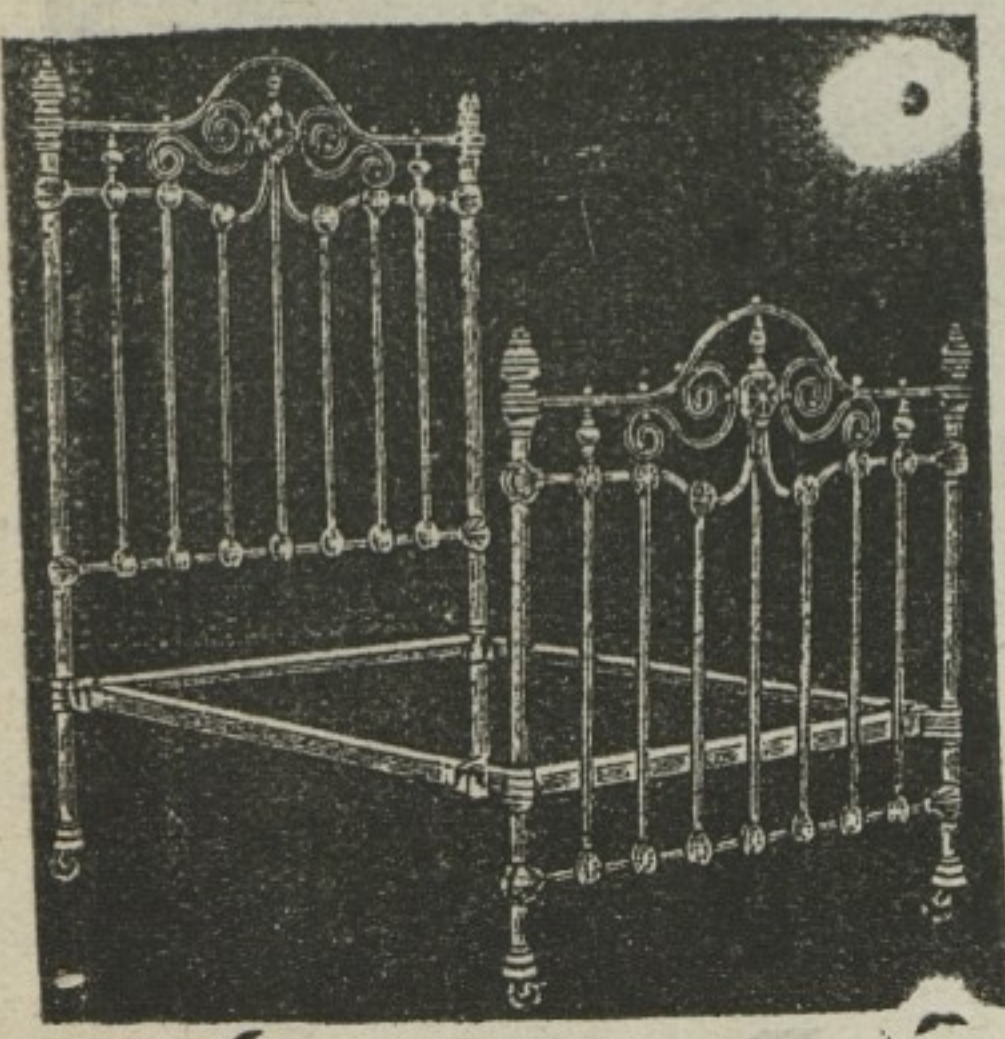

HERE is a plain statement of the methods employed by the Hon. Sidney Mudd in conducting primary campaigns in his Southern Maryland empire, clipped from the Sun of August 11th:

"If any Afro-American citizen of this town or of the outlying districts of Prince George's goes thirsty through the streets of Marlboro these times, it is his own fault. If anyone of the citizens desires to smoke a cigar and fails to obtain a fragrant stogie without money and without price, he has no one to blame but himself. In the eight saloons with which this village is blessed the material for irrigation and fumigation are as free as air to the colored voter. That he is fully alive to the situation and is taking advantage of his opportunities is manifest to the most casual observer. The colored voter as he walks along the village street leaves a cloud of smoke behind him. As you pass the doors of the saloons the sound of clinking glasses may be heard and the negro voice raised in earnest declamation discussing the relative merits of Mudd and McComas. 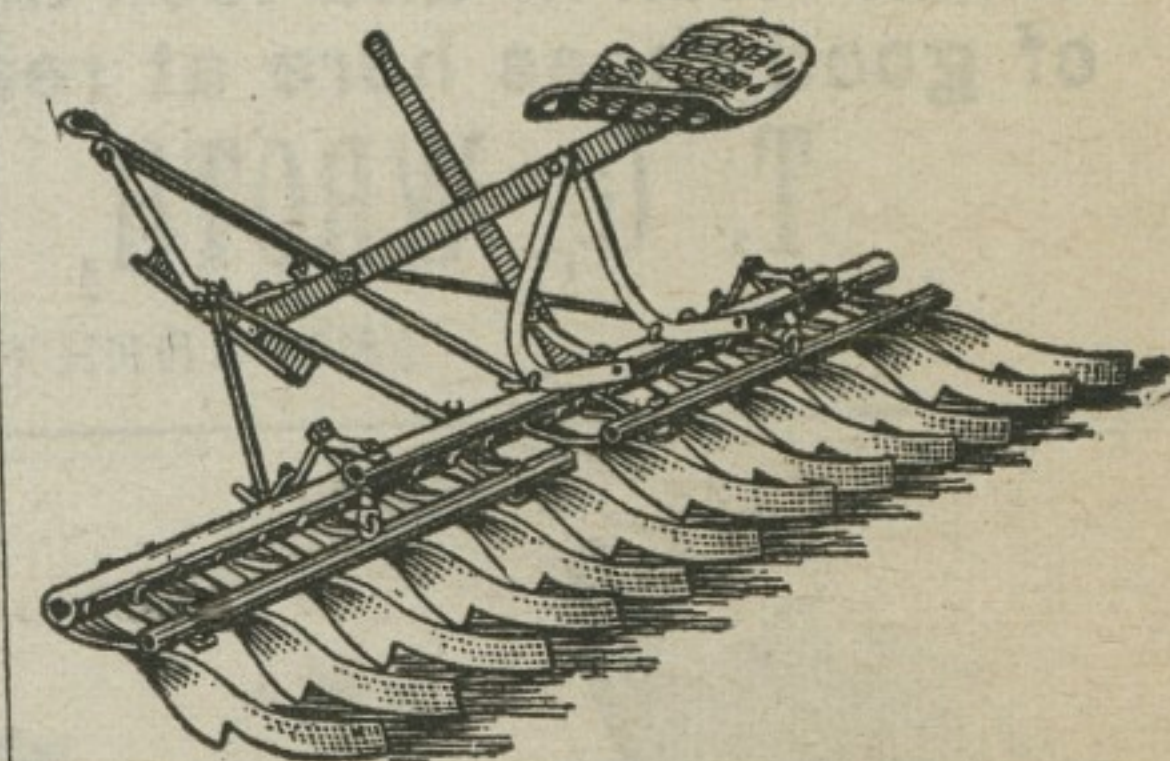

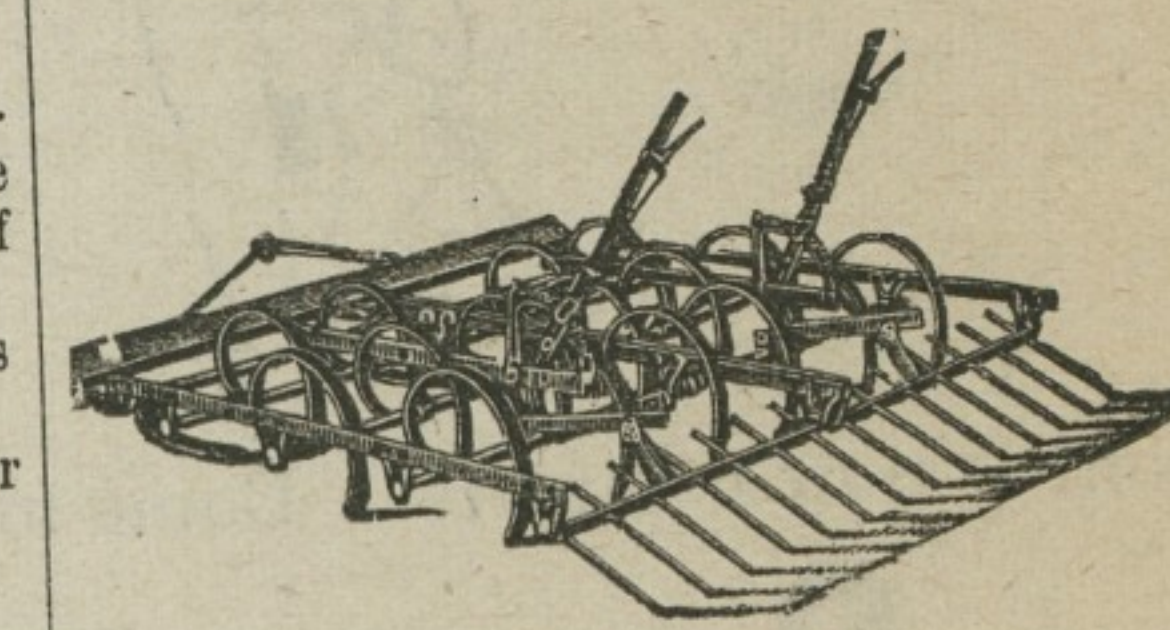

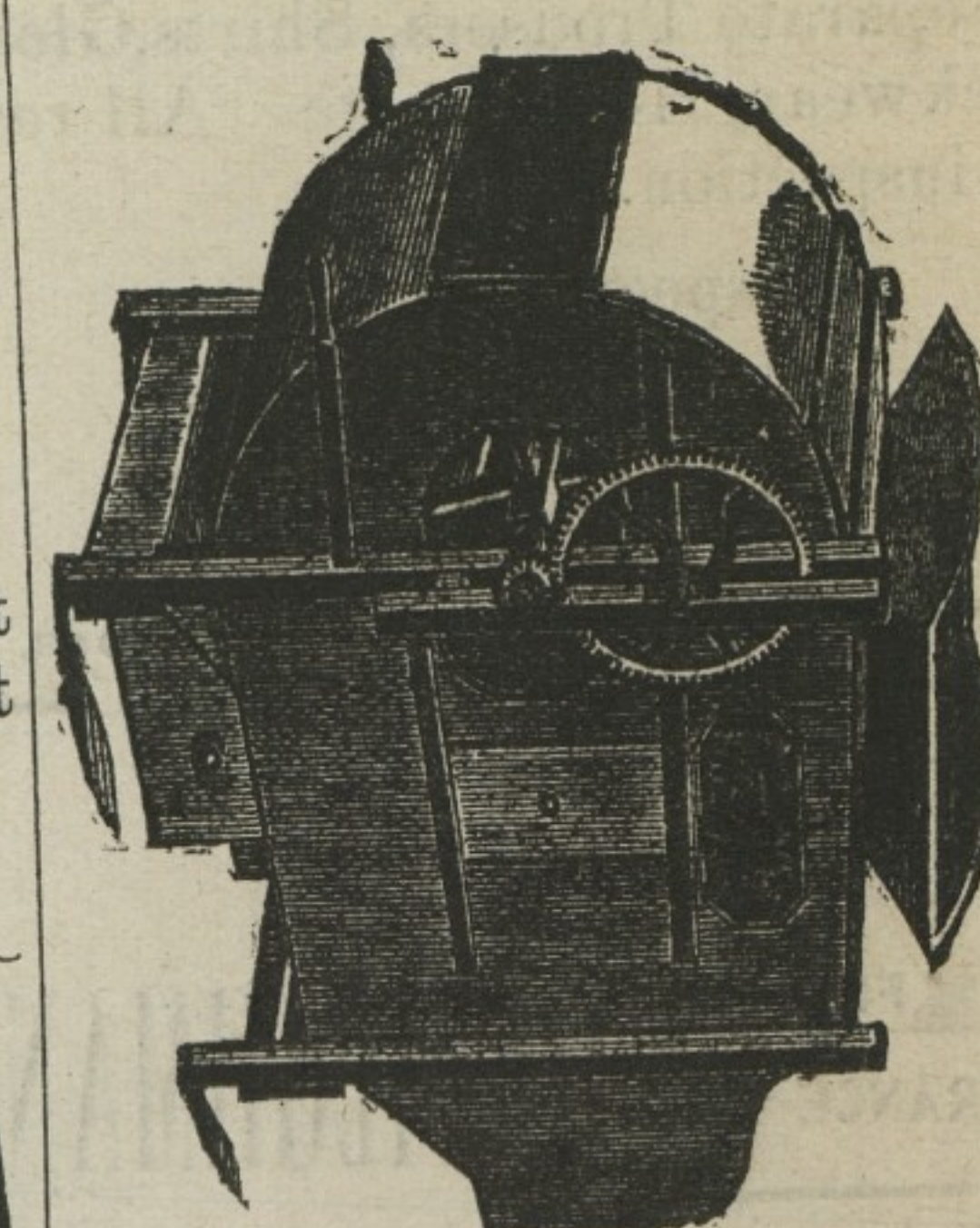
