Bishop Adams delivered his annual address, reviewing the work of the diocese for the past year. Rev. Dr. Wilkins, general secretary of the five million dollar clergy fund, also made an address.

A Memorial Service.

A memorial service was held at Fraternal Hall by the Jr. O. U. A. M. and the P. O. S. of A. of this town in joint session Sunday morning, May 30, 1909.

The morning was beautiful and balmy, and assembly inviting for so sacred an occasion. A goodly number of the members of the orders was present and took special interest in the exercise thus giving evidence of a proper regard for the memory of those whose names appear on the Dead Rolls. Mr. J. Bruce McIntire was chosen chairman; J. Frank Wheatley, secretary and John W. Barnes, chaplain. Chairman McIntire spoke briefly, stating in a unique and sympathetic manner the object of the assembling of the two orders—that of memorializing the deceased members, some of whom were members of both orders, and which fact causes those present to feel very much akin. The chaplain then offered prayer in the use of the P. O. S. of A. opening prayer. The following members responded to their names when called and addressed the assembly in five-minute talks: S. Crawford, John C. Davis, R. F. Elburn, Wm. E. Coleman, J. Frank Wheatley, G. Thomas Dewberry, Wm. F. Russell, J. B. McIntire and Prof. J. L. Smyth.

It was very noticeable during the progress of the several addresses, that all were forcibly reminded that the deceased brothers were not forgotten; that many of their virtues are being recalled, and that their constant labors for the uplift of man were tenderly remembered. The following names were so feelingly remembered: Charles D. Nelson, W. F. Blyman, H. Meteer Wallis, Wm. A. Bradley, George G. Hall, Wallace M. Maslin and Wm. T. Matthews. At the close of the exercise at the hall, the entire body repaired to the cemetery and placed an American flag and flowers where the deceased members were laid, then all sang "Nearer My God to Thee," and bowed the head while Prof. J. L. Smyth offered prayer.

New Telephone Company.

The Farmers' Branch Rural Telephone Company which was organized a short time ago, held a meeting on Wednesday night at the home of Mr. J. R. Byron, agent of the Company, to look into the question of purchasing material for constructing their line. Mr. Julian D. Jones, of Western Electric Company, attended the meeting and made an estimate on the total cost of the line. The Western Electric Co. will furnish the necessary line material and instruments and it was stated by Mr. Byron that work on the line would commence at once. The new rural company has contracted with Mr. Nichols, of the Diamond State Telephone Co. for connection over the Bell system at the Chestertown Exchange. This will enable the subscribers to communicate at all times, not only in their own territory, but with the country at large as well. The continual growth in the number of rural telephones serves to show that the farmer is quick to appreciate this class of service and is anxious to secure the benefits to be derived from communication with the outside world. The subscribers are: J. Romie Byron, Joseph Watson, George Hendrickson, Joseph Brice and E. Sheppard. The line will be in service by the middle of the month.
