OBITUARY.

DAVID B. DAVIS.
Mr. David B. Davis, one of the best known salesmen of the Maryland-Delaware Peninsula, and representative of Young, Smith, Field & Co., of Philadelphia, died at Atlantic City on Friday morning last of kidney trouble, aged 45 years. Mr. Davis had been in ill-health for some time and had gone to Atlantic City for the benefit of his health. The deceased was born in Chestertown and was the son of the late James Davis. He received his early education in the public schools of this town, and for a time was a salesman here. He went to Philadelphia in 1878, and for a long number of years had been a representative of one of Philadelphia's largest wholesale houses, engaging a large trade on the Peninsula, and the confidence of the business public generally. He is survived by a wife and two children, a boy and girl, aged ten and twelve years old. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Wm. E. Perkins, of Philadelphia, and Mrs. J. Frank Connelly, of Chestertown. The remains were brought from Atlantic City to his home in Philadelphia, where services were held on Monday. Interment was made in Philadelphia. Mrs. J. Frank Connelly, Dr. Charles F. Gillin and Lewis W. Wickes, Esq., attended the funeral from town.

MRS. ETTA N. AKERS.
Mrs. Etta N. Akers, a former resident of Lynch, and daughter of Mrs. Mary E. Edwards, died at her home on High street, yesterday morning, after a long illness of Bright's disease, aged 35 years. The deceased was a woman of beautiful christian character, and bore her suffering with patience and submission. Funeral services will be held to-morrow (Sunday) afternoon at two o'clock in Lynch M. P. Church, conducted by Rev. Dr. F. T. Little. Interment will be in old Union cemetery. The pall-bearers will be Messrs. Harry Nicholson, George French, Howard Dodd, Edward Newsome, Leonard Needles and Walter Needles. Undertaker Charles L. Dodd will have charge of the funeral arrangements.

LAMBERT T. SHALLCROSS.
Mr. Lambert T. Shallcross, youngest son of the late Judge Thomas J. Shallcross, died on Friday, May 8, on the train while enroute from Tacosa, New Mexico, to St. Louis. The body was transferred at Kansas City and brought to Kent county. Funeral services were held Tuesday last from the home of his sister, Mrs. Raymond Bonwill, near Kennedyville. The interment was in Kennedyville cemetery. Undertaker Wm. H. Krusen had charge of arrangements. The deceased was 23 years old and died of tuberculosis. He was well-known in Kent county and was popular with a host of friends who regret his early death.

Mr. Samuel Usilton, a wellknown resident of Rock Hall, died yesterday morning. He was a brother of Mr. Wm. B. Usilton, of Chestertown. His funeral will be held on Sunday morning, he was 80 years old.

WHITE PLAGUE UNCHECKED.
Increase Noted in Tuberculosis Cases Despite Great Fight Against It.

Washington, May 13.—That the vigorous campaign against tuberculosis has failed to check the great white plague was the startling charge made to-day by Nathan Straus, the New York philanthropist, at the annual meeting of the National Association for the study and prevention of tuberculosis here to-day.

Mr. Straus backed up his assertion by official statistics from the New York Health Department, showing an increase of 33 per cent. in two years in cases of tuberculosis in the city.
The reason for this failure to make headway, Mr. Straus declared, was the neglect of the mischief wrought by tuberculous dairy cows. Citing the results of scientific investigation and his own eighteen years' experience in saving lives, he summed up by saying that the abolition of tuberculosis will begin when it is made a crime to sell milk unless it comes from tuberculin tested cows or has been properly pasteurized.

Col Albert Story of Round Top, who has 40 heads of fine cattle and sells milk in Chestertown, had his herd tuberculin tested this week by Dr. Jarman, with excellent results. Dr. Jarman says this is the second time he has tested the majority of Col. Story's herd and he is ready at any time to furnish this herd with a certificate of health. It is only a question of time when all dairymen will be required to have a certificate of this kind before they will be allowed to sell milk. Mr. Straus is on the right track, and his opinion on this question has the hearty approval of Dr. Jarman.

Base Ball Notes.

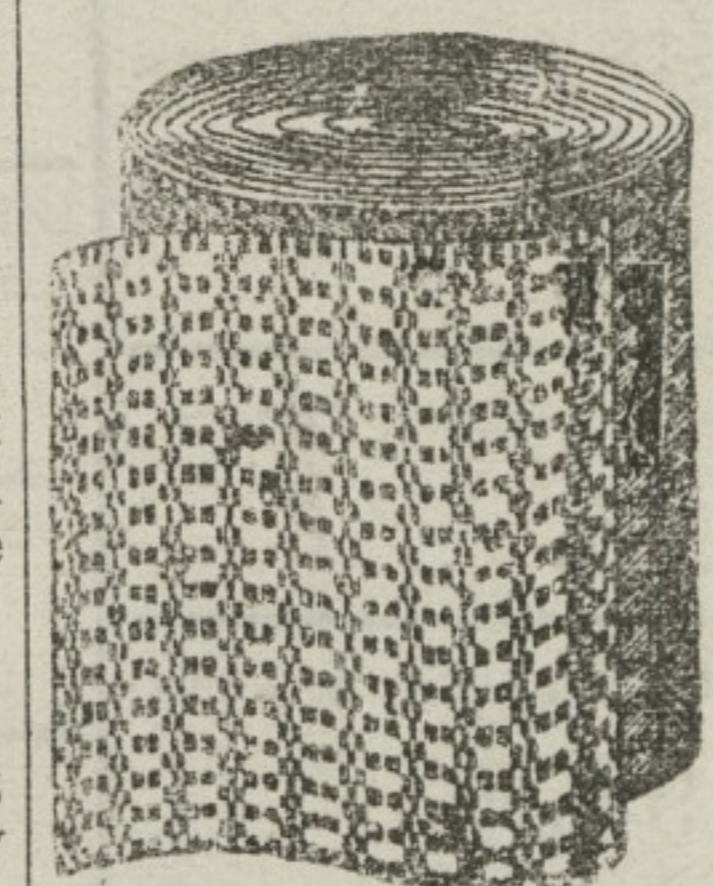
