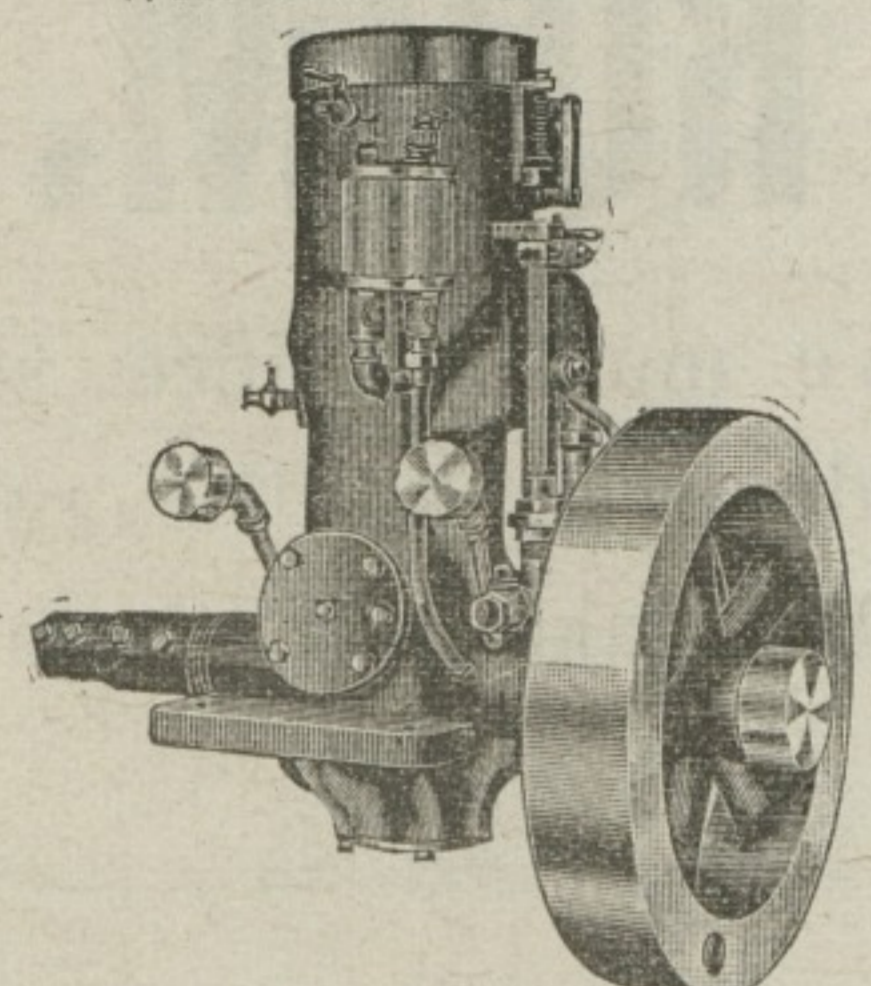

OBITUARY.

MRS. TAMSEY ANN REESE.
Mrs. Tamsey Ann Reese, widow of the late Rev. Levi P. Reese, a former well-known minister of the Maryland Conference, died at her home in Easton on Monday morning of general debility, aged 87 years. The deceased was an aunt of Associate Judge William H. Adkins of this circuit, and was before marriage a Miss Hughtlett. Mrs. Reese was one of our most charitable women it was one pleasure to know. She gave largely of her ample means to all church and charitable institutions and no one who was worthy and needed assistance ever called upon her and went away empty handed. She was a life-long member of the Methodist Protestant Church in Easton, which will feel her loss keenly. She was connected with the leading families of Talbot, Queen Anne's, Caroline and Dorchester counties and Baltimore city, and there is not a minister in the Maryland Conference who did not know of Mrs. Reese and her many benevolences. Her funeral was held from Calvary M. P. Church, Easton, on Tuesday afternoon, and on Wednesday her remains were taken to Baltimore beside her husband and child. The Methodist Protestant ministers in Baltimore attended the services at the grave in a body, and the Preachers' Association has drafted suitable resolutions upon her death.

MISS MARGARET PENNINGTON.
Mrs. Margaret Pennington died at twelve o'clock Monday night at her residence, Maple avenue, of asthma, aged 77 years. The deceased was a devout member of the Methodist Protestant church, and was a good woman. Funeral services were held in Christ M. P. Church on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Dr. F. T. Little. Interment was in Kennedyville M. P. cemetery. Undertaker Chas. L. Dodd had charge of the funeral arrangements. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. Jas. W. Lambert, Jos. Guest, Chas. S. Smith, A. S. Crawford, Fred G. Usilton and Wm. Vansant.
