Forbidding the sale of or Giving Away Liquor on Election Day. For the information of all persons concerned, the following Act of the Legislature passed March 24th, 1895, is published:

AN ACT Prohibiting the sale of Spirituous or Fermented Liquors in the counties in the State on the day of Election.

SECTION 1.—Be it enacted by the General Assembly, of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful, for the keeper of any hotel, tavern store, drinking establishment or other place where liquor is sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the day of election hereafter to be held in the several counties of the State.

SECTION 2.—And be it enacted that any persons violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where such offense is committed, and shall, upon conviction before any judge of any of the Circuit Courts of this State, be fined a sum not less than fifty dollars for each and every offense; one-half the fine is paid to the informer and the other half to the County Commissioners for the use of the public roads.

Article 33 of the Code of Public General Laws as amended by the Acts of 1900 and 1901, says: "Whoever, during the hours of registration or revision of registration, or during the hours of election or canvass of votes, or of making returns thereof in any precinct, shall bring take, order or send into, shall or attempt to bring take or send into, any place of registration or of election, any distilled or spirituous liquors, wine, ale or beer, or shall at any such time or place, drink or partake of such liquor, shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than \$100."

SECTION 3.—And be it enacted that any person who deposits money in any part of the State as a wager or bet upon elections in this State or elsewhere shall be forfeited and paid over to the County Commissioners of the county where deposited, for the use of the county, and if deposited in the city of Baltimore, to the Mayor and City Council.

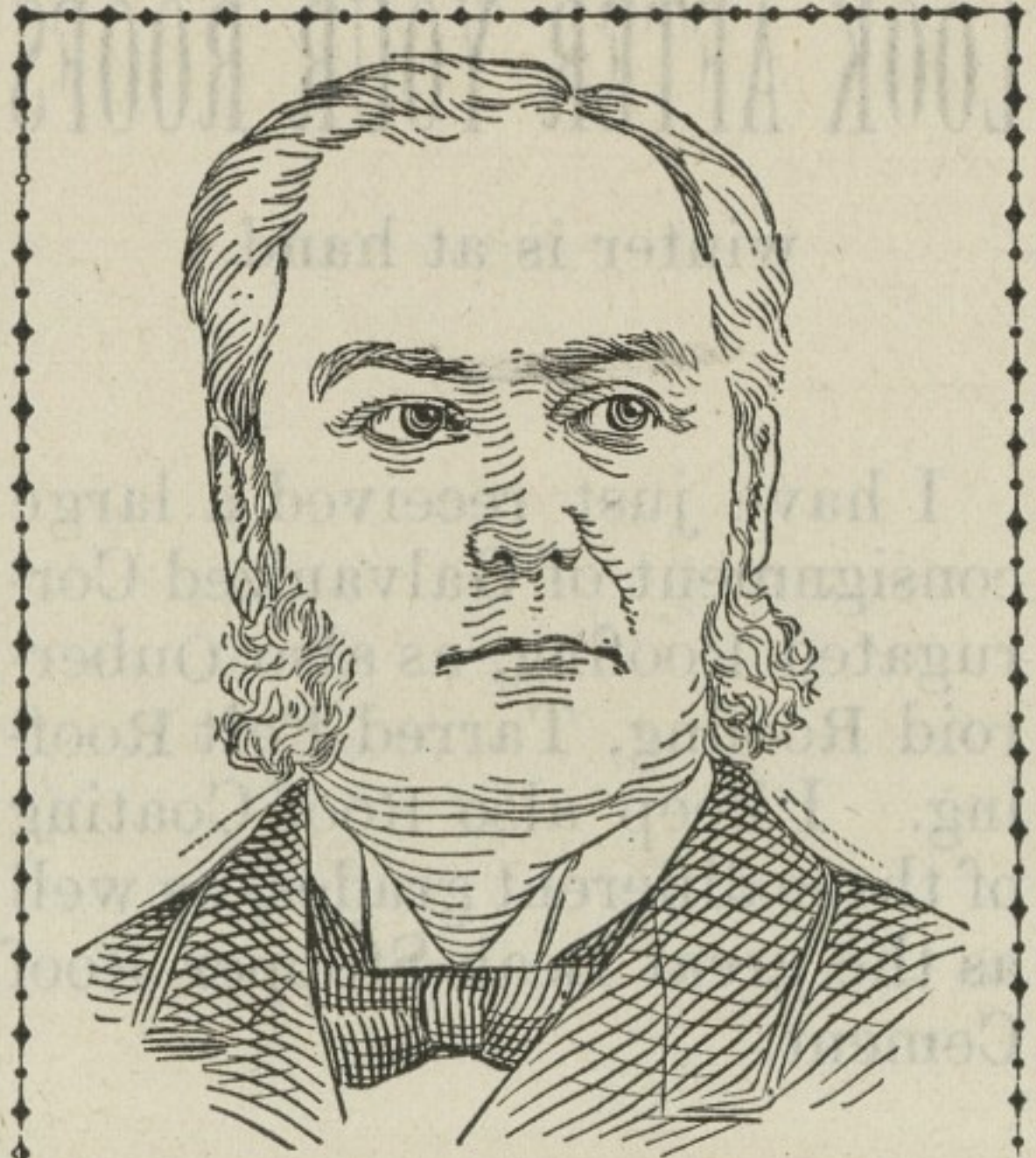

Concealed Weapons on Election Day.

The following Act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at the January session of 1874 and approved April 6, 1874, is published for the information of the public:

AN ACT To prevent carrying of guns, pistols, dirks, dirk-knives, razors, billies or bludgeons by any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery counties on the day of election in said counties:

SECTION 1.—Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That from and after the passage of this Act it shall not be lawful for any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery counties to carry on the days of election, secretly or otherwise, any gun, pistol, dirk, dirk-knife, razor, billy or bludgeon, and any person violating the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof before any Justice of the Peace, in either of said counties, shall be fined not less than five nor more than twenty dollars, and on refusal to pay said fine shall be committed by said Justice of the Peace to the jail of the county until the same be paid.

SECTION 2.—And be it enacted, That the fines collected under this Act shall be paid by the officer collecting the same to the School Commissioners of the county where such offense shall have been committed, for school purposes.

SECTION 3.—And be it enacted, That any constable of either of said counties or the sheriff thereof, who shall refuse to arrest any person, violating any provision of this Act, upon information of such offense shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the Circuit Court of the county, shall be fined not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars, and shall forthwith be discharged from office.

BETTING ON ELECTION.

The attention of all persons is particularly called to the following sections of Article 35, Code of Public Laws of Maryland:

SECTION 45.—No person shall make any bet or wager on the result of any election to take place in this State.

SECTION 48.—Any person offending against the last preceding section shall be liable to indictment to the Circuit Court, if the offense be committed in any county, or in the Criminal Court of Baltimore, if the offense be committed in Baltimore; and on conviction shall be fined not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars, to be paid to the State for the use of the School Fund.

SECTION 48.—Any deposit of money in any part of the State as a wager or bet upon elections in this State or elsewhere shall be forfeited and paid over to the County Commissioners of the county where deposited, for the use of the county, and if deposited in the city of Baltimore, to the Mayor and City Council.

Said election is to be held for the purpose of voting for public officers as follows:

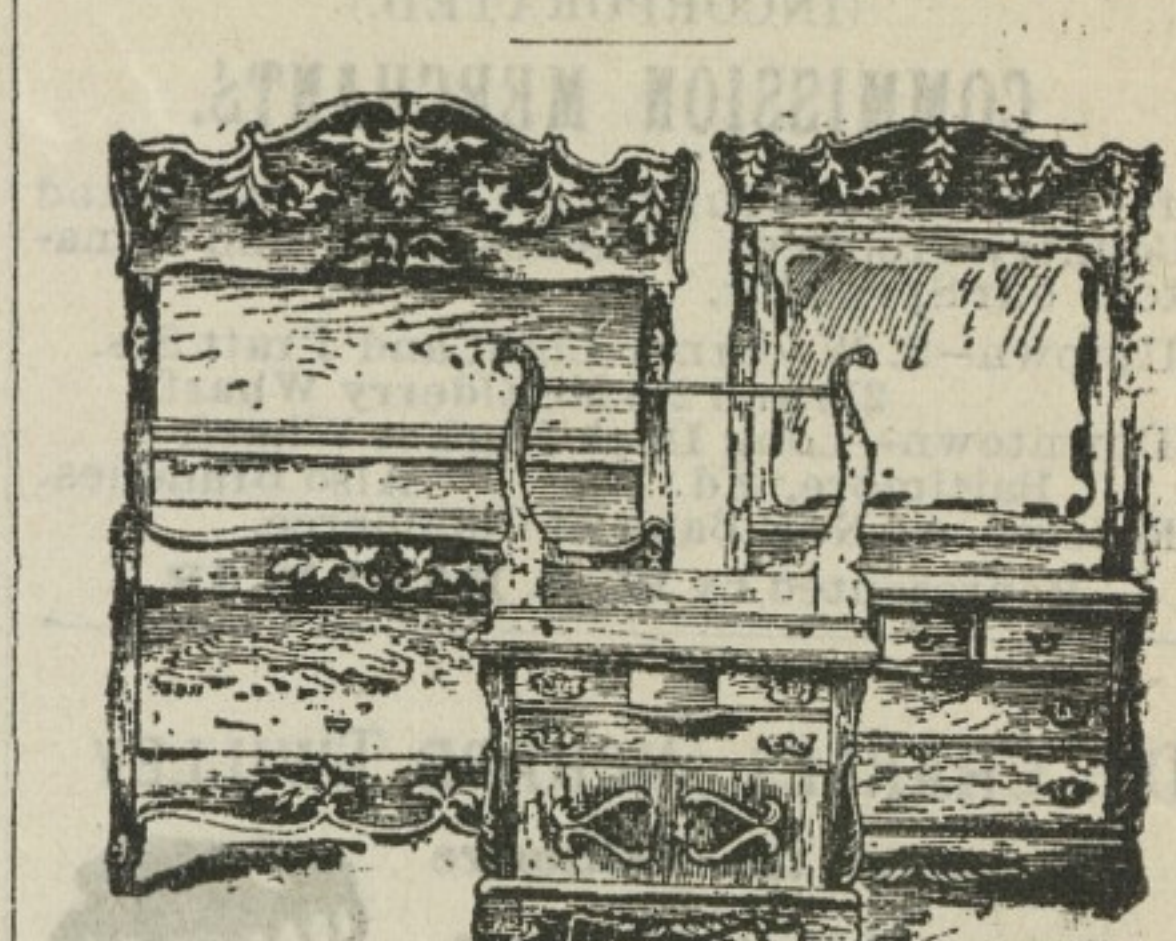
- One person to be Governor of the State of Maryland. One person to be Comptroller of the Treasury of the State of Maryland. One person to be Attorney-General for the State of Maryland. One person to represent Kent county in the Maryland State Senate. Two persons to represent Kent county in the House of Delegates of the State of Maryland. One person to be Clerk of Kent County for the term of six years. One person to be Treasurer of Kent County for the term of two years. Three persons to be Judges of the Orphans' Court for the term of four years. Three persons to be County Commissioners of Kent County for the term of four years. One person to be Sheriff of Kent County for the term of two years. One person to be State's Attorney for Kent County for the term of four years. One person to be Surveyor of Kent County for the term of two years.

The Return Judges shall make their returns before twelve (12) o'clock noon, the second day after the election, that is to say, before noon Thursday, following the Tuesday of the election, in the manner prescribed by the law, to the clerk of the Circuit Court, to the County Commissioners, to the Board of Supervisors of Elections and to the Register of Wills of the county aforesaid.

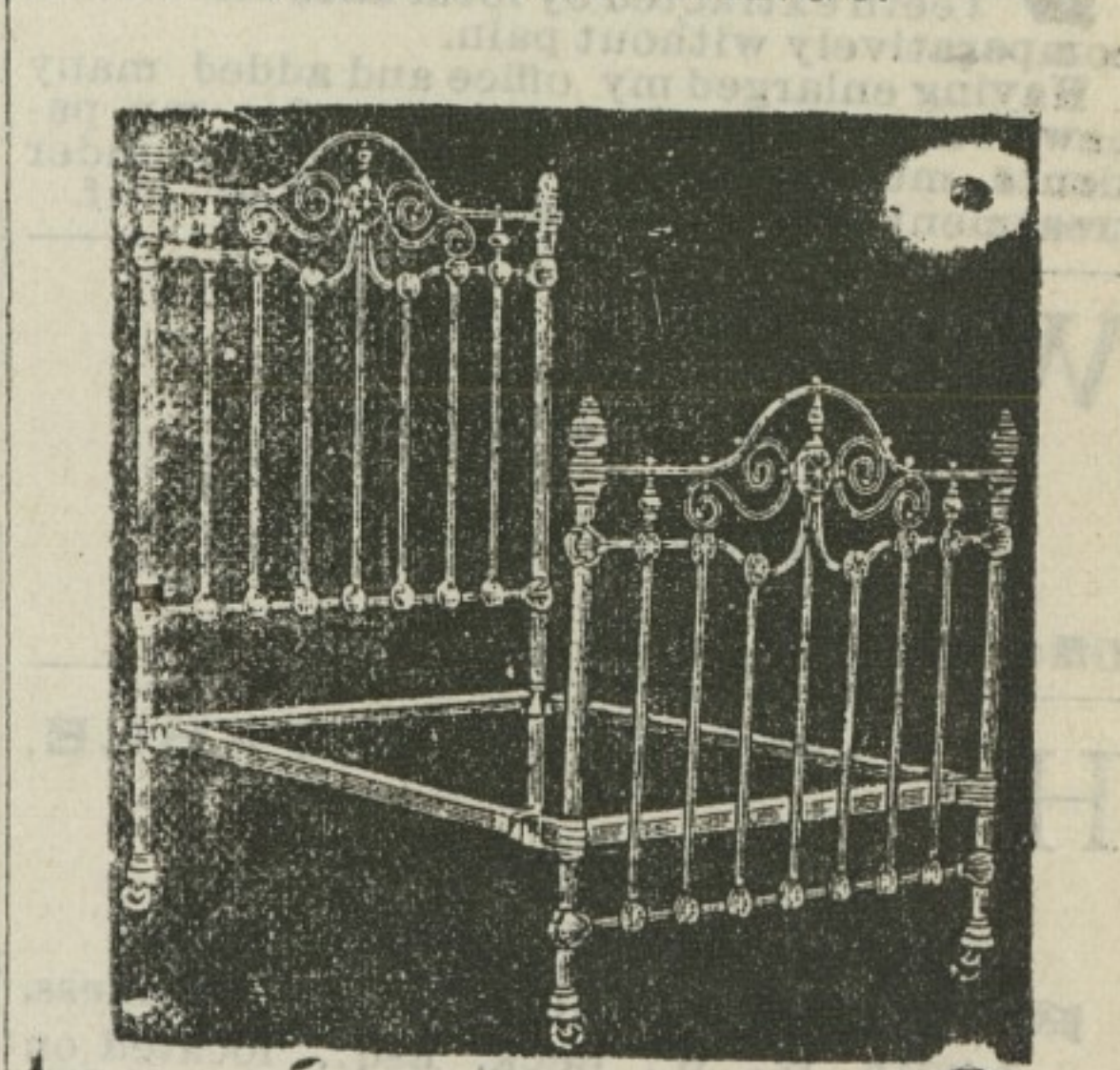

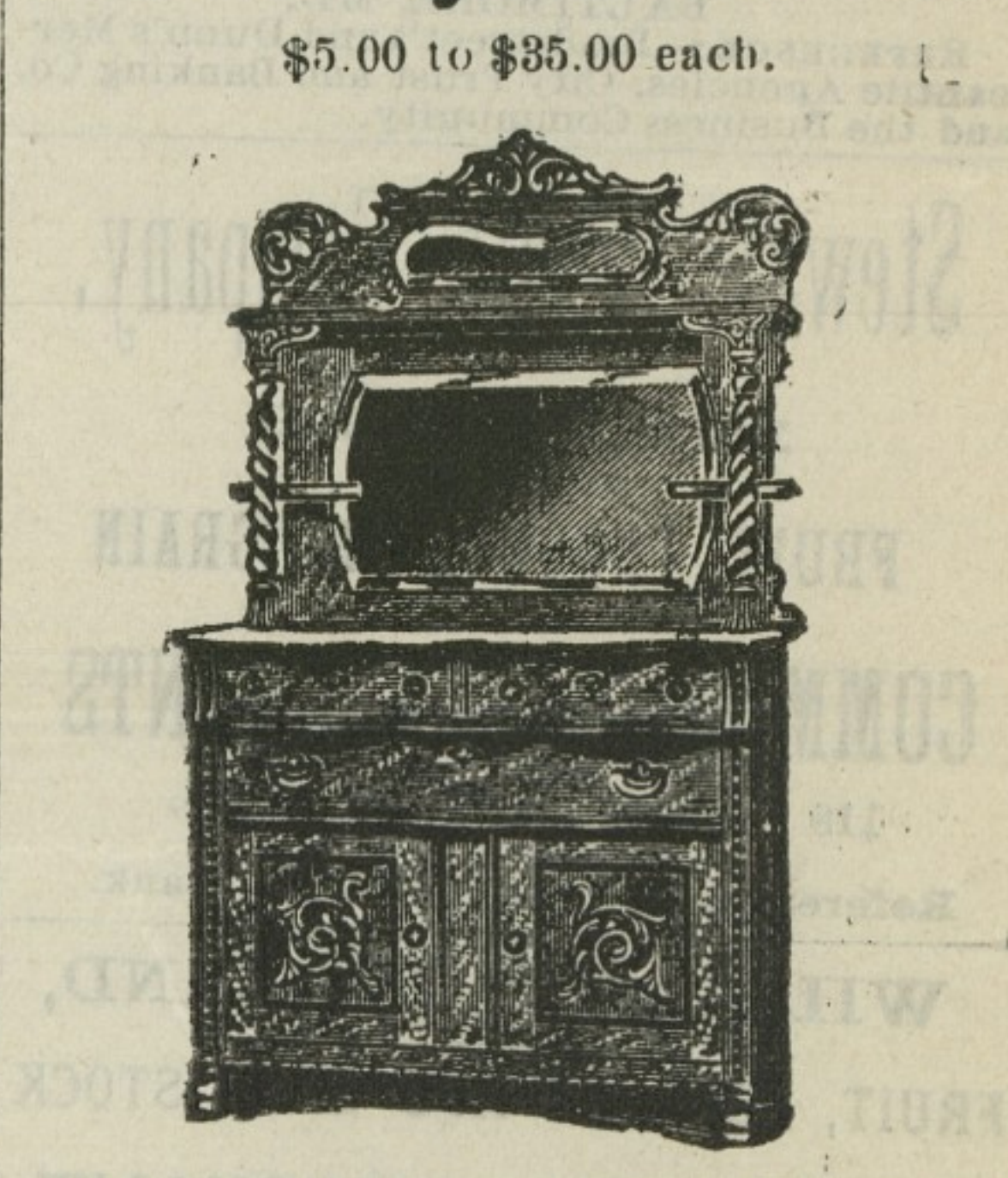

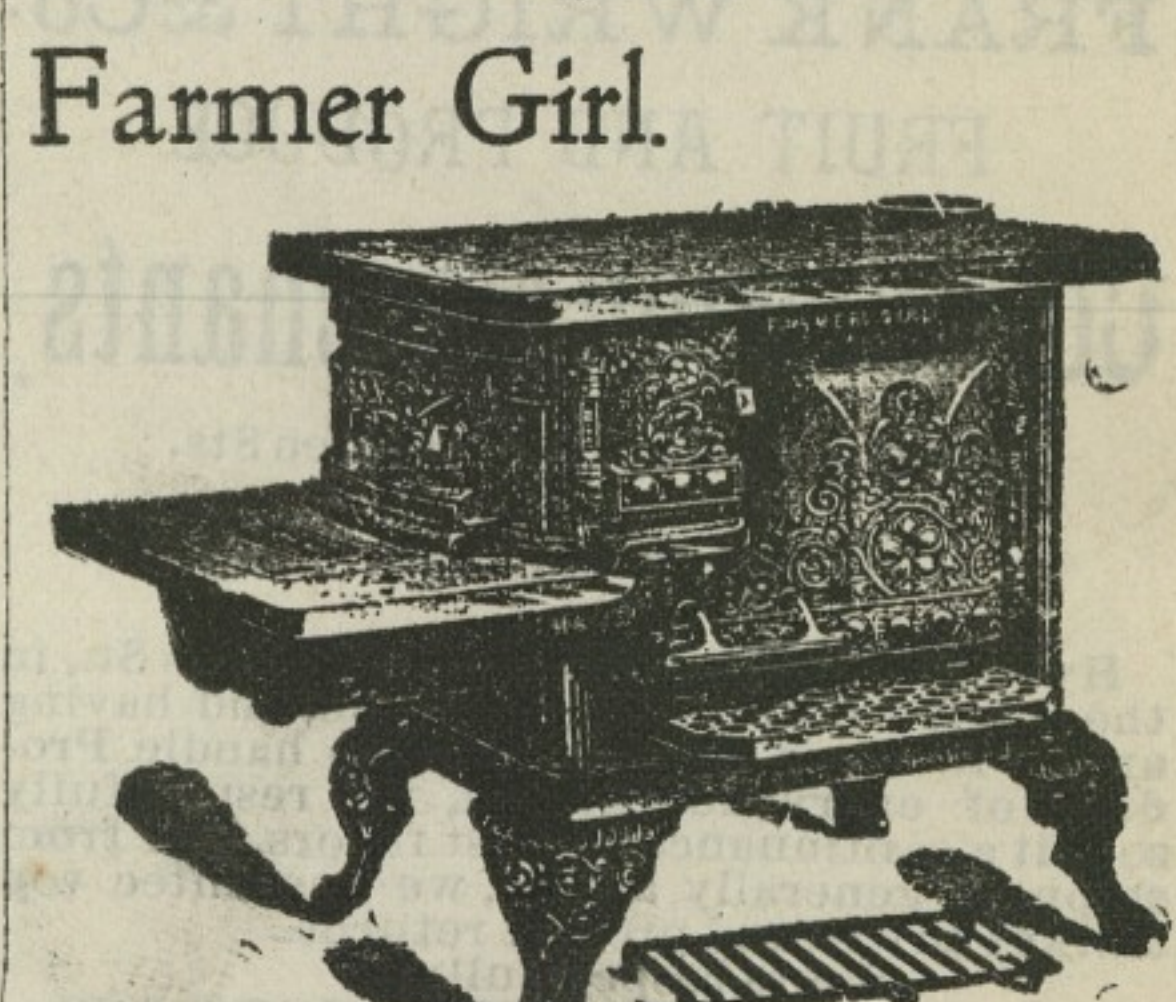
