NEARLY EVERYBODY FOR RAYNER.

Edward Everett Warner writes to the Sun from Chestertown:
Messrs. Editors: I have for the past six months represented one of the great corporations of the United States in the various counties of Eastern Shore Maryland. I have been thrown in close contact with hundreds of representative farmers, merchants and professional men, and in my repeated interviews I have had ample opportunity to discover the real sentiment of the people with respect to the United States Senatorship. I candidly state that outside of the rank and file of those who live by politics there is but little enthusiasm in favor of Governor Smith in this contest. However, there are some older citizens who still cling tenaciously to the Eastern Shore's illegal claim to an absolute right to one of the Senatorships. The people seem to be in the dark as to the Governor's capacity to fill the high office with any degree of distinction. They know him as a clever gentleman, a good Democrat, a successful business man and a liberal contributor to legitimate campaign funds, but beyond that they seem to know nothing as to his fitness in this instance.

"Nearly every man and woman not selfishly interested in politics is enthusiastic over Mr. Rayner's candidacy. His brilliant record in Congress, his burning eloquence for a quarter of a century in stirring campaigns and his profound knowledge of law they all know of and appreciate.

Mr. Rayner's defence of Southern prowess in the Schley controversy won for him imperishable fame and planted in the hearts and minds of all lovers of justice and fair play inextinguishable gratitude and boundless admiration for him. Mr. Rayner in the White House and in the Senate the genius and statesmanship of Maryland will have ample play to guide national thought and legislation and give evidence that Maryland has once more returned to her traditional practice of sending only her talented to the most exalted positions within her gift."

RAYNER'S FIGHT STRENGTHENED.
One of the features of last week was the Rayner meeting in Montgomery county, which opened the eyes of some of the politicians as to the extent of his following. The list of names composing the committee in each of the 10 districts of the county which have been appointed to work in his interest comprises the representative and substantial men of the county, and their publication has greatly strengthened his fight in that section of the State.

Conservative Democrats of the county say that the feeling is so strong that it means political suicide for the Delegate from Montgomery who votes against him. A similar condition exists in Harford county, it is claimed, and some of the strongest organization leaders in the county are enthusiastically for Rayner. The claim is made by friends of Mr. Rayner that he has now considerably more than enough absolute pledges from Delegates to control the Democratic caucus, but he does not propose to stop working until the fight is finished and he has been elected.

INVITED TO EASTON.
A special dispatch to the Sun from Easton Saturday night says:
"Mr. Rayner's candidacy has reached Talbot in a practical way and a letter signed by Democrats and prominent citizens has been addressed to him, inviting him to come to Easton and address the people in Music Hall. It is believed that an audience of 300 persons would greet Mr. Rayner."

"Among the persons who are for Rayner in Talbot county are the Golds, the Morgans, some of the Lloyds, the Hollands, of Easton; Merricks, of Trappe and Warners; the Jumps, of Chapel, and quite a number of plain talking people in St. Michaels and Bay Hundred district. At the Rayner meeting either Col. F. Carroll Goldsborough or J. H. Caulk Kemp will preside.

"Papers for signatures, asking the Talbot delegation to vote for Rayner are in the hands of some leading Democrats of the county. Meanwhile, it is asserted that the Talbot delegation will vote for Governor Smith for Senator."

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Commissioners for Kent county met at their office in Court House on Tuesday, Fullboard present.

Mr. M. Wilbur Thomas made application for order for amount of Water Co.'s bill now in hands of treasurer. Decided to hold all bills over. Moved by Mr. Davis that order be drawn on treasurer for payment of interest on bonds held by Smith Bros., adopted by the board. Letter addressed to Mr. Davis from expert accountants—Patterson, Teale and Denris, held over until board could talk with expert. Bills submitted by treasurer against Cecil and Caroline counties, moved by Mr. Davis that clerk collect same, and so ordered by the board. Application of John J. Scoon for constable in the Fifth district recommended by Mr. Ayres; board ordered his appointment. Bond was filed with application, was approved by the board and filed with Clerk of Circuit Court. Mr. Davis moved that the clerk write to the Maryland General Hospital asking if they can accommodate Wm.
