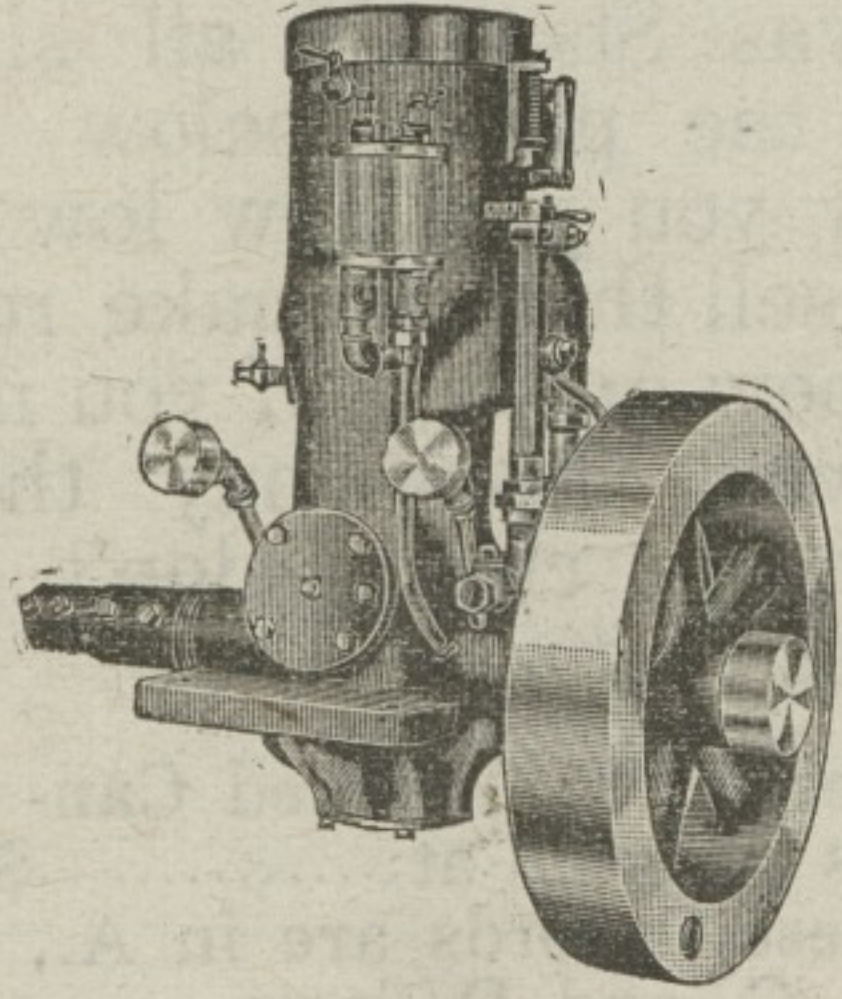

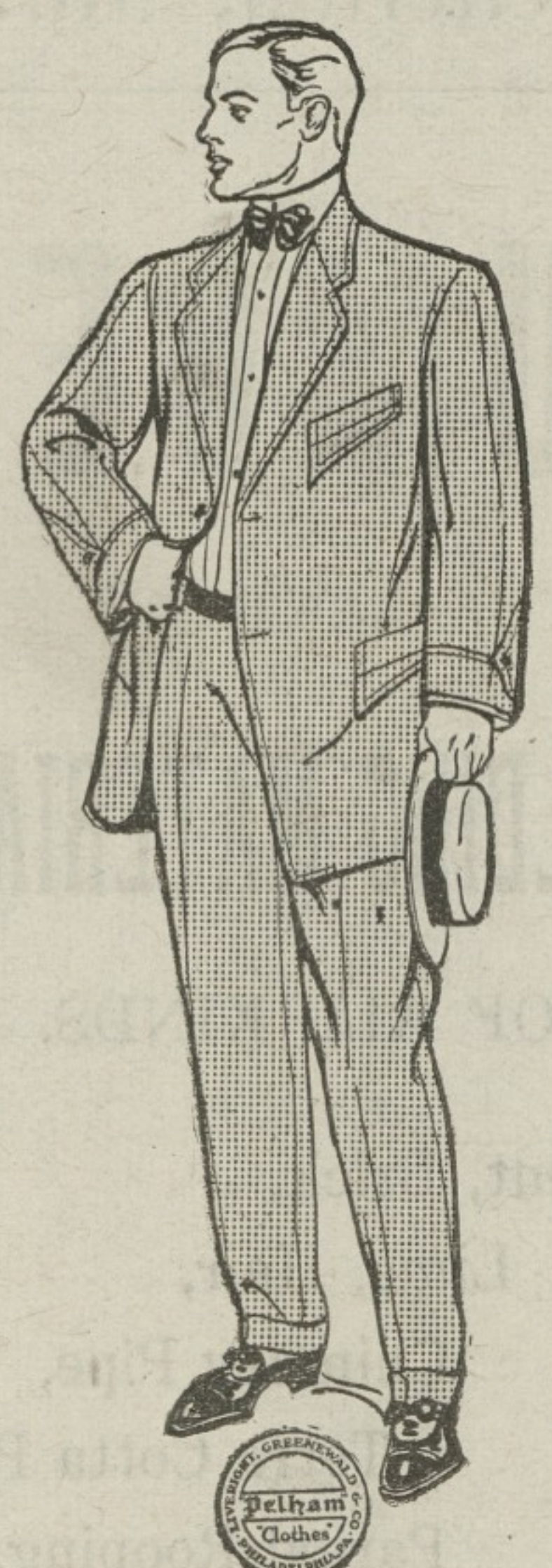

MR. JOHN E. MORRIS Should Be Removed From The Ticket.

VIOLATION OF THE CORRUPT PRACTICES ACT.

This is the Corrupt Practices Act under the law of the State of Maryland, as passed by the Legislature of 1908, chapter 737:

"Sec. 171. The following persons shall be guilty of corrupt practices and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of this Act: Every person who shall directly or indirectly, by himself or by another, give or promise, to any person any money, gift, advantage, preference, entertainment, aid, emolument, or any valuable thing whatever, for the purpose of inducing or procuring any person to vote, or refrain from voting, for or against any person, or for or against any measure or proposition at any election or primary election or political convention or session of the General Assembly of Maryland or either House thereof."

It is the duty of the State Central Committee to enforce this law. Mr. W. W. Beck has repeatedly said he would see that any one who violated it was punished. The following letter was written by Mr. William W. Beck, State's Attorney for Kent County, Md.:

DEAR ED.: I want to ask a favor of you, and that is to vote for John Morris and Wheatley for County Commissioners. I saw Mr. Morris yesterday and he promised me faithfully to give you a piece of road to work if he was nominated and elected, and I can make him stand to his promise.

"I am asking this as a personal favor, and hope you will do this for me. Very truly yours,
WILLIAM W. BECK."

Is the promise of Mr. Morris contained in the above letter a violation of the "Corrupt Practices Act," which is now the law of the State of Maryland? On the day the above letter was written Mr. Lewin W. Wickes, Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee for Kent County, was in Atlantic City. In his absence Mr. Wm. W. Beck, owing to the sickness of Mr. Wickes, was attending to Mr. Wickes' official duties. On that day Mr. Wickes, as shown by a letter published in the Kent News on May 29th, had himself solemnly promised to all the people of Kent County that the Corrupt Practices Act would be adhered to by the Organization element of the Democratic party. The following are Mr. Wickes' words: "The Organization element of the Democratic party will faithfully observe the Corrupt Practices Act, in letter and spirit, and the State Central Committee will suffer no violation of this Act either directly or indirectly."

Mr. John E. Morris violated this Act by this promise. He is thereby disqualified to run on the ticket. It is the duty of the State Central Committee and of the Supervisors of Election to see that his name is not placed on the official ballot at the primaries June 12th, next. In another column is in the charge of Judge Pearce to the April grand jury. Read it. Food for thought.

The following letter was sent to Mr. Lewin W. Wickes after Mr. Beck and Mr. M. deK. Smith had both been seen by prominent citizens, and a demand had been made that Mr. Morris should withdraw from the ticket. Mr. Smith promptly answered that the conference was at an end if that was the only demand. That Mr. Morris would not withdraw. Mr. Beck said if the letter was a violation of the Act he would withdraw it and promise not to write any such letters again.

LEWIN W. WICKES, Esq., Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee of Kent County, Chestertown, Md.:

DEAR SIR: On May 29th, 1909, you published a letter in the Kent News in which you used the following words: "The Organization element of the Democratic party will faithfully observe the Corrupt Practices Act in letter and spirit, and the State Central Committee will suffer no violation of this Act either directly or indirectly."

Enclosed herein I send you a copy of a letter written by Mr. Wm. W. Beck, the original of which I hold, which letter Mr. Beck states he sent to Mr. Crew in Worton. This letter, containing as it does, a promise from Mr. John E. Morris, one of the present County Commissioners of Kent County, to give Mr. Crew a piece of road to work if Mr. Morris were nominated and elected, is a direct and plain violation of the Corrupt Practices Act, this Act, as you well know, will disqualify Mr. Morris to hold an office in this county for four years from the day of the promise.

In view of your letter, of the provisions of the Act, and the violation of the same by a public official whose name is now before the people for nomination as County Commissioner, I write to ask if you and the State Central Committee will take prompt action to have Mr. Morris' name withdrawn as a candidate before the people in the present primaries? DEAR SIR: Your letter dated June 1st, 1909, and addressed to Lewin W. Wickes, Esq., Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee of Kent County, Maryland, in which you call the attention of the committee to the Act of Assembly, known as the Corrupt Practices

Act, has been received and in which you enclose a copy of a letter you claim shows that Mr. John E. Morris, a candidate for the office of County Commissioner at the coming primaries of the Democratic party, had been guilty of a violation of said Act, and you ask that the State Central Committee will take prompt action to have Mr. Morris' name withdrawn as a candidate before the people in the present primaries.

We are unable to find anything in the letter, a copy of which you have enclosed, to show that Mr. Morris had in letter or spirit, violated the Corrupt Practices Act, and you have failed to direct our attention to any section of said law that empowers the committee to take any such action as you have requested.

Doubtless you are aware that Mr. Wickes, the chairman of the committee, is absent from home by reason of illness, but the undersigned members of the committee desire to fully endorse the sentiments of Mr. Wickes, as expressed in his letter published last week to the effect that this committee will suffer no violation of the Act, either directly or indirectly.
