GEORGIA DEMOCRATS at home are roasting the Cannon Democrats in Washington. The Georgia contingent may effect the governorship in that State.

THE new Primary Election Law, whether it be a good or bad law, certainly has the effect of making the man seek the office instead of the office seeking the man.

GOVERNOR CROTHERS has announced that under no consideration will he be a candidate for any office after his term expires. He will return to Elkton to practice law. With this position before the public, Governor Crothers has the chance to make equally as good a Governor as did Gov. Warfield.

NO ONE has had an official announcement from Attorney General Straus relative to running the candidates for county commissioner through the county. We believe the Attorney General is of the same opinion as are the vast majority of the people of this county—that it is a wrong thing to do, not only because of past custom, but on account of the danger in the election to such a method.

IF THE tariff bill now before Congress passes without alteration, the women of the country will be compelled to go bareheaded, barehanded and barefooted on account of the high tariff on feathers and flowers, gloves and stockings. It is a good thing the bill will not become a law until after Easter. What have the tariff framers got against the women, anyway? It is one of the best arguments in the world for woman suffrage.

GOV. CROTHERS' determination to retire from public office after his term as Governor expires, is a laudable one. The Governor has served the people of the state faithfully and well, but as he says, he can get all the honor out of his office in one term's service. It would be well if some of those now seeking a re-nomination for office in Kent could be magnanimous enough to emulate the Governor's good example, and give some one else, just as good Democrats, a chance to be rewarded for his services to his party.

After dinner Wednesday she had gone to her room to do some work, and between that and four o'clock she died, apparently as the result of a hemorrhage of the lungs. She was found by one of her granddaughters on her return from school. Mrs. Meredith was a woman of fine character, and will not only be missed by her immediate family, but by all who knew her.

Dr. Barrett is a fine preacher, and we are confident that his ministry here will be a successful one. His family arrived Wednesday and were given a splendid reception at the parsonage.

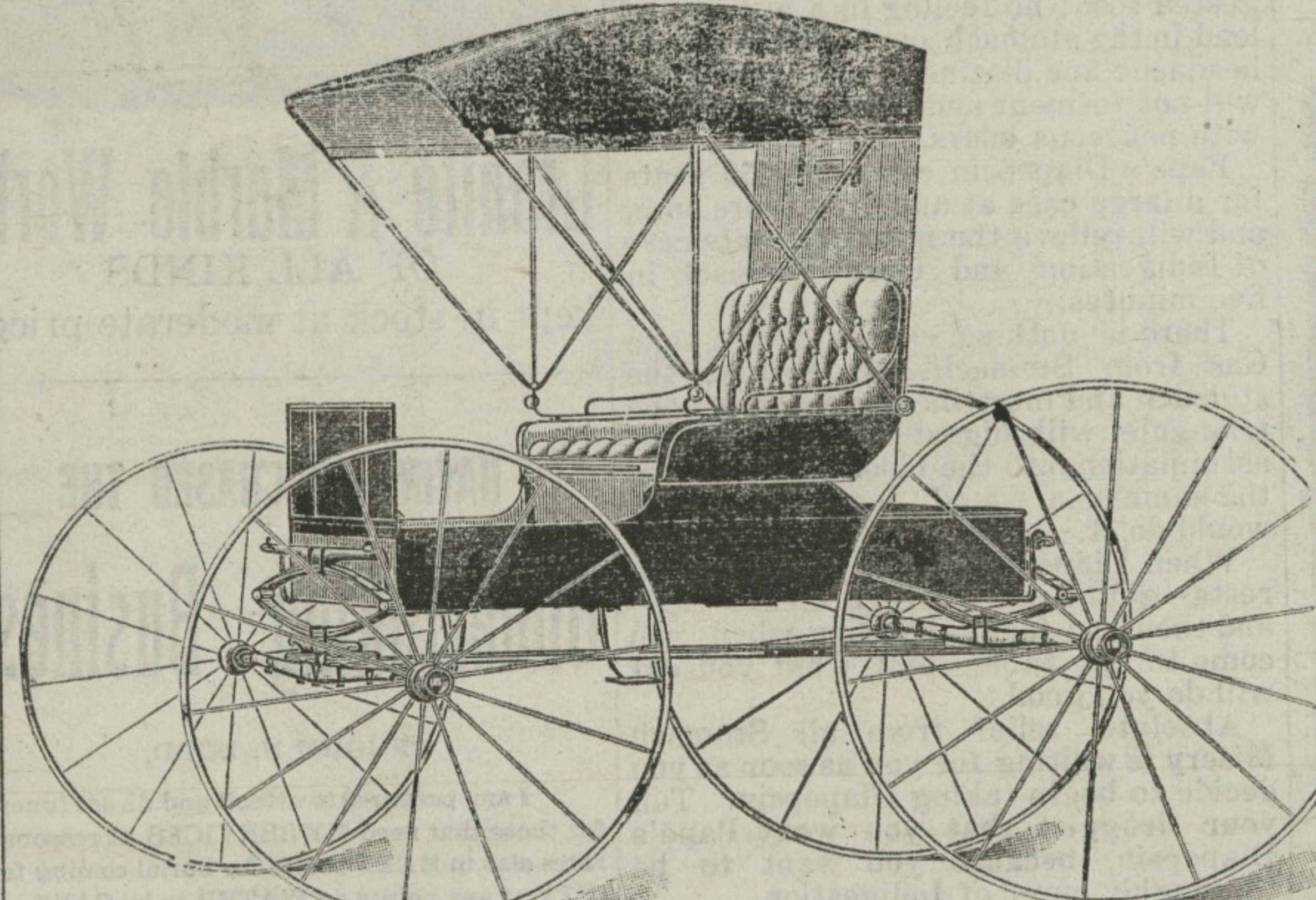

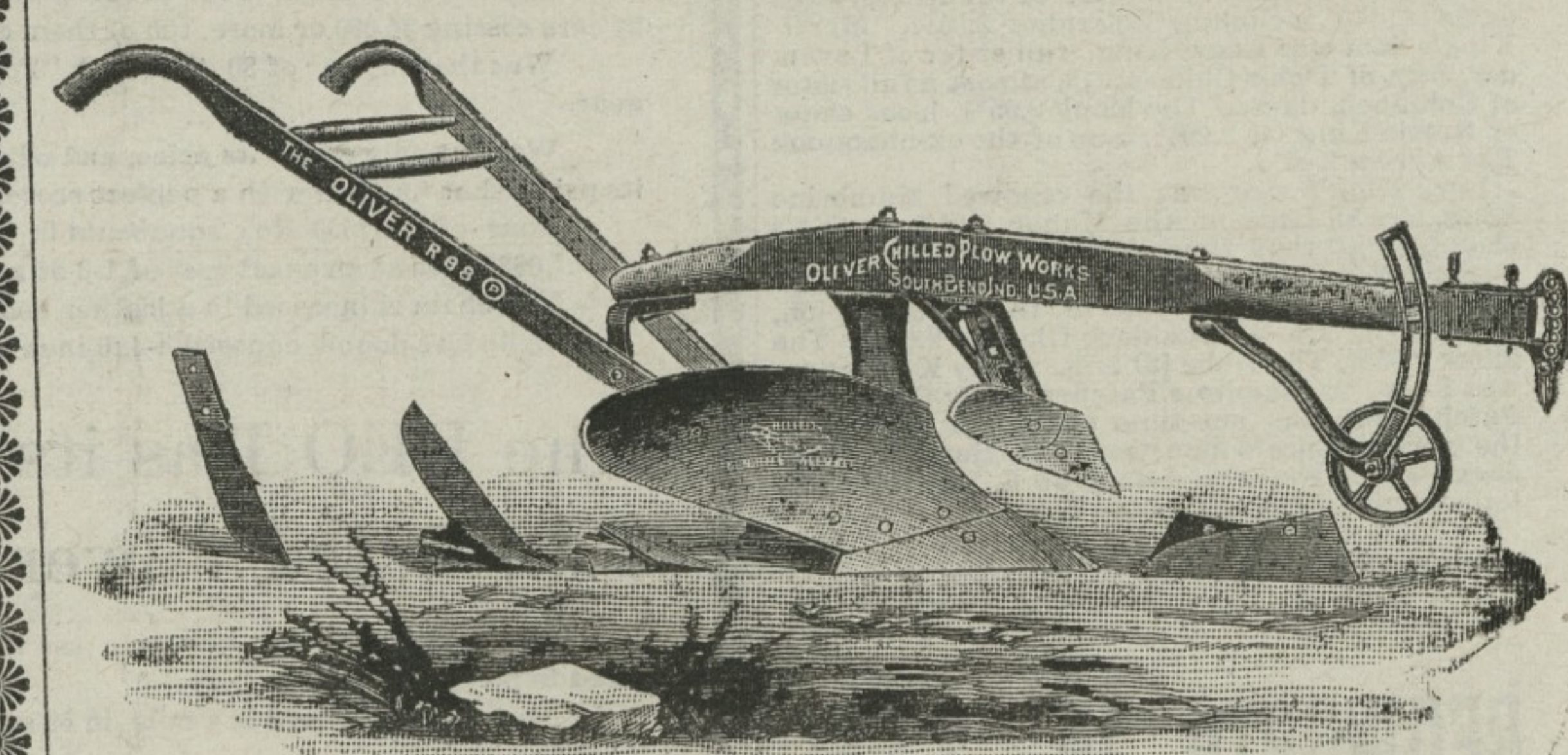

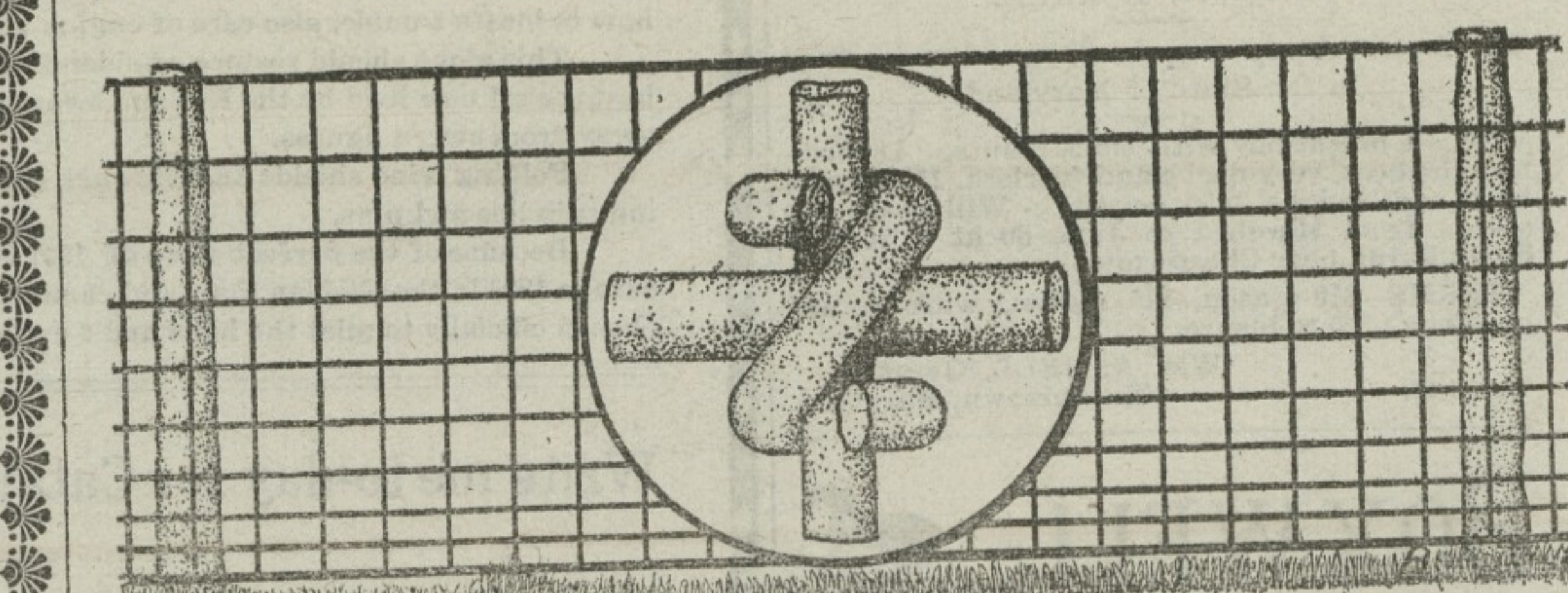
