**In Favor of Judge Pearce.**

The members of the Cecil County Bar have unanimously declared against the idea of Judge Pearce's retirement from the Bench by reason of the age limit in April, 1910. Judge Pearce will have reached the age of 70 years in April, 1910, and the term for which he was elected—15 years—will not expire until 1912, and the Cecil lawyers have started a movement to have the Legislature extend the Judge's term so as to permit him to serve until his term expires. This would be a splendid thing for the Legislature to do, and the Transcript will be glad to use its best efforts to assist the Cecil lawyers in accomplishing their purpose. But why should such a movement have been started in Cecil county? Why did not Judge Pearce's own county, Kent, take the initiative in this matter, and inaugurate the movement that may result in the Judge's retention on the bench? It seems to us to be a reflection not upon the Judge, but upon the people of the county that the Democratic leaders or the members of the Bar Association here, all of whom have been associated with Judge Pearce for years, should have started this movement to have been started by some other county. We believe the people of the county would be delighted to see Judge Pearce serve out his full term. As a Jurist he has few equals in the State, and as a gentleman and a scholar he has no superior. He has by no means served his lease of usefulness, and though advanced in years, he still retains great vigor of mind and body, and it would be a great loss to the Second Judicial Circuit and to the State at large to lose the service of Judge Pearce even two years hence. The Kent County Bar Association should have taken the initiative in this matter, but since they have failed in that, they should hasten to sanction the work of the Cecil Association and use their utmost endeavors to have Judge Pearce's term extended.
