THE NORTH and South are pitted against each other in this election in Maryland, Roosevelt, the reckless President, has endeavored to revive old scenes. The battle lines drawn up. On the one side stands Roosevelt and the negroes, on the other stands the white manhood of this grand old state of Maryland with the ballot as its weapon. White men, when the cry "charge!" is sounded on November 3rd, present a united front to this insulting President and his treacherous policy, and make Maryland, my Maryland a white man's State forever.

AN "Old Democrat" writes urging the white people to "wake up and not be deceived by Republican campaign lies." He says: "Talking about the cost of the extra session of the Legislature, I think the Republicans had better look back and see what they did. Go back to 1865 and see who was disfranchised. Our best citizens were kept from voting. I know how it was, for I was not allowed to vote; and in 1863 and '64 squads of soldiers kept voters from the polls, and they would like to do it again—if they could. Wake up, white men! Vote the white man's ticket!"

COUNTY FINANCES.

It was discovered last week that the present Republican Board of County Commissioners has spent \$8,000 more on the county roads than the levy of May 26th, 1903, actually shows. Instead of having spent \$30,354.71, as the levy shows, they have actually spent \$38,354.71. The levy also shows that the State's Attorney has received \$2,919.20 as his salary for last year. It has been ascertained that he received an additional \$700 which does not appear in the levy. His salary for last year should be corrected to read \$3,619.20. All of these errors will be added to next year's levy, and the tax-payers can very readily see why the rate for next year will be more than \$1.35. Has it ever occurred to the people that the Republican press has never said a word about these two items of the county's expense? They have not said one word about the enormous amount of the tax-payers' money that has been wasted on the roads for political purposes and for the State's Attorney's salary.

WHISKEY IN THE CAMPAIGN.

Today practically closes the campaign in the State. It has been a hard one, every inch of the ground being fought desperately. So far as the Democrats of the county are concerned, we are proud to state that it has been a campaign entirely free from abuse of any candidate on the Republican ticket, and free from the use of intoxicating liquors. We have yet to hear of a single Democrat in Kent county using or paying for the use of a single drop of liquor in the entire campaign. We regret to say that such cannot be said of our Republican friends. It has been reported from very reliable authority that three of the candidates on the Republican ticket went to Eastern Neck Island some weeks ago, taking with them a keg of beer and a gallon of whiskey, and every man and boy with whom they came in contact was made beastly drunk, and it is also reported that the candidates were drunk. Such methods as these to win votes are greatly to be deplored, and no candidate who practices such methods as these, has a right to the votes of the intelligent citizens of the county. We were not informed of this incident by one man. It has been stated by people who know it to be a fact, and we regret to know that any man on the Republican ticket should countenance such procedure. If there is any one thing that is subversive of good government and damning to the morals of our men and boys it is to attempt to purchase their manhood with a draught of whiskey. The Republicans have made some grievous mistakes in this campaign, but this one rises above them all. The Republicans have sprung this issue in Wednesday's issue of the Enterprise. Let them take their medicine.

CLOSE OF THE CAMPAIGN.

We have reached the close of a hard fought campaign. On Tuesday the Battle of the Ballots takes place, and on the result of this battle depends the future of the State and county. Shall our county and State be Democratic or Republican? Shall the affairs of our county be entrusted longer to a party that has demonstrated by practical experience that it is incapable of administering them to the interest of the tax-payers, and shall we endorse the policy of a party that is composed almost exclusively of an irresponsible and non-taxpaying element of our population? These are questions which the voter has to face when he goes to the polls to cast his vote on Tuesday, and these are the questions which make this election different in many respects from all other elections held in the county. The responsibility of the voter is a grave one. Upon his decision rests the preservation of his home and property interests. It must be remembered that a vote cast for the Republican ticket means an endorsement of the financial policy of that party, and of the domination of the county government by a party that owes its existence to 1760 negroes who pay less than \$2000 of the county's taxes and are guilty of four fifths of its crimes. We do not believe that the people of the county are willing to endorse such policies any longer, and they will manifest a desire for such a change as will place the affairs of the county in the hands of competent officials by casting a vote for the entire Democratic ticket. The questions involved in the approaching election are of too much importance to cause any Democrat to swerve from his duty. The Republicans have saddled upon the county an outrageous tax rate of \$1.35; they have spent the tax-payers' money in ways that have been of the least possible benefit to these tax-payers, and they have fostered a spirit of lawlessness and idleness that will make life and property unsafe in the county should they win this election. A much more deplorable condition of affairs could scarcely exist. No Democratic administration of the county's affairs ever produced such a condition, and if the Republican party in four years has brought the county to such a state, where will we be at the end of another four years of Republican rule. Everybody realizes the importance of a change. The best thinking Republicans admit it, and will vote for change by voting for the candidates on the Democratic ticket. We believe Kent county will be Democratic after November 3, but we must not be over confident. Every Democrat in the county must do his duty. Do not simply go to the polls and vote the Democratic ticket yourself but take some one else with you to do the same thing. Do not think the Democrats will win without your vote. Go out to the polls and vote a straight Democratic ticket. Put your X opposite the name of every Democrat on the State and county ticket and that will mean a vote for good government. The party thoroughly united and aroused to the necessity of putting an end to extravagance and lawlessness. But let us make the victory decisive by voting for every man on the Democratic ticket from Warfield to Melvin. Let the cry be "Be a member of the \$1.25 tax rate, and stamp it out with your vote. The Democrats have fought a good fight, they have conducted a clean campaign, endeavoring to enlighten the minds of the voters upon the true conditions of our county's affairs, without resorting to vituperation and abuse, and every one of the party's candidates are all the more worthy of the support of every citizen who loves good government. Vote a straight Democratic ticket."

NO BETTER or more economical administration has been seen in the entire history of the State than the present Democratic administration. The financial affairs have been so well and carefully managed that the State debt has been practically wiped out, and the next General Assembly will be able, as a result of this care to reduce the State tax to a minimum, or what is better, do away with it altogether. This excellent showing is entirely due to the ability of the Board of Public works which is composed of the Governor, Comptroller and Treasurer. Why should there be any necessity for a change to the scenes of 1896 and 1898? The legislation, passed by the General Assembly during these four years of Democratic rule has been of such a character as to commend it to all clear-minded citizens, not biased by political prejudice. In fact all that the Republicans have been able to bring against the Democrats as a reason for a change in the party administration of the State has been the alleged unfairness of the Ballot Law. They would like to change this Ballot Law in such a way as to enable every ignorant and non-taxpaying negro in the State to vote with such ease as to perpetuate the Republican party in power. They want a ballot law that will make the intelligent and taxpaying vote of far less importance in an election than the negroes who put them in power, and a vote for Baker, Trew and Smyth will assist very materially in this plan. The Republican legislative ticket, Baker for the Senate, and Trew and Smyth for the House of Delegates, if elected, will be compelled to vote for such a Ballot Law as will assist the ignorant negro to mark his ballot all the more easily and which will make it absolutely impossible for the Democrats to gain another election in Kent county or the State of Maryland. This State must be a white man's State, it must be governed by white people, and it will be if the intelligent voters of the county will see to it that Foxwell, Atkinson and Gibbs are sent to the next legislature to help make it so. Democrats by all means elect your Democratic legislative ticket, Foxwell, Atkinson and Gibbs, and thereby preclude the possibility of the State falling into incompetent hands and McComas, of Force Bill fame, being returned to the U. S. Senate.

STEVENSON A. WILLIAMS.

His Record in the State Senate.

Mr. Williams was in the State Senate when the Federal census frauds were undertaken and exposed. He knew the full extent of the infamous fraud that had been attempted, of the great wrong which such a padded census would work upon the people of this State, and yet, knowing all this, he stood by it and voted with his party to bind this padded and false census, with its false representations, upon the people of Maryland. "Another thing he knew—he knew that there had been an influx of negroes toward our State from the Southern States. In West Virginia they have captured the State almost beyond redemption. He knew the conditions in the gas-ridden State of Delaware, and he knew what the effect would be of the provision we had drawn providing that when a negro came into this State he must go before the clerk of the court and make affidavit of his intention to become a permanent resident here before he was entitled to vote. This provision, drawn by that distinguished lawyer and sterling citizen, John P. Fos, he knew, was the one way to check this colonization of negroes within our State; the one way to check this influx from the South, to maintain the rights of the white people in our lower counties—yet Mr. Williams, knowing this, sat in the Senate and combated it, fought for the negro against the white man and followed his party's lead, in spite of his knowledge of the circumstances.

VOTERS, you cannot solve this race question unless you send Democrats to the legislature next winter. Therefore vote for Foxwell, Atkinson and Gibbs, who will assist in maintaining white supremacy in the State and County.

MR. WARFIELD'S POSITION ON THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

In his speech at Centerville on Oct. 20th, Mr. Warfield dwelt particularly upon the Public School System. Among other things he said: "I believe that the public schools of the State should be kept free from political influences. Our schools are for the children of the whole people."

"If I am elected Governor, and I believe I will be, I shall see that the school commissioners are men of the highest character, and whatever appointments I may make will be with a view to bringing about such a result. I will want men of ability, men interested in public education, and their political affiliations and activities shall not be a condition precedent to their appointment."

"In order to encourage competent and intelligent persons to enter and remain in the ranks of the profession, adequate salaries should be paid to teachers, and not a remuneration—as in many cases—less than that paid to janitors and persons occupying such positions in the public service. The Legislature should fix a minimum salary for the teachers, to be placed as high as all the conditions of the problem will admit."

NEGROES AS LAW-BREAKERS.

The negro vote in the State of Maryland comprises nearly one-half of the entire Republican vote. In 1895, 11,026 negroes were arrested in Baltimore city, in 1897, 12,160, and for this year up to Sept. 30, more than 8,000 had been arrested. Since 1895 there have been 98,055 negroes arrested in Baltimore, within a few thousand of the total Republican vote of the State.

At the last session of the Circuit Court for Kent county, there were eight cases against negroes for disorderly conduct, stealing, etc. Each of these cases could and should have been settled in the magistrates' court. The decision of the magistrates' court was affirmed in each case, proving conclusively that there was no reason for such appeals, except to increase the tax-payers burdens. Not a single one of these culprits pay one cent of taxes, and yet every year the tax-payers are forced to pay twice for one offence. It is high time that the people of Kent county were waking up to such a state of affairs. So long as the Republican party, of which the negro is by far the greater part in Kent county, remains in power, so long will the tax-payers be burdened with the payment for the negro's lawlessness. This is not a question of politics. It is a question of economy and every honest man, whether a Democrat or Republican owes it to his county to put a stop to this thing. The only way to do it is to deprive such negroes of the right of franchise, and the only way to accomplish this purpose is to send Democratic representatives—Foxwell, Gibbs and Atkinson—to the Maryland Legislature, who will vote for the white man's supremacy and good government. The negro who owns property and pays his taxes is, as a rule, a law-abiding citizen, and we admit that his vote is a proper vote, but the negro who does not pay one cent of tax, and commits the greater part of the county's crime is the negro who has no right to a vote, nor to the enjoyment of any privilege to which he does not contribute a penny. These are the class of negroes who will make life and property unsafe in Kent county should the Republican party win at the approaching election. Their own people admit it, and the white Republicans admit it. The only thing then for the white people of Kent county to do is to rise up in their might and stamp out this element of our population by voting against Baker, Trew and Smyth. Making them know their places by curtailing their unmerited rights and privileges.
