MISS MARY EMMA WRIGHT.
Miss Mary Emma Wright died at the home of Dr. S. E. Ford, on Washington avenue at four o'clock on Wednesday morning, of pneumonia, aged 63 years. The deceased was born at Tom's River, New Jersey. She moved to Pemberton, N. J., at an early age. Later she took up her abode in the family of the late Budd S. Ford, and upon the death of his wife, Miss Wright took entire charge of the children, acting as a mother to them, and by her quiet and motherly manner, she endeared herself to them in the time of sweetest affection. After the marriage of Mrs. H. H. Klinefelter, Miss Wright removed to North East, and later came to Chestertown, where she resided at the home of her daughter, Mrs. D. D. Ford, whose home she made her residence until her death. She was actively identified with the M. E. Church, and was interested in everything that pertained to its welfare. She is survived by two brothers, Col. Samuel L. Wright, of Chestertown, and Mr. John M. Wright, San Francisco. Funeral services were held on Thursday evening at the home of Dr. Ford at 5 o'clock conducted by Rev. Dr. L. E. Barrett. The remains were taken by train to North East yesterday morning, accompanied by the family and relatives, for interment. The pall-bearers here were Messrs. Budd and Daniel Potts, Harry F. Jefferson, Walter Wright, W. E. Cooper and Charles S. Smith. Undertaker J. E. Ferguson had charge of the funeral arrangements.

MRS. JOSEPH J. POGGI.
"Mrs. Alice Florence Poggi, aged 54 years, wife of Joseph J. Poggi and mother of architect C. Godfrey Poggi, died Friday afternoon, April 23rd, at her late residence, 293 Murray street. She had been in failing health about a year. Mrs. Poggi was born in Philadelphia and had been a resident of this city thirteen years. She was a daughter of the late Professor E. H. and Alice Gates Bard. Her father was a well-known instructor of music. Mrs. Poggi herself was a vocalist of recognized ability. She possessed a wonderfully sweet contralto voice, and for a number of years sang for a time in St. John's Episcopal, St. James' M. E. and the first Presbyterian Churches. She had not sung in public for seventeen years.
"Mrs. Poggi was a woman of strong christian character, and was always deeply interested in charitable objects. She was one of the originators of the Elizabeth, now 'Eugenolf Day Nursery.' She was active in everything that could tend to better the conditions of those about her and nothing pleased her better than to be able to help those who were deserving of assistance and sympathy. She frequently visited the jail and by her presence and kind words tried to encourage the inmates to lead a better life.
"In addition to her husband, she is survived by two sons and one daughter, C. Godfrey Poggi, of this city; Edmund Poggi, of Wm. H. Lofland, Pa., and Miss Helen F. Poggi, of this city. She also leaves a brother and a half-sister, Edmund F. Bard, of Erie, Kansas, and Mrs. Thos. W. Skirven, of Chestertown, Md. Funeral services conducted by the Rev. John R. Atkinson, of Trinity Episcopal Church, were held Tuesday afternoon, April 27th, at her late home."
