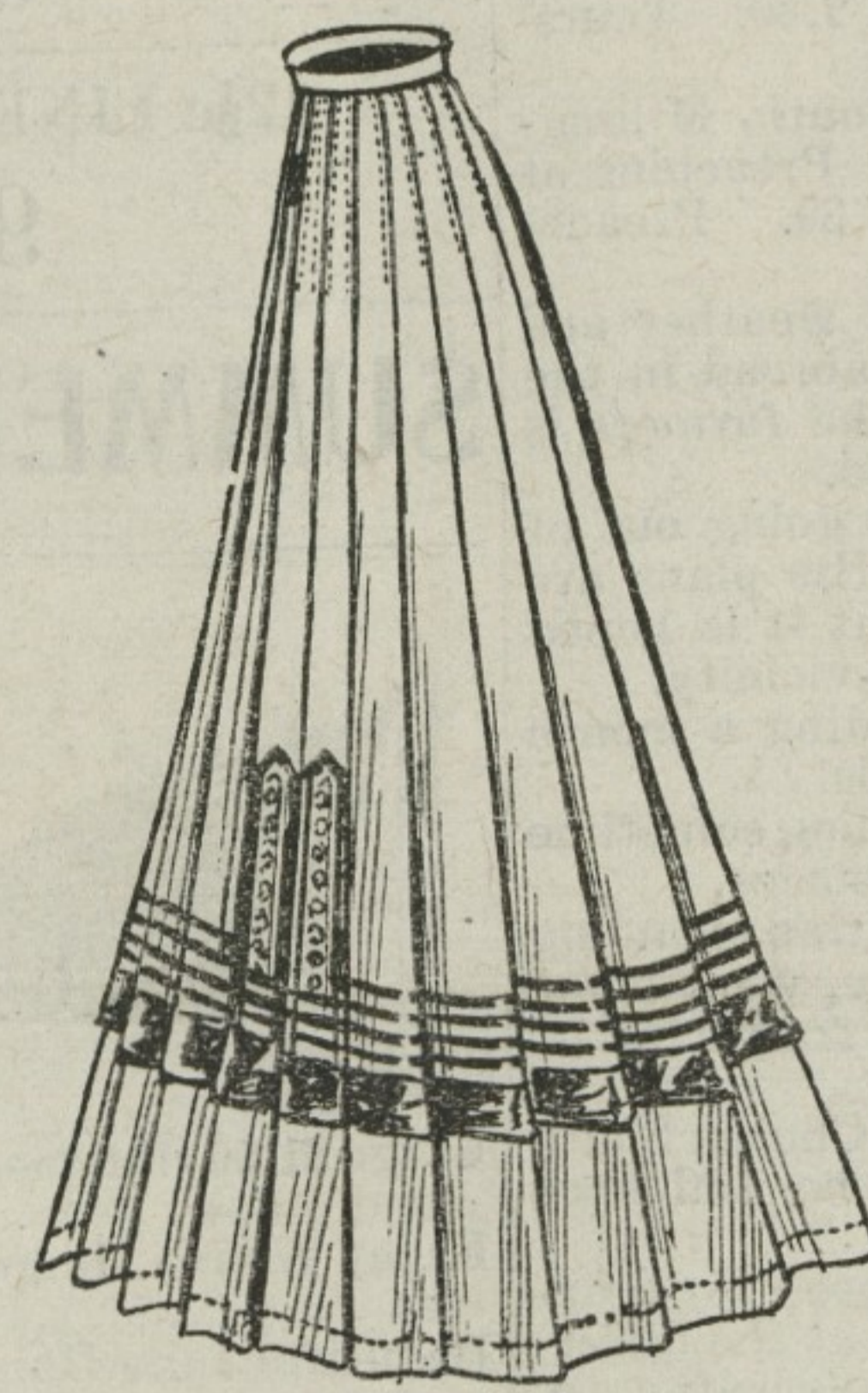

OBITUARY.

MRS. MARY COMEGYS ELIASON.
Mrs. Mary Comegys Eliason, wife of Mr. Wilbur Eliason, died at her home near town on Monday morning of a complications of diseases, in the 53rd year of her age. Mrs. Eliason had been in poor health for sometime, and had sought relief by special treatment in the University of Pennsylvania Hospital, Philadelphia, for some months, but had failed to find restoration to health. The deceased was the daughter of the late Capt. Hiram Brown and Mrs. Mary E. Brown, of this town. She was a member of one of the town's oldest families, the "Homestead," on Front street being among the town's most prominent colonial residences. Mrs. Eliason spent her entire life in Chester town, and up until the time of her illness she was an active member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. She was in all respects a noble christian character, and while always obedient to her social and religious duties, it was in the home that she manifested those qualities of heart and mind that stamped her a loving wife, a devoted mother and a sincere friend. She will be a great loss to the church and community. Besides her aged mother, and her husband, she leaves five sons, Messrs. Wilbur Jr., of Chester town, Dr. Eldridge, of Philadelphia; John, of the Philadelphia bar; Holt, Manager of the Fairfield Stock Food Company, Philadelphia; Hiram, of Chester town, and one daughter, Miss Rebecca, of Chester town. She also leaves a brother, Mr. H. Clay Brown and sister, Miss Anna R. Brown, of Baltimore. Funeral services were held privately on Tuesday evening at 6.30 o'clock from the residence, conducted by Rev. Dr. L. E. Barrett. Interment was also private in Chester cemetery. The pall-bearers were Marion deK. Smith, Edward Wilkins, Thomas Massey, Harrison W. Vickers, Jr., W. W. Beck and Dr. A. B. Burris. Undertaker, E. Ferguson had charge of the funeral arrangements.

PROF. W. J. RIVERS.
EX-PRESIDENT OF WASHINGTON COLLEGE WAS EIGHTY-SEVEN YEARS OLD.
Prof. William James Rivers, former president of Washington College, at Chester town, Md., and for the last 18 years a resident of Baltimore, died at 10.45 o'clock Tuesday night at his home, 2305 North Calvert street, of old age. He had been ill a few weeks with a slight attack of grip, but his condition did not seem serious until a short time before his death. He was 87 years old, and formerly a prominent educator in South Carolina. A remarkable feature of Professor Rivers' life was that up to the time of his death he had never been ill an entire day and never suffered the slightest accident. He went to Baltimore from Chester town, but the greater part of his life was spent in his native State, South Carolina. The deceased was elected president of Washington College in 1873 and remained at the head of the institution until 1891. He was one of the most prominent educators in the east. He leaves two daughters--Mrs. Frank E. Tyler, of Fredericksburg, Va., and Miss Lydia L. Rivers, of Baltimore, three sons--Dr. E. C. Rivers, of Denver, Col.; Dr. Arthur D. Rivers, of Baltimore, and a sister, Mrs. Mamie E. Lucas, of Charlestown, South Carolina.

MR. EDGAR H. STRONG.
Mr. Edgar H. Strong, one of the best known residents of the Fifth District, died at his home, Grey's Point farm, at 10 o'clock on Wednesday night, of heart failure, aged 60 years. Mr. Strong had been feeling unwell only since last Monday, and his death was extremely sudden. Mr. Strong was a man much beloved by those who knew him intimately, and was a member of one of the county's oldest and best families. Besides a wife, who was before marriage a Miss Crouch, he leaves eleven children, 8 boys and 3 girls. He also leaves one brother, Mr. Walter Strong, of Broad Neck, and a sister, Mrs. Watkins, of Baltimore. Mrs. Lillian Strong, of Chester town, is a sister-in-law. Funeral services were held in St. Paul's Church yesterday evening at 5 o'clock, conducted by Dr. H. B. Martin, of Chester town. Interment was made in St. Paul's cemetery. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Joseph Watkins, Walter Strong, Edgar Strong, Jr., Miller Strong, Ruthin Strong, and Paul Massey.
