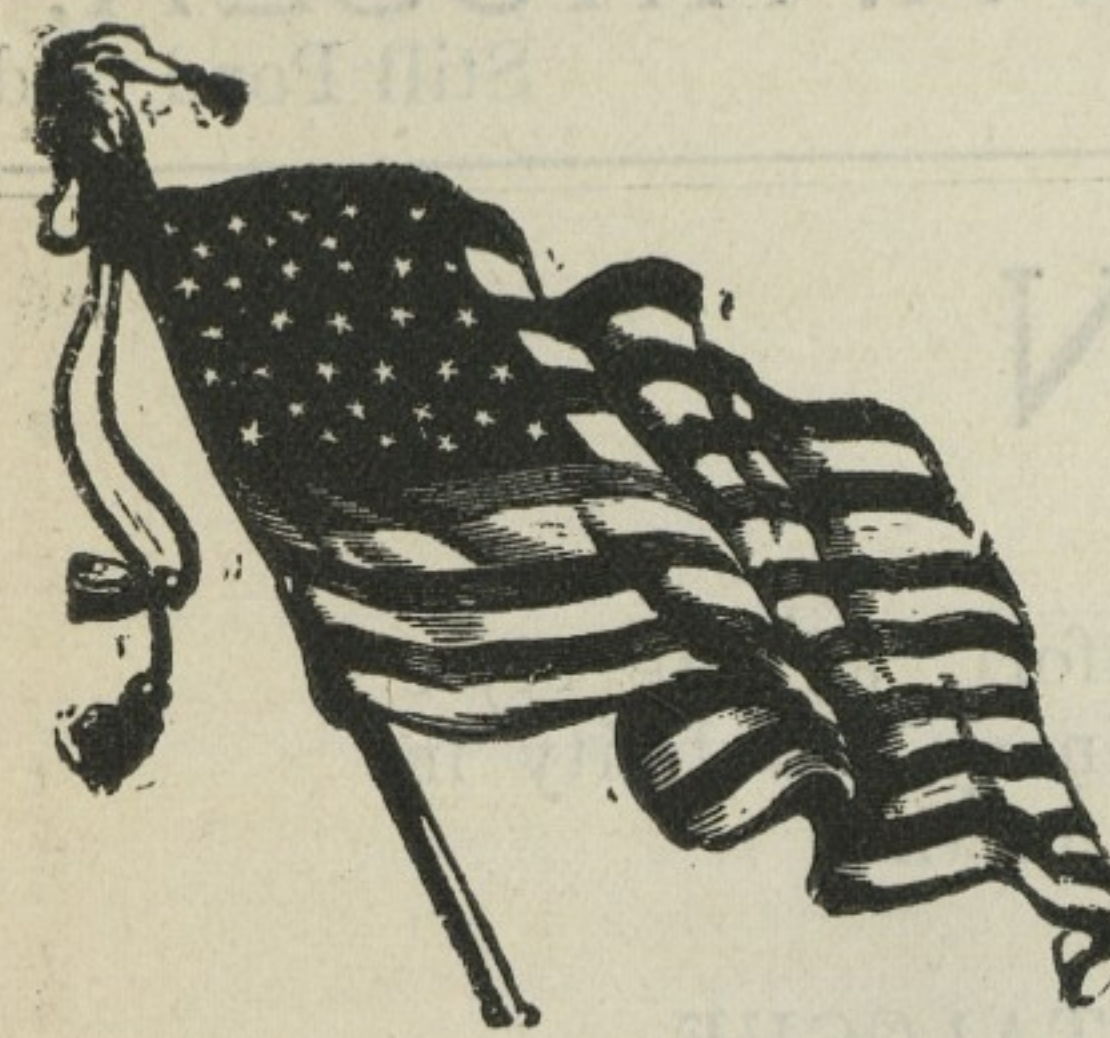

THE OYSTER QUESTION.

Mr. Garrett Foxwell, Democratic candidate for the State Senate, defines his position on the oyster question in the following letter:

Black's, Md., Oct. 15th, 1903. CHESTERTOWN TRANSCRIPT, Chestertown, Md. Dear Sirs:—A number of gentlemen, especially those living on Chester River and at Rock Hall, who are interested in the Oyster Industry, have asked me what will be my course if elected as Senator from Kent county. I have always stated my position when so asked clearly and frankly. I shall work and vote against any bill like the Haman bill, or any other bill which may be introduced for the leasing of the bottoms of the Chesapeake Bay, whether barren or natural beds. Perhaps Rock Hall is as thriving a village as can be found on this peninsula; its inhabitants are industrious and thrifty, and, if elected, I pledge myself that they and others in Kent county interested in the oyster industry, may then rely upon me in regard to any proposed oyster legislation. I shall be glad if you will publish this in the TRANSCRIPT on Saturday next. Yours very truly, GARRETT FOXWELL.

OYSTERMEN, turn out next Friday night at Rock Hall to hear Hon. Joshua W. Miles, the man who knows as much about the oyster question and the oystermen's rights as any man in the State.

THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY has protected the oystermen ever since there has been a legislature with power to do them harm. Most oystermen are Democrats. Can they not trust themselves, who have stood true for over half a century? Don't listen to sedition on the subject.

THE ENTRANCE of President Roosevelt into Maryland politics makes it absolutely certain that the "race issue" is the paramount issue in this campaign. You may rest assured that wherever President Roosevelt is, there is a negro somewhere near. Shame on the intelligence of our great country.

THE TRANSCRIPT met with a slight accident to its power press on Friday evening last by the breaking of a cog wheel, during the printing of last Saturday morning's issue. Through the courtesy of the editors of the Kent News we were enabled to make the issue as usual. New cog wheels were promptly supplied by the Campbell Press Company, of New York.

A VOTE for the Republican party means financial extravagance. A vote for the Republican party means negro domination. A vote for the Republican party means the enactment of such an election law as will render it impossible for the Democratic party to win another election in the State or county. Therefore, if the white man wants to maintain his political supremacy, vote the Democratic ticket.

WE CALL THE ATTENTION of all Democrats to the name of Mr. Charles Bradford Dudley, candidate for County Commissioner from the first district. His name has been published by the TRANSCRIPT as Bradford C. Dudley, when it should have been Charles Bradford Dudley. Mr. Dudley's name will appear on the official ticket as Charles B. Dudley and we want every Democrat in the county to remember this on election day.

IT IS REPORTED that the County Commissioners have purchased a new road machine for use in the Third District. It consists of a dog cart under which is a washing tub, the machine being worked by one of the prominent Third District negro politicians. It is claimed that this machine will run with less oil, and will carry less dirt than any other machine on the market, and for these reasons is more expensive to the tax payers of the county.

IF THERE IS ONE MAN in the United States who has done more than any one else to engender a race war in this country that man is President Roosevelt. He has labored strenuously to place the negro on a plane of social equality with the white people of this country, but the people of the State of Maryland with their Southern tendencies and after a long experience with negro labor, will administer a just rebuke to the politician-President by swamping his whole party in November. This is a white man's country and we shall have a white man's governor next year and a white man's President in 1904. Mr. Roosevelt's attitude on the race issue is absolutely disgusting to every intelligent citizen in Maryland.

THE ENDORSEMENT of Hon. Isidor Raynor for the United States Senate by the Baltimore City legislative candidates has infused vigor into the Democratic campaign throughout the State. It has added an element of strength to the party that will render more certain the election of the State and city tickets, and evidences the fact that the managers of the party are in accord with the people in their efforts to land Maryland in the Democratic column in November. This endorsement places Mr. Raynor in the same position as are Governor Smith and Ex-Governor Jackson so far as home support is concerned, and all these candidates will use every effort toward the election of a Democratic legislature. This is their duty to the Democratic party in return for the compliment conferred upon them.

THE NAMES of the Prohibition candidates for State offices have been ruled off the official ballot in all the counties and Baltimore city, under the opinion of Attorney-General Isidor Rayner, on the ground that said names were not filed within the time prescribed by law. This will afford the Prohibitionists a splendid opportunity to vote the Democratic ticket this fall.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT is endeavoring to play a huge jesse on the Republican party by pretending to want Ex-Governor Lowndes as a running mate in 1904. This is done with a view to bringing about harmony in the party in the State. He will, of course, have a desire to give Cabinet positions to Messrs. Jackson, Mudd, Wachter and Gary. He will provide for Hiram Watty later. This is done with a view to sidetracking Mr. Lowndes in his fight against McComas for the U. S. Senatorship. We venture to say that it is the first time within the history of the United States that a President has so greatly sacrificed the dignity of his position as to engage in State politics. Mr. Lowndes will never see the Vice-Presidency, and Roosevelt can't fool Mudd that way. Roosevelt has a problem on his hands to harmonize a difference of which he was the sole cause. Mudd, Wachter, Jackson and Gary don't love Roosevelt one bit, and they are not going to be fooled again.

WHAT DR. GORDON T. ATKINSON SAYS IN SOUTHERN MARYLAND.

Dr. Gordon T. Atkinson, Democratic candidate for Comptroller, who made the tour throughout Southern Maryland last week with Mr. Warfield and Mr. Bryan, the other candidates, in speaking of his trip said:

"During the campaign, although thoroughly familiar with the race question, I have avoided saying much about it; but I feel constrained to relate the observations which I made while in Southern Maryland. In some counties I found the people almost in despair over the situation. They have fought year after year and in many cases have exhausted both their time and means in the effort to secure relief. They have also appealed to the Legislature, but as yet have received little help.

WASTE THE ROAD FUNDS.

"That negro domination actually exists in Southern Maryland no one who visits that section can doubt.

One of the most important aids to the farmer is the public road, yet these seem to be given over almost entirely to the management of the negroes, and the assertion of the white residents that the money which they pay in taxes for the repair of their highways is largely wasted was borne out by my experience in driving over nearly 100 miles of Southern Maryland roads.

"In Calvert county two of the three Road Supervisors are negroes. In Charles county I was informed that the Road Supervisors were negroes with one exception, and to these persons is intrusted the construction of new highways and the repair of the old ones, which duty is performed without skill and with no regard to economy. The jailer in Chase county and the janitor of the courthouse are negroes, the latter it is said, receiving two or three salaries for different employments as a reward for political services to the white Republican bosses.

"I submit these facts without comment to the white people of Maryland, and ask them to consider if it is not the duty of those who are so fortunate as to live in sections where the negro population is small to come to the aid of their brethren in Southern Maryland by voting with the party which has boldly grasped this great race problem."

We hope the doctor will take the opportunity to observe conditions in Kent county when he comes to town on Monday, as we feel confident that he will find conditions similar in many respects to those in Southern Maryland.

With regard to their position on the oyster question, according to their statements as given by the Baltimore Sun, some of the Republicans stand simply on their party platform, others are non-committal, some are diplomatic and evasive, others still are for progressive oyster culture and some decline to show up.

PEOPLE'S COLUMN. COUNTY FINANCES.

CHESTERTOWN, Md., Oct. 14, 1903. TO THE EDITORS OF TRANSCRIPT, GENTLEMEN:—Mr. Eliason in a letter, commenting upon the report to the grand jury made by Mr. Blacklock, gives the result of a thoughtful reading on his part of the report showing that thereby, there can be no misunderstanding as to the report's meaning.

Mr. Eliason proceeds at once with a statement showing that the average annual expense of Kent county for eleven years has been..... \$78,486.04 and for the past five years, an average..... 83,000 00 Expert's estimated claims outstanding against the county up to June 1904..... 94,705.75

Mr. Eliason adds these together and shows a levy for all expenses, up to June, 1904, will be..... 177,705.75 From this he deducts our levy for this year, which all the tax-payers have their bills for, at the rate of \$1.35, amounting to..... 111,646.01

And finds a balance of..... \$66,059.84 Now, of course, the above figures are correct, and one can understand them. But they are misleadingly misleading. Mr. Eliason will as quickly recognize this as will your humblest reader. We are not living eleven years ago, nor six, nor four years ago. We all remember how, when the Republicans came in power in 1896 and 1897 they reduced the levy in 1896 of..... \$38,341.06 in 1897 to..... 69,114.68

We all have memories. We recollect in 1897 the trumpet's blast blown into the ears of every tax-payer, "that by extraordinary financial management the Republican Board of County Commissioners had reduced the tax-rate," and the tax-payers were called upon to note that the Republicans had done this! The extravagance of the Democrats, compared with the economy of the Republicans, was held out as a most striking lesson to all the voters. Many believed this. Many were fooled. They were not told of the deception and fraud which permeated the Commissioner's yearly levies by their withholding annually thousands of dollars from the levies, so that they might produce a small tax rate.

Mr. Eliason, I do not think for one moment, could have had in mind the idea of misleading a single citizen by the letter he furnished to the press. As a most successful business man; as a respected citizen, he commands the respect of all of us, because of a most successful and conservative business career. As a rule, when we talk to Mr. Eliason, or speak of him, one does not think of his politics. And yet, at the same time, there is as much and as deep partisanship in Mr. Eliason as in myself or any citizen of Kent county. I admire him for it. He believes in his party strongly and firmly, just as I believe in mine, but I think he will certainly agree that his comparison of figures for five years is neither just nor safe. I am sure that the tax-payers of this county will likewise agree for the following reasons:

For three years prior to the levy of 1901, the commissioners levied respectively: In 1898..... \$76,379.89 In 1899..... 78,398.19 In 1900..... 75,393.36 These small levies for these three years were so wholly and totally inadequate and the accumulating indebtedness staring the commissioners in the face so appalling, that in 1901 the commissioners jumped from the levy of \$75,393.36 to..... \$94,326.55 In 1902 they levied..... 92,588.40 In 1903 they levied..... 111,646.01

Total for three years..... \$291,560.96 Average annual levy for three years past, average as shown above..... \$97,520.32

We know now that the expenses of Kent county are annually increasing, and that next year will be necessary to raise more than the average of the last three years, because, we know the items which have always heretofore been levied for in advance, are not included in the levy which produced the unusual sum of over \$111,000.00, to wit, roads and bridge bills, \$5,000; over \$5,000 for schools, almshouse over \$2,000, etc., etc. How, then, can Mr. Eliason in the face of the facts, with the absolute knowledge on the part of the tax payers of the fact that our levy, if we are going to provide in a proper way for the expenses which we incur, will be increased, and which will necessarily appear in the levy for next year, because omitted in the levy for this year, fail to recognize, as do the tax-payers, that the levy for 1904 must far exceed \$90,000.00 unless we are to be kept in the uncertainty of a hop, skip and jump, from low to high, and from high to low, as the Republicans have done for nearly eight years?

As tax-payers as citizens, it is the duty of the people of Kent county and of our people to proclaim to the world that the condition of our finances is in such a shocking state of mismanagement that radical measures must be adopted and that at once, so that we may be put on a proper footing. The tendency of such statements will show to all that we are to our own tax-payers, that the people should be ready and determined to correct the evil now pressing so heavily upon us. When corrected, the values of real estate will not be depressed, but everything will be as it is, and not as it seems. Such a condition will reflect credit upon the character of the good citizens of Kent county.
