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REPUBLICAN primaries will be held in Kent county August 7.

THE Organization forces gave a big spread in Rock Hall on Thursday, but they didn't think enough of the oystermen and fishermen to invite them to be present.

They have not attempted to answer this question yet, and they dare not answer it.

### AN ABUSIVE LETTER.

We have received a most abusive and scurrilous article from the pen of Lewin W. Wickes, Esq., through Mr. William W. Beck, for publication. We refuse to publish the article at this time, because the sole purpose of the article is to catch votes, and we do not propose to be made a tool of by Mr. Wickes and his friends to further their political interests. THE TRANSCRIPT is fully able to protect itself against such an unwarranted an abusive attack, designed solely to catch the unsuspecting voter, and at another time in the future we may publish Mr. Wickes' article in full and make reply in such manner as his political content to state that Mr. Wickes has been ever since the early part of March to the present time endeavoring to find out just what Attorney-General Straus' opinion really is, and he has been compelled to refer several of the communications to Chairman Vandiver for interpretation, and if it has taken Mr. Wickes two months to learn just what Mr. Straus' opinion is, and he himself a lawyer, how in the world can he expect the "indecent" and "falsifying" editors of the TRANSCRIPT to know what the opinion was or is? Mr. Wickes has had the important information in his possession since early in March, and yet he has withheld it from the people until within a few weeks of the primaries. If the people of Kent county can see through the whole procedure then we are deceived in their political shrewdness. Mr. Wickes has always prided himself upon his dignity and conservatism, but in his letter, which will probably appear in another paper this morning, he has transcended all bounds and has descended to the level of a mud-slinging politician, whose thrust will injure him more than it will do this paper or its editors harm. We mean to protect the rights of the people of this county regardless of Mr. Wickes, and we are satisfied that our course in the matter of running the commissioners is in the interest of justice and right.

### MR. DIXON'S CANDIDACY.

Mr. James T. Dixon is a candidate for re-nomination for Clerk of the Circuit Court for Kent county. The career of Mr. Dixon as a public official dates back to the year of 1891, when he was elected to the office of Register of Wills for a term of six years at a salary of about \$1500 per year. In 1897 he was elected Clerk of the Court for six years at a net salary of \$3000 per year. In 1903, Mr. Dixon was again a candidate to succeed himself, and after a hot fight for his nomination he was elected for a second term of \$3000 a year for six years, and now after having served for six years as Register of Wills at \$1500 per year, and for 12 years as Clerk of the Court at a yearly salary of \$3000, he comes again and asks the people of Kent county to give him \$18,000 more for a third term. We fail to see what claim Mr. Dixon has upon the people of the county after having received \$45,000 of the people's money for the service he has rendered. We believe Mr. Dixon has had enough, and it would have strengthened him greatly with the people of the county had he been willing to have stepped aside this time and let some other equally as worthy man enjoy the reward of his labor for his party's welfare. Against Mr. Dixon's character and the conduct of his office, we have not one word of censure. He has made an efficient officer, not any more so than his predecessors, however, and he has been accommodating and considerate of every one who has had business in the office. It was Mr. Dixon's business to give to his county the very best possible service in the most important office in the county, but there has never been a man in the office who has not conducted it with entire satisfaction to the people, and there are dozens of other men in Kent county who can conduct the office with perfect satisfaction and leave the office with as creditable a record as Mr. Dixon has made. The question of efficiency does not enter into our opposition to Mr. Dixon. We are simply opposed to the re-nomination of Mr. Dixon because we believe that it is wrong for Kent to ask for another nomination after he has been in the office of clerk for 12 years, Register of Wills for six years, and his county has given him all he can conscientiously claim. We are opposed to giving any man a monopoly of any office in the gift of the people, and Mr. Dixon is re-nominated for the office again, it will be virtually creating a monopoly for the enjoyment of one man to whom the party owes more than it does to any other man. Personally and socially we have nothing in the world against Mr. Dixon, but there are other men in the county whose services have been just as loyal to the party, and they are just as competent and as worthy of reward as is Mr. Dixon. Mr. Dixon has had enough and we are opposed to his re-nomination.

### THE CANDIDATES FOR IMPORTANT COUNTY OFFICES

At the Primaries, Saturday Afternoon, June 12.

The primaries for the nomination of candidates for Clerk of the Court, Register of Wills, Sheriff, two County Commissioners, Treasurer, two Members of the House of Delegates, Surveyor, and seven Delegates to the State Convention will be held on Saturday, June 12th from two to six o'clock. The campaign has been in progress for some weeks and up to the present time it has been one of the best conducted campaigns in the history of the county, free from bitterness, and full of hard work on the part of the candidates. Mr. Hadaway is an aspirant for this office for the first time, and for the last time if he secures the nomination and is elected. He is a young man most highly esteemed by the people of his district and popular with all who know him. He is one of the most liberal men in this county, assisting those in his district in their needs, and in the past giving his time and his means for the welfare of his party. He has an ambition to be clerk of the Circuit Court for one term, and his ability to fill the office has never been questioned except by prejudiced minds seeking to gain votes for his opponent. THE TRANSCRIPT, its friends and any unprejudiced man is perfectly willing to trust the duties of any office to Mr. Hadaway, and if he is nominated and elected, he will discharge the duties of Clerk with ability and dignity. TO THE EDITORS OF THE TRANSCRIPT Gentlemen: As the time is near at hand for the holding of the Democratic primaries, and as the candidates for the respective offices have all been announced, I think it wise for us to stop a moment before we vote and reflect on a few undisputed facts relative to the clerkship.

Mr. James T. Dixon, the present incumbent, has made a capable and efficient official, and I have nothing to say which might be construed derogatory to Mr. Dixon, either personally or officially. The following are a few facts which I conscientiously believe should be observed and carefully weighed by every Democratic voter before he marks his ticket for any candidate for the office of Clerk of the Court in the year 1911, just eighteen years ago this fall. He was nominated and elected for which Mr. Dixon has conducted the office for the period of six years. As Register of Wills it is but a just and fair estimate to say that Mr. Dixon receives from the tax-payers of Kent county at least \$1500 a year, making \$9000 for his term as register.

He next asked the Democrats for another term. He was again nominated and elected, succeeding himself for another six years, which brings him down to the present time.

The clerk's office is recognized by every one as being the most desirable and the most lucrative office in the gift of the people of Kent county. Mr. Dixon received as Register of Wills:

making a grand total of \$45,000 he has received at the hands of the Democrats of this county. What is he now doing but simply seeking for \$3,000 a year for the coming six years? Is it right and fair for him to ask for another \$18,000 from us? As I stated at the very outset I have nothing to say as to the manner in which Mr. Dixon has conducted the affairs of the office, but simply want to ask the people of Kent county whether they think that it is right and proper that any one man (makes no difference who he is) should feel that he is justified in asking the Democratic voters of this county to give him another six-year term, with the \$18,000 job, thereby compelling him to run in the year 24 consecutive years, from 1891 to 1915.

The people of this community, I believe, appreciate a man's worth and recognize one's ability; but in doing so they do not fail to recognize also that there are other men just as fit and capable to fill the offices of Kent county as Mr. Dixon. It is the true and inherent spirit of our government that rotation in office is best for us all. Ever since Mr. Dixon has been in office he has had the clerks of our courts, and they have in time been succeeded by other capable and efficient men, until to-day we are clothed with another nomination and election for that office.

Jesse K. Hines, Dr. Samuel Beck and Dr. Fisher, and in fact, all of the clerks in the past were able, capable men, and they have conducted the past clerks knew anything more about conducting the affairs of the office at the time of their election than those who now aspire to that office, yet they all made good officials and served the public well and faithfully. Dr. Barwick and Mr. Walter H. Hadaway are just as capable and know as much about conducting the affairs of the clerk's office as any of their predecessors at the time of their election. It is Mr. Dixon's poor argument to say that he should be given another six-year term simply for one fact, and that is, because he has made a capable officer serving their term of office, why should Mr. Dixon not retire?

Whether a man be an organization man or an Anti, I believe if he stops to consider how he should vote for who should be nominated for the clerk for the next six years, he cannot help feel that truly Mr. Dixon, however capable he may be, is but fairly safe had not he (\$45,000) from the people of this good old Democratic county, and that he should be willing to step down and retire on his well-earned and deserved laurels.
