Mr. George Rasin expects to go to Rock Hall to attend the High School.

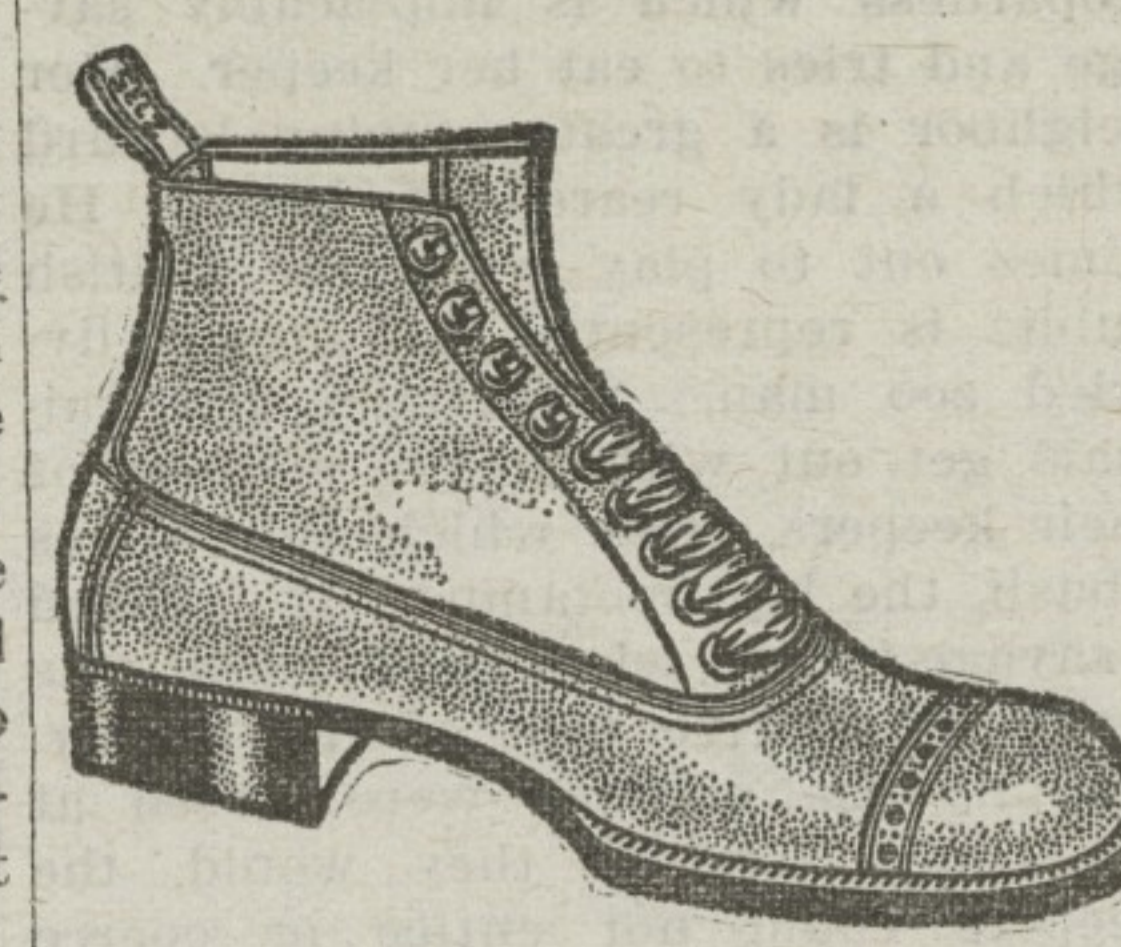
