was naked, starving, delirious and nearly dead from exposure.

He had been fishing with two companions off the harbor of Havana. The boat had broken adrift. His mates were good swimmers. They swam ashore and left him, helpless, at the mercy of the sea.

It was last Monday week when the officer on the bridge of El Dorado saw to the westward what he took to be a small open boat. Bringing his glasses to bear he saw what appeared to be someone lying lifeless in the bottom of the boat. Captain Prescott was informed and the course of El Dorado was changed to bring her nearer the little craft.

The vessel at this time was about 100 miles from the coast of Georgia. It was thought then that the boat had drifted out from one of the small islands along the coast. As the El Dorado approached the dory the officers of the ship saw the boy toss an arm in delirium.

"He's alive!" they cried. The passengers crowded to the rail and strained their eyes to see what was in the boat. Captain Prescott had one of the boats lowered and manned. The steamship hove to and sturdy sailors with willing arms drove the ship's boat fast through the waves to the drifting dory.

When the boat was reached Jose was found writhing in the bottom of it, tightly clutching his cotton trousers. Part of one leg had been chewed off, and the boy was biting at the ragged edge. He was so demented that he did not realize he was being rescued, and attempted, feebly, to prevent them taking him from the boat. A strong sailor gathered him in his arms, and a quick return trip to the ship was made.

On board the El Dorado the Cuban boy was cared for by the surgeon.

He was delirious until yesterday, but came around then, and a fireman on the ship who could speak a little Spanish gathered from him his story.

"My name is Jose," he said, "and I live around San Lazaro, which is near Havana. I never had a father or mother, and have always lived about the streets with other boys who have no fathers or mothers. It was five days ago, I think, that I went in swimming off the beach of San Lazaro with a boy named Sebastian. We found a little dug-out tied to a log.

"It was called the Rubano Pago and belonged, I think, to a fisherman who rowed out to the vessels that stop now and then in the harbor to sell fresh fish. We were fishing off Havana harbor. There were three of us. The boat broke adrift. The wind was so high we could not manage the boat.

"We saw the shore getting farther and farther away. The others could swim and I couldn't. They jumped overboard and swam for shore. I don't know whether they got there or not. I yelled and nobody heard me, and the boat kept getting farther away. A storm came up and by and by I couldn't see land at all. I got hungry. And I was thirsty, but there wasn't any water aboard.

"I cried myself to sleep. When daylight came again the sun was burning me up. I looked around. There wasn't any land anywhere. I couldn't see any boats, either. I was hot—burning up. I took off my clothes and soaked them in the sea. That cooled me off, but I was so thirsty. The next day was worse than that. I saw a steamship away off. I yelled, but they didn't hear me. I waved my shirt, but they didn't see it. It was terrible. I cried and prayed and yelled, but it didn't do any good.

"After that I don't remember much. I think it was five days I was out there. It may have been six. I don't know what became of my clothes. I tried to drink sea water. It made me sick."

The boy is wasted away to a mere skeleton, but Captain Prescott thinks that with proper care and food he will soon be all right again.

Captain Prescott has grown fond of him and would like to adopt him.

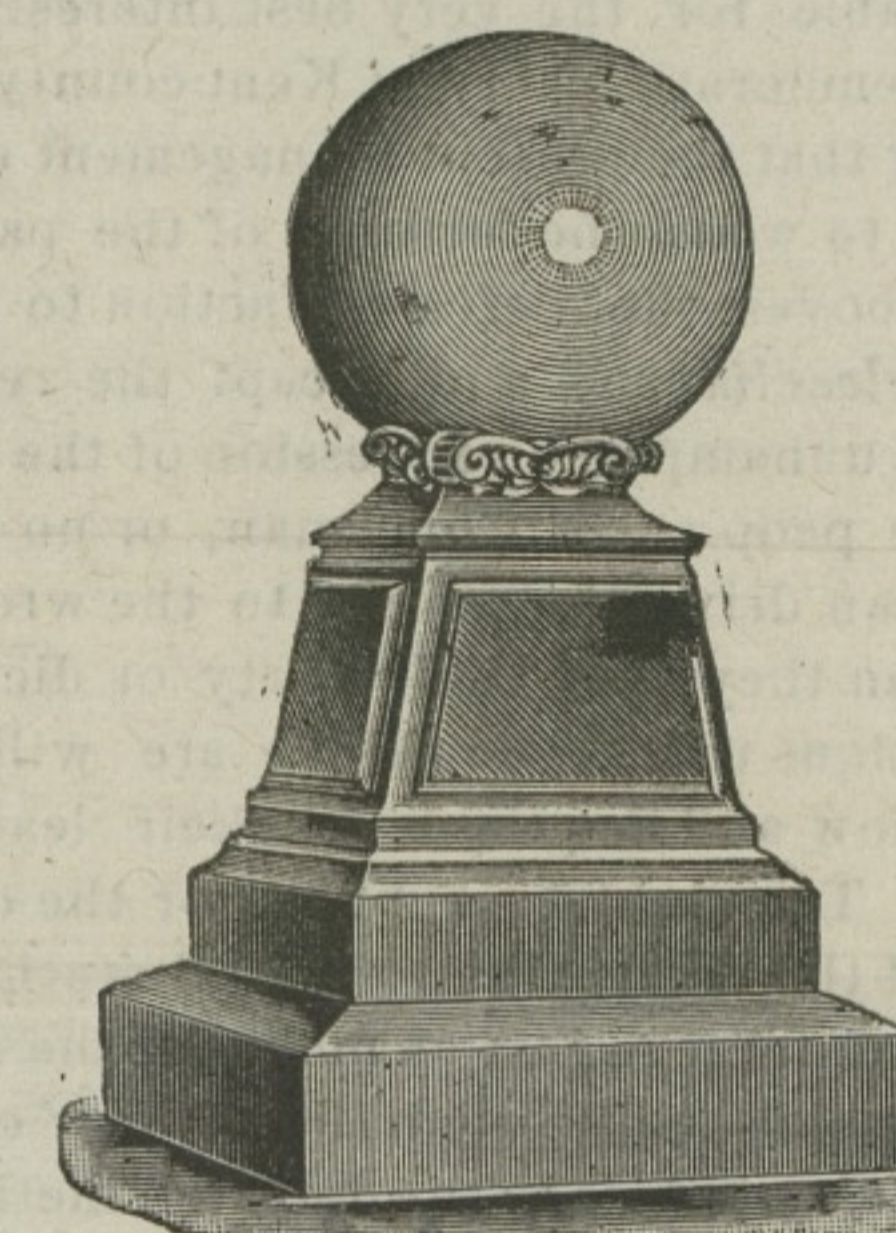
