To Control Codling Moth.

In order to demonstrate to the fruit growers throughout the State, the benefits to be derived from spraying Bordeaux mixture on apple trees for control of "Codling Moth," the Horticultural Department of the Maryland Agricultural College are conducting demonstration sprayings at the county poor-house farms in various sections of the State.

A demonstration spraying of this kind will be held at poor house farm of Kent county, situated near Chestertown, on Tuesday, May 11th, 1909. Prof. Thos. B. Symons, State Entomologist, or one of his assistants, will be present to conduct said demonstration. The interested public are cordially invited to attend. 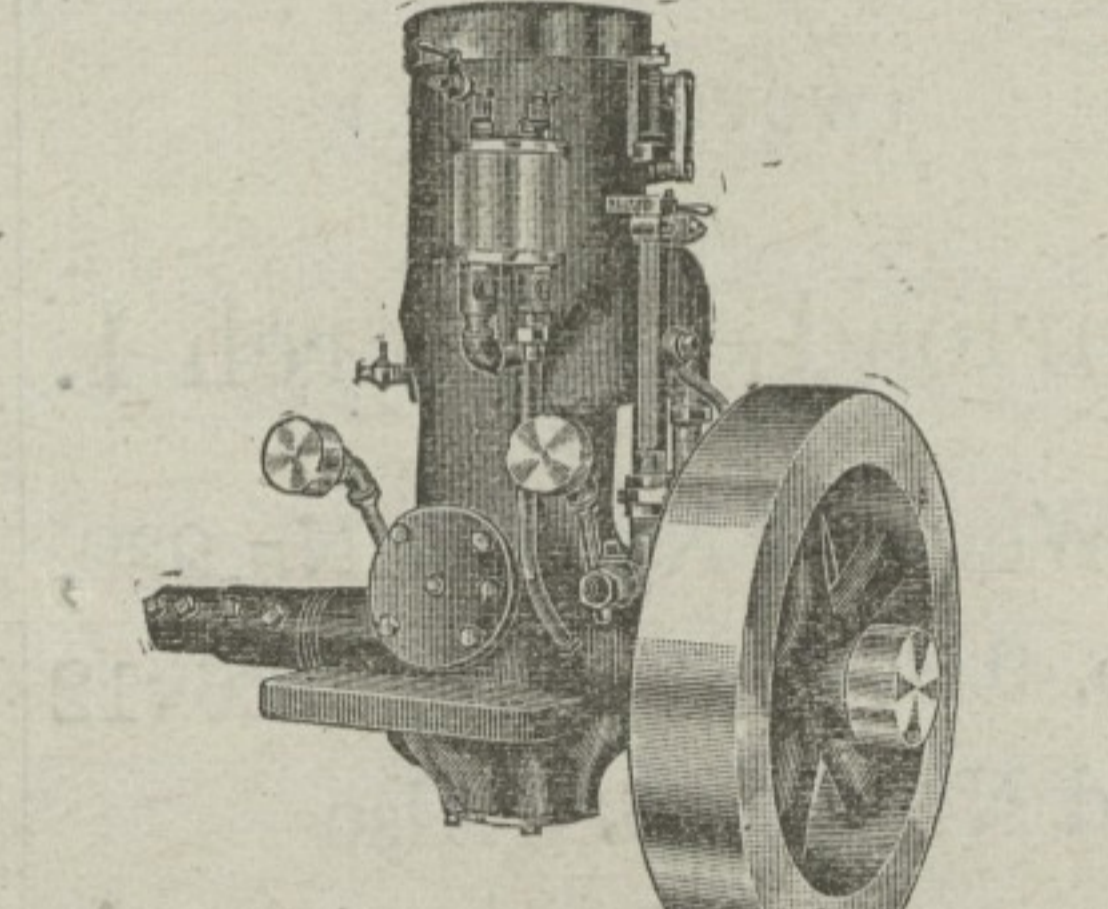
