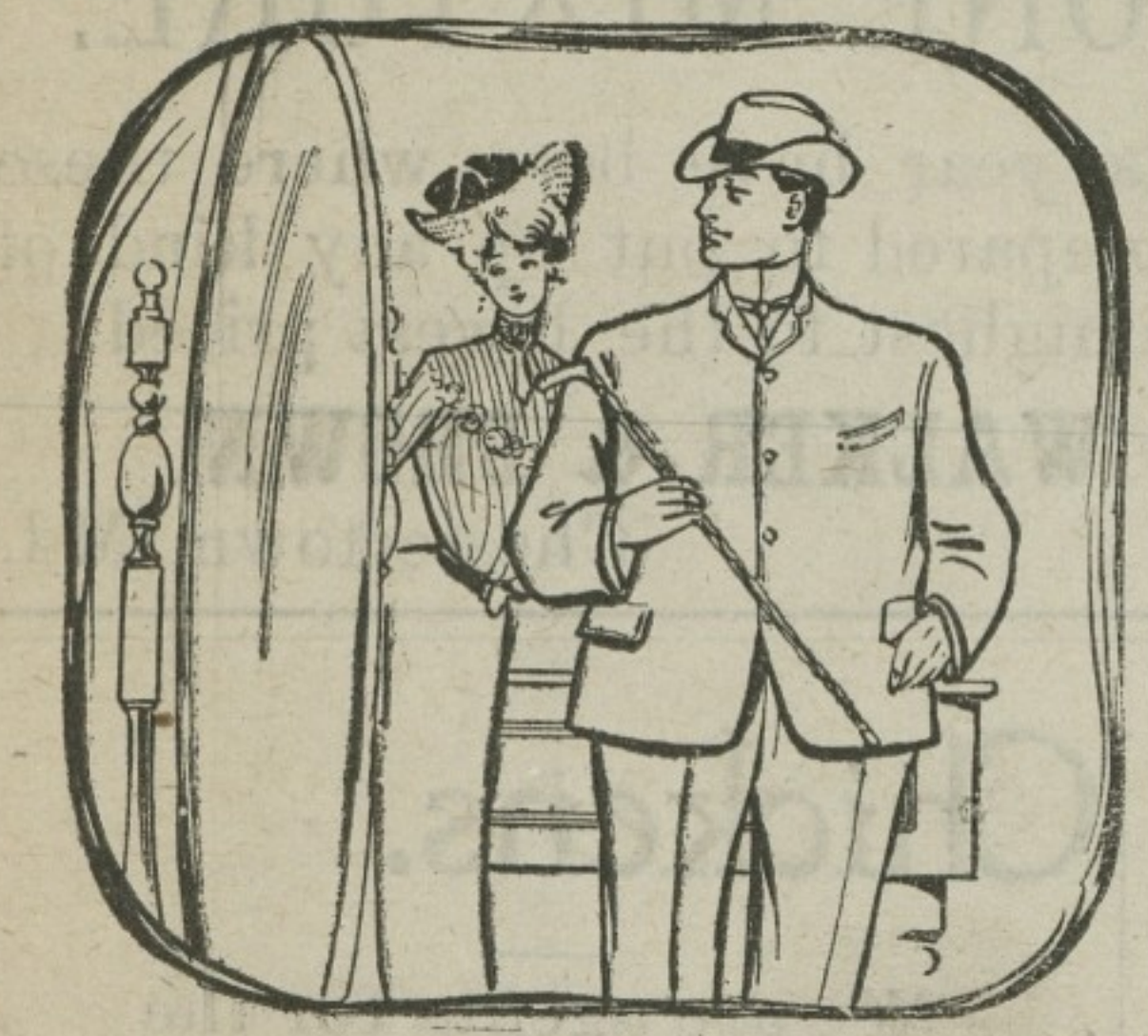

The Fair a Big Success!

More Largely Attended Than Ever Before in Its History.

THE RACING AND EXHIBITS A CREDIT TO THE POPULAR CHESAPEAKE RESORT.

The Kent and Queen Anne's County Fair, which opened at Tolchester on Tuesday, was attended by Hon. Edwin Warfield and a large crowd of people. Superintendent George E. Noland and his large staff of able assistants were ready for the crowd, and did everything to add to the comfort and pleasure of those present. All the departments were well filled with interesting exhibits, and were visited by the large crowds which increased each day until Friday, when the rain interfered. The crowd on Thursday was the largest of the season, being estimated at between 20,000 and 30,000 people coming from almost every section of the State, and a large crowd from Delaware via the Queen Anne's Railroad to Love Point thence by the steamer to the Beach. The Chester River Steamboat Company ran an excursion out of Chester river and carried 650 people.

On Thursday the fast Baltimore pacing mare, Gypsy Red, owned by Mr. Walker, and entered in the free for all, went to beat the track record of 2:16 held by Richard Hentche's Ainsworth. She did the trick nicely in 2:12. Starter Hough got the fields away in good style in all the races, and betting was brisk in each event.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARIES AND CONVENTION.

A Friendly Contest at the Primaries and Harmony at the Convention.

Democratic primaries were held throughout the county on Saturday last for the purpose of selecting six delegates from each district to meet in County Convention, to elect six delegates to the State Convention which meets in Baltimore in September for the purpose of nominating a Governor, a Comptroller and an Attorney General. There was a contest in four of the districts between the Organization and Anti-Organization forces, resulting in a victory for the Anti-Organization forces in three of the contested districts, the third, fifth and sixth. The Organization candidates had no opposition in the seventh district, and their nominations were unanimous. The Anti-Organization candidates were nominated unanimously only in the second. By carrying three of the contested districts the Anti-Organization forces won in the primaries, having carried four of the seven districts, thus giving them control of the Convention which met in the Court House at eleven o'clock on Tuesday. The Convention was called to order by William W. Beck, Esq., chairman of the State Central Committee, who stated the purpose for which the Convention was called. Upon motion of Mr. Tilghman Shafer, of the second district delegation, Hope H. Barroll, Esq., was made chairman of the Convention. Messrs. Jas. H. Robinson, of the second district, and Wm. B. Plummer, of the sixth district, were named as secretaries. The following committee on credentials was appointed: First district, Frank P. Cochran, second district, E. W. Hurst, third district, Charles H. Crowding, fourth district, Josiah Massey, Jr., fifth district, John Wood, sixth district, W. W. Jewell, seventh district, John D. Carter.

A committee on resolutions was appointed consisting of the chairman of each district delegation as follows: First district, Wm.
