THE TRICKY BRAIN CELL.

What Happens When We Know a Name Which Escapes Us. The anatomy of the nervous system, and consequently its physiology, was regarded in the past as very simple. Cayal showed that the specific brain cell is an independent unit provided with multiple processes, by means of which it is capable of acting not through one nerve alone, but several.

This independent brain unit or cell is called a neuron. A simple illustration of how the neuron works is furnished by our not infrequent hunt for a name or an idea which we know we possess. 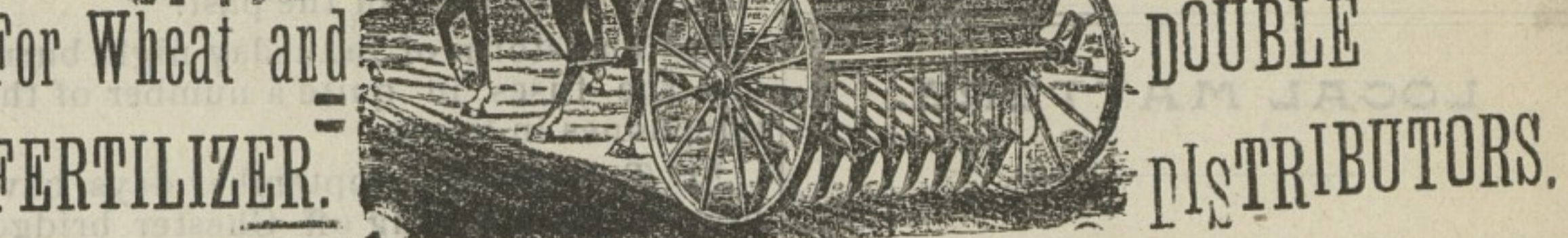
