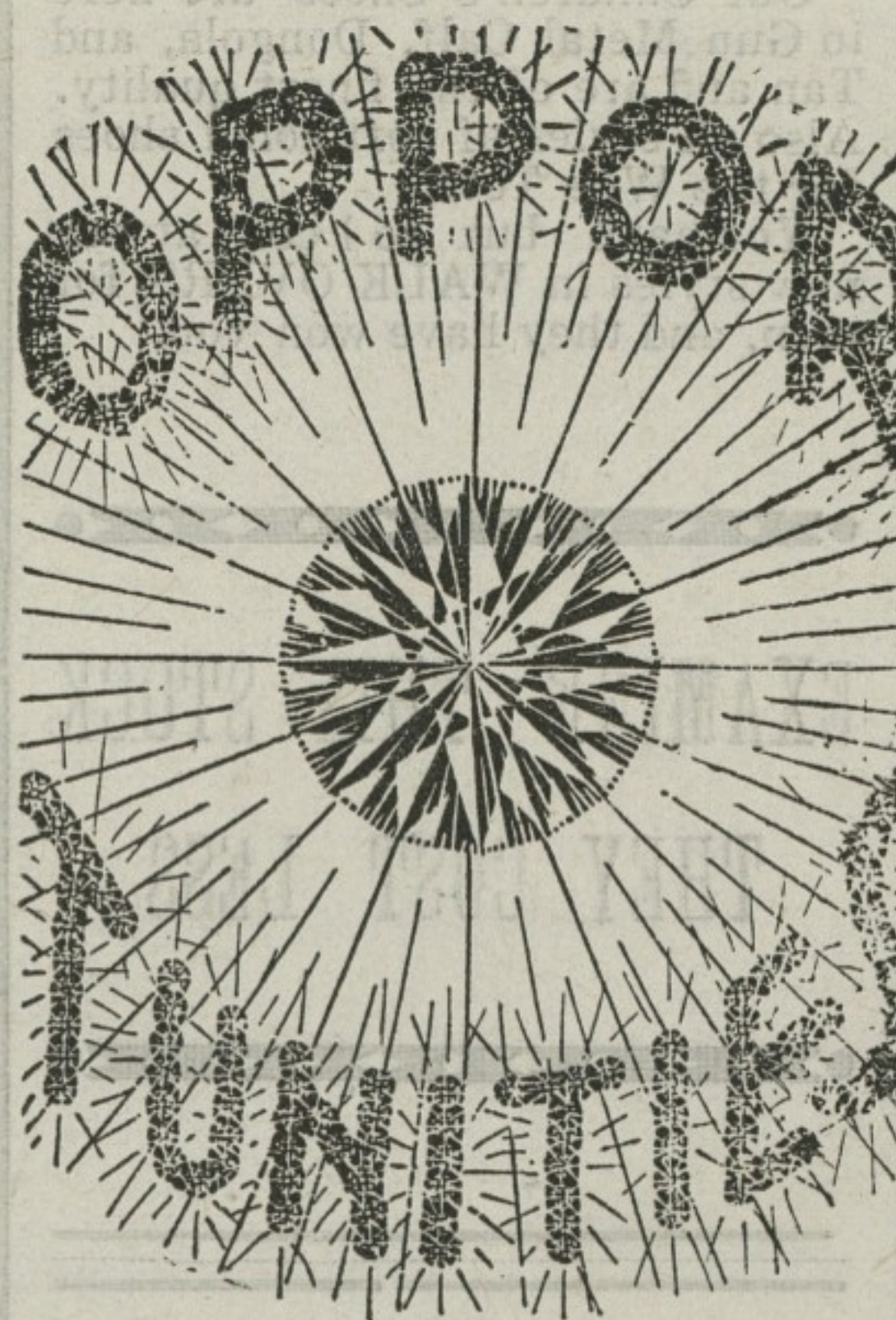

# Town Election.

The election of one member of the Board of Town Commissioners to succeed Mr. George D. Lofland, and three members of the Water Board to serve for a period of three years from May 1, proved to be more exciting than "some" thought it would be. Mr. John A. Hiron had been brought out by the organization forces some months prior to the election, and it was thought that they would give Mr. Hiron their loyal and sincere support. Mr. William T. Duyer, also an organization man, was sprung at the last moment, and so hot a fight did he and his friends make that the organization forces, after having promised Mr. Hiron their support, laid down absolutely, and while these votes went to Mr. Hiron almost to a man, the workers did absolutely nothing for Mr. Hiron or for Mr. Duyer. Mr. Duyer had the backing of the anti-organization forces, and as they always do, they played true to Mr. Duyer and he was an easy winner by 45 majority. Mr. Duyer receiving 141 votes and Mr. Hiron 96. Col. Wm. J. Vannort received 2, making the total 239. So far as the vote for the Water Board is concerned, there were a number of voters who insisted upon voting for Mr. Merrick Clements, a member of the Fire Company. He received 54 votes. The old Board was re-elected by the following vote: Mr. J. D. Bacchus, 192; Mr. Thos. D. Bowers, 231, and Mr. Chas. N. Satterfield, 221. Both the Board of Town Commissioners and the Water Board will reorganize May 1. Mr. Duyer, the newly-elected commissioner, is a young man of ability and has always taken great interest in the welfare of his town. He will make a most acceptable commissioner we are sure.
