We do not hesitate to say that Washington should have won the game, as they had several opportunities to score, but poor base-running was responsible for the lack of runs. John Washington's mainstay in the pitching staff, pitched winning ball and had he received proper support, would have won his game easily. Better base-running will win more games.

The best exhibition of batting seen for many a day was witnessed by those who saw the game between Jersey City and Montreal last week. One of the players of Jersey City, out of five bats knocked three home runs, one three-bagger and a two-bagger. That's going a few.

The Chestertown High School team visited Centerville last Saturday and trounced the High School team of that town to the tune of 23 to 5.

Flatland and Worton Station teams played a hot game of ball at Worton Station on Saturday afternoon resulting in a victory for Flatland. Score 19 to 14. Walter Fowler and John Dwyer were the battery for Flatland and Henry Rasin and Harry Jones were in the points for Worton. The way the game hit the ball was a caution, and the base-running of both teams would have given some of our college teams good pointers. A big crowd of spectators saw the game.

Last Saturday afternoon when the Kennedyville club failed to reach Chestertown, the "Railroad Spikes" crossed bats with Captain "Doggie" Dwyer's "Chestertown Stars". The latter were overwhelmingly defeated, the score being 15 to 1. Morton, the crack pitcher of Washington College was put in the box for the "Stars" in the sixth inning, but he lasted just three innings, the "Spikes" hammering his curves all over the field, earning nine runs. Worton was succeeded by Metcalf, another W. C. twirler. He held the "Spikes" down in great style, putting them out one by one. The "Spikes" expect to play Rock Hall on the latter's diamond, next Saturday. The new teams are Georgetown and George Washington both very strong teams and well-known throughout the college world. It was the idea of the management, if Washington intended to come along in foot ball, the policy of past years in playing college and schools of little or no reputation should be done away with, and get into a little faster class so that the team would have a standard to work to. These games were also arranged with the intention of putting the boys in the best possible shape for the Maryland games. Manager Brown deserves a great deal of credit for the well arranged schedule, and with most of the old men back next year, the followers of football can look forward to some fast games.
