GREAT IS BEDWORTH, JR.

That Bedworth, Jr., is the greatest race horse in Maryland, and one of the greatest in the world was proven by his remarkable performance at the Gentleman's Driving Park, Baltimore last Friday and at Prospect Park this week. He not only paced the three fastest miles over a half mile track that have been paced this year in Maryland, but he lowered the record of the champion trotter, Croesus, on a half mile track one-quarter of a second. Bedworth, Jr.'s time in the second heat at the Gentleman's Driving Park meet was 2:08 1/2; while that of Croesus last year over a half-mile track was 2:09 1/2. Before the race at the Driving Park, Mr. William A. Bell, his owner, had placed Bedworth, Jr. in care of Peter Biggs, of Baltimore, but either he did not understand the horse or was unable to get the speed out of him, and Mr. Bell was advised to make a change in drivers. Mr. William B. Biggs, the Middletown driver, who had driven Bedworth, Jr. his fastest miles, was asked to pilot the racer. The change worked like magic and the mare, Hettie G., who had been showing Bedworth, Jr., the way around the northern track was made to look like thirty cents in her efforts to beat the son of Bedworth. Quite a number of Kent owners who saw Bedworth, Jr. perform, say that his time was equal to a 2:04 gait on a mile track. Mr. B. stated that he would have started him in several of the races of the Grand Circuit, but was afraid that he was not in sufficiently good condition early in the season to make a desirable showing as he would like for him to do in very fast company. The great Maryland racer will be taken south in October, and we understand that it is the intention of Mr. Bell to send him against his record of 2:06 1/2 at Memphis. Mr. Bell is confident that Bedworth, Jr. is much faster than he has shown himself to be in races thus far, and if conditions are favorable when he goes against his record, Mr. Bell is confident that he will come very near to the two minute mark. Bedworth, Jr., is undoubtedly the greatest race horse ever sired in Maryland, and there are many who believe that he will prove himself the greatest race horse in the United States.
